COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

Milwaukee tobacco men believe that the 1907 crop will outstrip any previously gathered in this state. The Diamond Match Company will take \$1,000,000 from the earnings of 1906 to purchase 95,000 acres of timber land in California.

For the past seven months gross earnings of the Montreal Street Railway have shown an increase of \$281,000, or 14 1/2 per cent. Operating expenses were heavy, increasing 104 per cent. while heavy charges continue much greater than a year ago and increase 271 per cent. The result is that, in spite of the fine gross gain, the surplus for the seven months is \$7,405, or 24 per cent. smaller than it was a year ago.

The big iron production of the Dominion is keeping pace with the growth of other industries. In thirteen years the increase has been nearly 1,200 per cent. an average of nearly 100 per cent. per annum. In 1906, 241,957 tons. The production of last year was double that of 1904, when the output was only 270,942 tons. WHY THE RIFLE RANGE IS NOT BUILT.

Canadian Officers Stand Well in Permanent Force Examinations—Improvements to the Camp Ground at Petawawa.

Many inquiries have been made as to why the rifle range for Kingston has not yet been constructed. The minister of militia stated six months ago in a letter to Hon. William Henry, M.P., that it would be ready for the coming summer. The 14th Regiment was counting on it this coming summer, and is disappointed. It is said that the necessary money for the purchase of the land was made available in the trade and city council had better take up the matter again, and see that the range is built.

Band Sergeant MacKinnon, of the R.C.M.A., was examined, this week, for entrance to Keble Hall, the Royal Military School of Music in England. Sgt. MacKinnon has brought the artillery band to a condition of efficiency by his energy and enthusiasm. A course in the English School of Music would be of great advantage to him.

The report from the war office regarding the permanent force examinations, last Feb. shows that the Canadian officers took a good standing as those right in Britain, notwithstanding that the latter have such big advantages in being able to secure special instruction and in having the latest military equipment. Capt. Anderson, formerly of the Royal Military College, and the 14th P.W.D. Rifles of Kingston, stood exceptionally high. Canada turns out the very best of officers, but it must be said that some who inflict themselves on the service would be better at some other vocation. However, the high standards now required to keep out the duffers and admit only those who have brains. It might be mentioned that many of the militia corps officers have more and more energetic corps. The latter need to be well weeded. A beginning is being made.

It is claimed in militia circles that when the permanent and active militia corps march into Petawawa in June, they will be quartered in the finest military camp in Canada, and one which in many ways compares favorably with any one in the world. The improvements made since last summer will aggregate nearly \$40,000. The area occupied by the buildings, twenty-eight of which are new, is one square mile. Seven stables are necessary to accommodate the horses, for with the artillery, cavalry and staff, there will be over 1,000 animals.

The Royal Canadian Field Artillery will leave here for Petawawa at 8 a.m. Monday.

It is the impression that Fort Henry has had no caretaker of late. Such is not the case. The same caretaker, who has done duty there for some time, is still living in quarters at the fort.

The Royal Military College cadets had their examinations earlier this year than usual, as it was expected that they were to be sent to Petawawa, to act as instructors and also to receive instruction. However, they are not to go there this season. Their examinations are about over, and they have a clear month for outdoor work. The college closing will be on June 27th.

WATER LAND TROUBLE.

Government Surveyor Gets Himself Into Hot Water.

Trouble exists over a strip of land along the harbor, between Cataract bridge and the M. T. company's premises. The company has held the land in fee simple by a lease it holds from the K. & P. railway company. Dr. Evans claimed that he holds from the government, and is in the process of leasing the water lots for boathouse purposes, and that they are not included in the company's lease. Henry Law, surveyor of the department of the interior, has been over this dispute, and it is understood that both he and T. W. Nash, P.L.S., hold that the land is covered by the M. T. company's lease. The former, it is alleged, made such a statement before reporting to Ottawa on the matter, and Dr. Evans telegraphed to the hospital department that Mr. Law had recalled and that an unqualified surveyor be sent. Mr. Law's report on Petawawa at noon, being recalled, it is claimed, by the other party.

Took Away Goods.

Among the losses reported to have occurred on Victoria day was a suit case and raincoat belonging to Miss Simpson. Inventory. They were left in charge of a friend in the Alton hotel and during the temporary absence of the person in charge, they were taken either by mistake or intentionally. They will be sent back to their former homes in Scotland, at Mr. Carnegie's expense, and a pension of fifteen shillings a week will be allowed.

JUMPED OFF BRIDGE

INTO RAILWAY YARD AND BROKE HIS THIGH

The Foolish Act of a German in Montreal—Frank Gotch Wins Heavy-Weight Wrestling Contest.

Montreal, May 25.—After a forty-five foot jump off the railing of the Notre Dame street bridge into the Place Viger yard of the C.P.R., Thomas Fichtus, a German, is now in the Notre Dame hospital, suffering from a broken thigh and other injuries.

At 11:30 a.m. yesterday, a milkman climbing on the railing at the south side of the bridge, and jump to the tracks below. None of the yard employees below saw the man, until he was lying injured on the tracks. To those who ran to lift him up he said: "I think my leg is broken," but gave no explanation of his act.
