**COMMERCIAL MATTERS**

**What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets**

The dividends paid by the Standard Oil Co. since 1900 have averaged \$42,000,000 a year.

John D. Rockefeller's income from the Standard Oil Co. by the close of this year, a period of ten years, will run close to \$110,000,000.

The Ogden Flour Mills company has negotiated another sale of 150,000 bushels of flour for the Ontario market, making the sales for the year so far this year 200,000 bushels.

The Ogden Flour Mills company has homes made by Canadians. This spring's shipment in the New York stock market, according to a syndicate of Pittsburg capitalists, headed by M. A. Werner, for the control of the Bradford Street Railway, the Grand Valley railway and the Woodstock and Ingersoll railway, has gone through.

A company capitalized at \$500,000 to be known as the British-American Oil Refineries Company, has been formed. Among the directors and shareholders are some of the most prominent bankers, capitalists and business men of Canada and British Columbia.

The directors of the Bank of Montreal have voted to increase the dividend to 17 1/2 per cent. to its staff. The bonus system regarded as more equitable than an annual increase, in that it distinguishes between men years and fat ones. A provision is made for insurance, residence in a gratuity. A less satisfactory system does not warrant a grant, and the bonus does not need to be made.

**FOR NEXT YEAR'S ONTARIO LABOR CONVENTION.**

William Kelly Elected Second Vice-President of Association

A Labor Paper is to be Published in Kingston.

The fifth annual convention of the Labor Educational Association of Ontario, met in Hamilton, May 24. About eighty delegates were present from all parts of the province. The principal business transacted was the making of arrangements for the publication of a journal in London (in some years past), in Hamilton, Toronto, Kingston, and other large industrial centers. The Hamilton and Toronto editions will appear shortly, while the Kingston arrangements are well under way. The ultimate aim is to have a federation of labor papers throughout the province. It is also proposed to issue a Labor Educational Quarterly for free distribution. It was decided to publish a new labor directory of the province, embodying information as to the location of all labor organizations, and to sell at one cent per copy. As the eastern part of the province was represented for the first time at this convention, it was decided to increase the executive from five to seven members. The following officers were elected:

Charles W. Waldron, Brantford, president; Charles G. Bird, Hamilton, first vice-president; William Kelly, Kingston, second vice-president; T. J. Begley, Peterboro, third vice-president; W. R. Steep, Toronto, fourth vice-president; Henry Clark, London, fifth vice-president; Otto Zimmer, Berlin, secretary-treasurer.

Upon invitation of W. Kelly, in the name of the labor men and women of Kingston, it was, after a lively struggle between Peterboro, Brantford, and other places, decided to hold the next annual session of the Labor Educational Association in Kingston.

Walking delegate Thomas Fleming, of the Socialist Union, who was among the delegates to the convention, created much merriment in his speech acknowledging the honor conferred upon Kingston. Among other remarks, he said: "Since you have volunteered to come to Kingston, we will see to it that you are well taken care of when you arrive."

At a meeting of the executive of the Independent Labor Party of Ontario held in Hamilton, on Saturday, the steps were taken for the purpose of raising a large sum of money to carry on the work of organization, and for campaign purposes. A constitution, application blanks for charters, organizers' commissions, etc., were prepared and ordered to be printed. The Ontario coat of arms was adopted as the official insignia of the party.

In order that the work of perfecting the organization should be taken up vigorously, and at once, the following general officers were appointed: Walter Rollo, Brantford, president; Kelly, Kingston; C. C. Hahn, Peterboro; W. R. James, Toronto; C. S. Chisum, Hamilton, and Allen Studholme, M.P.P., Hamilton.

P. M. Draper, Ottawa, secretary and treasurer of the Dominion Trades Congress, was present, and submitted a number of interesting propositions to the executive.

Mr. McCallum, of the Children's Aid Society, who has been looking after the boy since the case came before the court, will secure the new home for him.

The bridesmaid was Miss Lucy Sandy, of Watertown, who was dressed in very brilliant, over a blouse of white silk. She carried pink carnations. The groom was supported by Frank Nolan of Watertown. The happy couple left by the Cape boat for Watertown at 10:30 a.m., and on returning, they will reside at their home, near Cataraqui. The bride was the recipient of many pretty and useful presents.

**EXPLOSION AT GAS WORKS.**
