**COMMERCIAL MATTERS.**

**What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.**

The total output of the Dominion Coal Company's colliers for April amounted to 215,264 tons.

In May, 1907, wheat was \$2.95 a bushel in Chicago. But it is too late to realize on this market.

The output of the colliers for the week ending May 17th was 19,121 tons, or a daily average of 2,703 tons.

A seat on the Washington Stock Exchange sold Wednesday, for \$7,450. The last previous sale was at \$10,000.

A seat on the New York Stock Exchange has just been sold for \$39,500. Colliery mine operators are becoming convinced that the Department are in possession of the Nipissing.

The Boston News Bureau's estimate of copper production thus far in 1907 in the United States and Mexico is 309,250,753 pounds, against 283,527,951 pounds in the same period of last year, showing a decrease of 11,790,447 pounds.

The total production of coal in the United States in 1906, was 414,009,351 tons, valued at \$312,610,744. These figures show an increase of 210,000 tons, or 5.2 per cent in quantity and of \$28,828,781, or 7.5 per cent in value.

The director of the C.P.R. advises the Post that its stock about 1200 shares are held in Canada, only a little over 110,000 shares in the United States, and the balance in Great Britain and Europe. There are over 10,000 shareholders who hold less than fifty shares each.—Financial Post.

An Ottawa despatch says: A number of lawyers' clerks in Toronto, representing industrial principals, have been sent to the Pacific Coast Mines, Limited, with a capital of \$2,000,000, and head office in Toronto. The company is developing the properties of the Alaska Development company and the Pacific Coal and Oil company.

**THE LIGHT DEPARTMENT WILL HAVE TO PAY.**

**For the Trimming of the Trees—All the Electric Poles, Soon to Be Painted—The Question of Reducing the Roads.**

Hereafter, there shouldn't be much complaint about the mutilation of trees by the light department, since the city engineer has ordered that no trees be cut by anyone except the city tree trimmer, or under his immediate direction. The trimmer himself must be on the spot to direct how the trees shall be trimmed if they interfere with the electric poles lines. It seems that the engineer, some time ago, directed that the tree trimmer should supervise the tree work for the light department, but his directions were not always carried out. As he was not present all the time, more branches were cut from trees than he ordered. The tree trimmer is paid by the hour, and, therefore, the light department will be required to pay him while he supervises the trimming required for the wires.

**To Paint The Poles.**

As soon as the new lines of electric poles are completed, the old ones will be removed. The new poles are about twenty-five feet high, while the old ones are sixty-five feet. It will be much easier to keep the new lines in repair. Ald. Toye, chairman of the light committee, says that a Buffalo electric expert was here the other day, and after looking over the plan of the electrical extensions being carried out by Mr. Campbell, said that it was one of the very best he had ever seen. Boss & Hillgate's plan for Westmount's lighting system is the same as Mr. Campbell's—the poles are low and all outside the walks.

The poles in the electrical department will be painted when the advertisements are completed. Ald. Toye expects that the painting will be completed within a month. The light plant poles of the past never "smelled" paint.

**Reduce The Roads.**

In Westmount curbing is placed a foot or two outside the electric poles, and the space between the curb and the walk made into a boulevard. This reduces the amount of road to be kept in repair. Ald. Toye suggests that this method be carried out in Kingston. It might be costly at first, but money would perhaps be saved eventually.

Ald. Gaskin, chairman of the board of works, says that it is his intention to recommend that a number of the city roads in sections where the traffic is light, be narrowed by filling in a portion of each side and making boulevards. The result would be a saving in road repair and it would add to the beauty of the streets.

**ON THE INDIAN LIST**

**Case Will Be Investigated By the License Inspector—Police Court Notes.**

A young man, who was some time ago placed on "the Indian list," at the local hotels, by the license inspector, appeared in the police court, this morning, on a charge of drunkenness. He was fined \$1 and costs, and sentenced by the court as to where he received his liquor. He told the magistrate that he had been served liquor at a local hotel, and the license inspector will be called upon to make an investigation, and the hotelman, no doubt, will be summoned to the police court. When first questioned, the accused did not care to say where he had been given drinks.

"I was given it in the street by a stranger," he said to the magistrate. "I might have got it, not at one of the hotels, but I do not remember."

