TO REPORT CASES OF CON TAGIOUS DISEASES The Law Imposes Duties Upon Citizens As Well As Doctors

The Board of Health Posting

The board of health has entered the reporting of all cases of contagi ous diseases. The laxity in the past non-reporting of such any person who has knowledge of the existence of a contagious disease. This brings the layman within the province of legal enactments. The parent who does not report an attack of whooping cough, which exists in his family, even nizant of a case of measles in the home of a neighbor, and fails to re-

port the case, are alike as negligent as any physician who fails to notify the health officer of the existence of a contagious disease within his practice. To the end that this matter may be brought to the notice of residents and the by-law thoroughly enforced, the board of health is issuing notices to doctors and nurses, printing half sheets and dodgers with the notice thereon, and also advertising the same in the local papers. By this means it is hoped to stir the public from the lethargy existing and open their eyes to the dangers of the present practice and the rigidity of the law on the question.


