LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Board of Trade in Touch With Iron Men.

Kingston, May 21.—(To the Editor): I was pleased to read your editorial of last night regarding the possible erection here at a future time of an iron smelter.

The industries committee of the board of trade have been in touch for some little time with the gentleman who has been locally active in connection with the opening up of iron mines in the bank portion of the county.

"I have had the necessary survey made and soundings taken over the Gunn shoal, and report as follows with plan and estimate. I have reduced the soundings to mean water level of February, 1907, which is seventeen feet above the sill of the dry dock.

"My estimate of rock to be removed from Gunn's shoal to give a clear depth of 17.5 feet—i.e., 16 feet at low water, is 61,000 cubic yards in place. The area to be worked over is about 460,000 square feet (about 10 1/2 acres), and the average cut, approximately, 1.4 feet.

"The accompanying plan shows, tinted brown the other areas in the harbour of depths less than 17.5 feet, and areas of over 17.5 feet are tinted in blue. From this it appears that Kingston harbor has a wide entrance channel along the line of the range, and for vessels plying at present on Lake Ontario of deepest draught, viz., sixteen feet, there is abundance of room anywhere from the government dry dock to the Montreal transportation company's wharves.

"The width of channel between Gunn's shoal and the outer line of wharves is, at its southern end and Martello tower, its narrowest portion, over 600 feet, and opposite the Martello tower, its narrowest portion, 450 feet, so it can hardly be said that the harbor entrance is obstructed from the Gunn shoal.

"Vessels have grounded on the Gunn shoal from time to time. This may be attributed partly to faulty navigation, and partly to the fact that the channel is buoyed. There is no doubt a great improvement is advisable in the buoying of the channel. It is scattered around the shoal in a number of places, and it would be infinitely better that two gas buoys be placed, one at the south-westerly corner opposite Moore's elevator, and one on the north-westerly corner of the shoal opposite Swift's dock, in a line parallel to the line of range lights. Also there is much dissatisfaction among navigating officers as to the reliability of the present range lights on the view of these discs is greatly obscured by intervening trees, etc., and that they are not painted brilliantly.

"There is a channel just north of the Gunn's shoal, which is used constantly by local mariners entering from the St. Lawrence river, and vice versa. A light buoy placed on the north-westerly corner of the Gunn shoal, above mentioned, would, no doubt, indicate this channel sufficiently, as it might, probably, as compared with the main route out on the ranges and around Gunn shoal.

"The dredging proposition was discussed in a meeting at the Kingston Board of Trade rooms by the marine committee of the board of trade, members of the city council, and others, also with a number of boat captains, and no one among them would say that improved buoying of the channel would not be perfectly satisfactory for navigation interests.

"It is the general opinion that Kingston's lake trade will increase enormously in the event of the deepening and enlarging of the Welland canal, but in the meantime very little increase is in sight."

LICENSED TO PREACH

RECEPTION OF FIVE QUEEN'S GRADUATES.

By the Kingston Presbytery—Three Were Ordained—Addressed on Soul-Winning and Intensity of Conviction.

The presbytery of Kingston met in Cooke's church on the afternoon of Tuesday. In the absence of the moderator, Rev. Dr. MacFavish, was appointed moderator pro-tem. The members present, besides him, were: Revs. Principal Gordon, Drs. Mackie and MacGillivray, and Revs. Messrs. Gray, Wilkins, Prof. Fowler, Shearer, Milligan, McMurrie, R. Laird, Sr., R. Craig and Prof. Laird, Rev. R. J. Craig was appointed moderator of the session of Wolfe Island.

Prof. Laird, convener of the committee on the examination of students, reported that the committee had met in the forenoon, and had conducted a written examination of five students, who had been certified as having completed their preparatory training, and desired to be licensed to preach. The committee recommended that they be taken on trial. Their names are as follows: viz., Messrs. George A. Brown, B.D.; Malcolm F. Munro, B.A., B.D.; Robert W. Beveridge, B.A., and Donald J. Stewart, B.A.

The presbytery listened to discourses or essays, from the candidates, and in view of the whole examination agreed to give them licenses, this to be done at a public meeting in the evening. As about to undertake a mission in outlying districts, the presbytery also agreed to ordain the three named as follows, viz., Messrs. Munro, Watts and Beveridge.

The presbytery met at eight o'clock with the addition of Profs. Ferguson and Ross, and in a similar manner licensed those named to preach the gospel, and solemnly ordained them, and in view of the whole examination agreed to give them licenses, this to be done at a public meeting in the evening. IN POLICE CIRCLES.

ANOTHER PRISONER IS TAKEN TO THE PEN.

Leslie Harris, G. T. R. Fireman, Given Three Years For Bigamy—Some Police Notes.

Every day or so, the prisoners' roll at the penitentiary, is added to. One of the latest additions to the big stone building is Leslie Harris, a G. T. R. fireman, hailing from Stratford, Ont., who was found guilty of bigamy, and sentenced to three years. He was brought here yesterday by Thomas Maywood, the newly appointed sheriff of Perth county, and High Constable T. B. McCarthy.

The prisoner was placed under arrest during April, and his trial took place at Stratford the other day, when Magistrate O'Leane found him guilty. Harris was married to Frances McDonald, in Portage La Prairie, February 14th, 1901, and to Jessie Hartwood, of Zorra, at Stratford, on February 6th, 1907.

In the carrying out of the by-law prohibiting people expectorating on the sidewalk, the police will indeed have their "hands full," as the saying goes. Of course, it will be an easy matter for an officer to have a summons issued, should he catch a person in the act of violating the law, but it is not at all likely that any person would do such a thing, when in sight of a bluecoat, and never seen indulged in more freely at night, and it is then that the task of the policeman is made more difficult, as the offender could arrange it so, as not to be detected. The sidewalks in front of public places are often given a tobacco juice, but can the police always point to the guilty parties? It will be much easier to catch the by-law breakers in this way.

Firecrackers must be put in the background, Chief Bailie has given such instructions, and for the next few days now, until the Victoria day celebration is over, the police will be on the lookout for the "smart set," who wish to defy the law, and let the firecrackers off just where they see fit.

Constables Filion and Timmerman, sanitary inspectors, are making good progress in their house-to-house visits. In each case, where premises are found to be in an unhealthy condition, a notice is given the owner to clean up at once. If this notice is ignored, then other proceedings are taken.

Now that the severe cold weather is over, the police do not receive many calls from people, asking to be given shelter at the police station over night. In fact, when the weather is fine and clear, the police are always clear of their station. Old barns and outbuildings are good enough to sleep in when the weather is fine.

Some time ago, the police had a number summoned to the police court for loitering around the street corners. The crusade is not over by any means, and some more offenders may find themselves before the court if they do not change their ways.