J. McD. Mowat appeared on behalf of the young man's relatives. He said that the accused was well-known about the city, and was also well-known by the hotel keepers, all of whom had been served with a notice not to sell him liquor.

"An hotel keeper who will serve liquor to a man under these circumstances deserves no mercy," remarked Mr. Mowat, "and the magistrate should see that the accused be pressed in the matter of where he obtained the liquor, and that the case be followed up."

The accused was thereupon questioned closely by the magistrate, and he gave the name of a local hotelman to the court.

John Davin, a sailor off the schooner *Forest River*, now unloading coal at the M. T. company's slip, was registered as a drunk.

"I will not drink any more if you give me a chance," said Davin to the court.

"Any more what?" said the magistrate.

"Any more whiskey, sir," was the reply.

"Well, see that you keep your promise," said the magistrate to the sailor, as he gave him his liberty.

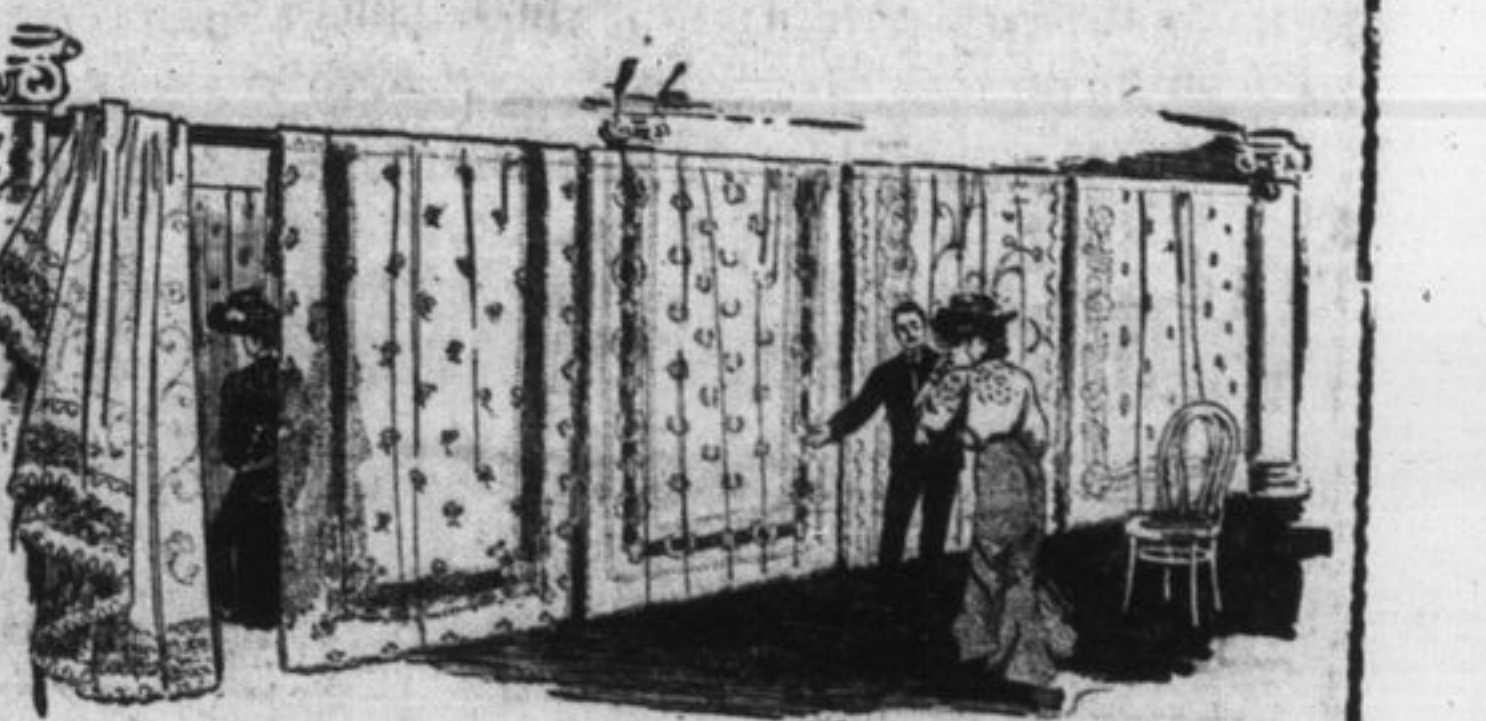
