COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

World—The Markets.

The futures in Canada this week were 23; same week in 1906, 27. U. S. R. R. train earnings for the second week in May increased \$327,000. Grand trunk railway earnings for week May 8th to 14th totalled \$890,000, against \$1,200,000 for the same week in 1906. Toronto stock exchange earnings for the week ended May 11th totalled \$59,836.64, or \$9,912.27 more than in the corresponding week last year. George W. Patton, Chicago, is said to have received over \$1,000,000 on the rise in wheat. One of the bears is said to have dropped \$500,000. The Montreal Power company may reduce electric light prices as well as gas prices if the city will make a contract for a number of years.

KILLED BY BLAST.

Elisha Huff Meets Death at Bloomfield.

Bloomfield, May 17.—A fatal accident occurred about one o'clock, today, when Elisha Huff, a prominent and well-to-do farmer, residing about seven miles from here, lost his life. Mr. Huff was superintending the erection of telephone poles and was struck by a piece of rock and instantly killed. His face and one hand was terribly mangled. The deceased was about sixty years of age and leaves a wife and several children.

Does Its Duty Well.

Among the most active Presbyterian churches in the city, Kingston holds a leading place. Last year it raised over \$200 for home mission work in the presbytery, and this year is undertaking the support of two student missionaries.
