were many narrow escapes. The finan-  
cial loss will be small.

gery, also escaped. Milo Lawrence, a  
farmer who resides at Waddington,  
N.Y., nearly opposite Iroquois, has  
been arrested and committed for trial  
on a charge of hiding and feeding the  
escaped prisoners. Lawrence gave \$500  
bail for his appearance when called  
upon.

fare. Mr. MacKinnon expressed the

Mr. Gibson, and at this price Mr. Gib-

by Model. Mr. Gibson secured 611  
boxes.

The selling price last week was  
12 3-16c.

### MARINE INTELLIGENCE.

The News Gathered About the  
Wharves.

The steamer Missisquoi cleared to-  
day, for Rockport.

James Collier, of Picton, intends to  
build a boat for Napawan-Adolphus-  
town-Picton route. He is the own-  
er of the steamer Reindeer.

The steamer Saleberry, which arrived  
here yesterday, en route to Belle-  
ville, has been purchased by the  
Genac company of the latter place  
for a ferry boat to carry their em-  
ployees. She is 100 feet long.

The steamer Varuna, of Belleville,  
has had to re-install her triple engine,  
owing to her compound one order-  
ing not being completed in time. The  
former was considered too strong for  
a boat of the Varuna's size. She can  
speed sixteen miles an hour.

The steamer General B. Franklin, of  
Alexandria Bay, has been purchased  
by Peter Cavanagh of Perth. She has  
been on the St. Lawrence river since  
1872. The Franklin is now at the  
Kingston foundry marine railway,  
and will be thoroughly overhauled.

Died at Montreal.  
The death occurred at Montreal, on  
Wednesday, of Miss Margaret Byrne,  
sister at the Mother Home. Deceased  
was 67 years of age. She was  
formerly mother superior at the Notre-  
Dame convent, in this city, and left  
here two years ago, for Montreal.

James Byrne, of Johnson street, is a  
brother of deceased, and he accom-  
panied by Archbishop Gauthier and  
Mother Wilfred, of the convent here,  
have left for Montreal, where the  
funeral will take place. Deceased was  
the widow of the Notary Dame  
convent, and was connected with it  
for eleven years. She was not only  
beloved by the sisterhood and pupils,  
but by all others who had the pleas-  
ure of her acquaintance, and the  
news of her death was learned with  
sincere regret.

The Cup On Exhibition.  
The magnificent silver cup donated  
by the Victoria Day celebration com-  
mittee to the winner of the motor  
boat races to-morrow, is on exhibi-  
tion in the window of C. W. Lane's  
jewellery store, Wellington street. Mr.  
Lane supplied the cup, and his choice  
of design is to be commended. The  
engraving has been very tastefully  
executed. On one side of the cup ap-  
pear the words: "Victoria Day,  
Kingston, 1907. Championship cup."  
Many citizens admired the beautiful  
trophy, which should be highly prized  
by the fortunate winner, whoever  
he may be.

The Decline In Bank Stocks.  
Montreal, May 23.—The stocks of al-  
most all the leading chartered banks  
of Canada have recently been showing  
steady declines. They had been show-  
ing a much lower yield than most  
other stocks, and they seem to be get-  
ting down to level where they will  
yield at least five per cent.

### AT THE POLICE COURT

CHARGED WITH ROBBING A  
CLOTHES LINE.

Thomas Miller a Young Man,  
Arrested by Constable Naylor  
—Remanded a Day.

Constable John Naylor, last night,  
arrested Thomas Miller, a young man  
who has been before the court on two  
other occasions, on a charge of steal-  
ing clothes from the line in the yard  
at the house of Chapman Chappelle,  
East street. He appeared in the po-  
lice court, this morning, and was re-  
manded a day.

Constable Naylor says that he  
caught Miller in the yard, with a  
small bundle of clothes in his arm.  
Miller does not deny this, but states  
that he has been employed for several  
days, in hauling ashes, and that last  
night, he was around several yards,  
on the lookout for a job. He says  
that while he was in Chappelle's yard,  
he ran against the clothes line, knock-  
ing some of the clothes to the ground  
and that he was just about to re-  
place them, but Constable Naylor ap-  
peared on the scene.

Constable Naylor noticed the pris-  
oner on West street about 9:15 o'clock  
and it was shortly after this that he  
caught him in the yard. The officer  
said that when he was about to place  
Miller under arrest, the young man  
cried bitterly, and begged not to be  
taken to the police station, saying  
that the magistrate would send him  
down for five years.

While the officer was making some  
queries at the house, Miller jumped  
the back fence, and made his escape.  
Later, Constable Naylor arrested him  
at his home.

John McIntyre, K.C., appeared on  
behalf of the prisoner.
