### NEWS FROM OTTAWA

#### A BRAKEMAN HAD HIS LEGS CRUSHED

One Leg Amputated—Belleville's New Armoury—Palma Trophy Shooting Contest on Sept. 8th.

Ottawa, May 17.—Brakeman Sugrue fell under the cars at the G.T.R. freight yards last night, and had his legs badly crushed. One was amputated at the hospital, the other may have to be taken off. The man is in serious condition.

William Stuart, Ottawa, has been awarded the contract for building the new armoury at Belleville. The cost is between \$80,000 and \$90,000.

The 4th Regiment, D.C.O.R., will leave Ottawa, for Hamilton, on Saturday night, June 20th, and return from that city on the following Tuesday morning. The committee is busy with details of this Dominion Day trip.

#### YACHTING MATTERS

#### LIEUT. COL. STRANGE, WILL LIKELY SAIL.

The Kingston Eighteen-Footer Against Watertown—One of the Canada Cup Trial Challenges Will Be Here Shortly.

It is likely that the eighteen-footer racer being built in Kingston to contest with the Watertown, N.Y., boat will be sailed by Lieut.-Col. Frank Strange, who was instrumental in securing the money for its construction. Col. Strange is one of the oldest members of the Kingston Yacht Club, and is an expert sailor. The craft that will represent Kingston is already under construction by the Kingston Boat company, of which Dr. Black is president.

The twenty-seven-footer built in England by Cuthbert Mullock, the wealthy Torontonian, is to contest in the trial races to decide which of a number of yachts will represent Canada in the race against the Rochester boat for the Canada cup, which will reach Kingston shortly. It should now be at Montreal, whence it is to be towed to Kingston. Here Mr. Oldrieve, the expert sailmaker, will fit the craft with its "white wings," and then it will be sailed to Toronto. Local yachtmen will have a good chance to inspect the English production. The craft will likely take a few spins about the harbor with the local yachts.
