What is Going On In the Business World—The Markets.

For the past seven months gross earnings of the Montreas Street Railway have shown an increase of \$221,000, or 14½ per cent. Operating expenses were heavy, increasing 16½ per cent., while fixed charges continue much greater than a year ago and increased 29½ per cent. The result is that, in spite of the fine gross gain, the surplus for the seven months is \$7,495, or 2½ per cent. smaller than it was a year ago.


