

## FINE CHEESE BOARD WAS THAT HELD IN PICTON ON SATURDAY.

Accident on Victoria Day—Dis-solution of a Firm—Death of a Lady at Bloomfield.  
Picton, May 27.—The best board in two years, was the content of President John A. Sprague, on the Picton cheese board, Saturday afternoon, when 1,300 colored cheeses were boarded by seventeen factories. The opening bid was 12c. All the cheese sold at 12 1/2 c. It was decided to start next week and board separately the cheese of the six county factories which make colored cheese. It is expected these will bring higher prices than the rest of the board. Each of the county factories will pay \$5 to defray the expenses of the Public Market.

Victoria Day was not without its quota of accidents. An unknown young woman, from Napawa, had her arm broken on Main street. She was thrown from a buggy, the horse of which became frightened and ran away. The young son of Capt. Hoffman had his left hand severely burned. He put his hand in his pocket which was full of torpedoes. These exploded.

The steamer Varang has commenced her daily run between Picton and Pictou. Her owner, Capt. Alfred Hicks, is still in St. Mary's, Ohio, undergoing treatment for cancer. The steamer was waterly cleared, Saturday, with freight for Charlotte, N.Y. William H. Lake is building a large new coal shed, on Bridge street, and fitting up a new office for his business. Messrs. Lake and Killip having dissolved partnership the former will enter the coal and wood business opposite his present place of business.

The death occurred, in Bloomfield, on Friday morning, of Mrs. Freeman Bowman, aged thirty-three years. Her maiden name was Alina Hicks. The funeral was held from the Methodist church on Sunday afternoon. Miss Tottie Hephurn, attending West-houses school, after spending a few days in town, has returned to Toronto. Miss Edith McGuig, Belleville, has been visiting in town. Miss Clark, Toronto, is the guest of her sister, Mrs. (Dr.) Currie. Mrs. J. J. Rae is visiting in Trenton and Brighton.

## Everything to Gain.

Ald. Henderson was a strong supporter of the by-laws and was very much pleased to hear Mr. Pense express himself in the way he did about the bonus given the grain elevators. The carrying of the grain elevators, city had nothing to lose, and everything to gain. Ninety men would be employed, with a large pay roll, and this would mean that the city would gain the services of these men, as there were no unemployed in the present time. At least there was none with-out work who wanted to work. The newcomers would require houses, they would pay taxes, and in this way the city would be benefited. The speaker hoped that the electors would not rely too much upon the board of trade, and the city council, on election day. He hoped that all the voters would go early to the polls on Tuesday, and that their own accord, he, himself, intended to give the men employed by him at the grain elevator, ample time to cast their votes, and he hoped that all other employers of labor would do the same.

Ald. Rigney outlined the agreement between the city and the companies. The city, he said, was giving over what he termed unprofitable property. He spoke of the many advantages that would be derived, should the by-laws be carried. There should be no objection to the passing of the by-laws, and every taxpayer would be urged to do his duty. A two-third vote was necessary, and hard work would be necessary. J. L. Whiting was the last speaker. He was a strong supporter of the by-laws. The proposition was a straight and easy one, and could be easily understood. There appeared to be no opposition, and all that was necessary was to see the duty as the children of God to be happy, joyous, care-free, pleasure-loving.

The speaker referred to the progress made by other cities, naming Peterborough, Ottawa and Beaufort, while Kingston had been stagnant. Kingston had not increased its population during the last twenty years. It was high time that they got a move on, and one way to do this, was by encouraging new industries. There was much laughter, when Mr. Whiting said that even poor old Beville had a boom on. He referred to the Alford Street works, which had given Kingston the "go by." This company had gone out of business, but had established in that city building and machinery that could not be taken away, and now another company had taken over the plant—a company that would employ four hundred hands. Surely this was a boom for poor old Beville. An American tourist, who visited Kingston some time ago, had been asked why it was that Kingston did not go ahead as fast as it should. "You are not making steeps and not enough smoke stacks," was the reply given by the American.

**Steeple and Smoke Stacks.**  
The speaker said that while he did not agree with the statement that there were too many steeples, as thought that the statement about the scarcity of smoke stacks was certainly a good point. He urged all the electors to put their shoulder to the wheel and give the smelter by-laws a handsome majority. "By doing this you will add two more smoke stacks to the city," said Mr. Whiting, in conclusion. This ended the speech making, and Mayor Mowat announced, for the second time, that any person opposed to the by-laws would be heard. There was no response to the appeal. The motion was passed by a standing vote.
