An application for entry or inspection made personally at any Sub-agent's office may be wired to the local Agent by the Sub-agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is wacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are eccived by mail.

In case of "personation" the entry will be summarily cancelled and the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim.

An applicant for inspection must be eligible for homestead entry, and only pine application for inspection will be eccived from an individual until that pplication has been disposed of.

A homesteader whose entry is in good tanding and not liable to cancellation, lay, subject to approval of Department, relinquish it in favour of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, if eligible, but to no one else, on filing deplaration of abandonment.

Where an entry is summarily cancelled

Where an entry is summarily cancelled by voluntarily abandoned, subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for inspection will be entitled to prior right of entry.

Applicants for inspection must state in het particulars the homesteader is in default, and if subsequently the statement is found to be incorrect in material particulars, the applicant will lose any prior right of re-entry should the land become vacant, or if entry has been granted it may be summarily cancelled.

(8) If the settler has his permanent esidence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirement may be satisfied by residence upon such land.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do se.




