AT THE POLICE COURT
AN HOTELMAN WAS FINED \$10 AND COSTS.
For Allowing a Man on "Indian List" to Linger Around His Hotel—Charge of Selling Was Dismissed.
In the police court this morning, the case of a Kingston hotelman, charged with selling liquor to a man on the "Indian list," was heard by Magistrate Farrell.
The young man giving evidence, was arrested for being drunk, several days ago, and when before the court, told the magistrate that he had been served liquor at a certain hotel. When called this morning, he again made this statement, saying that he had been served the liquor in the bar-room, by the bar-tender. He did not remember having been served any drinks by the proprietor of the hotel, but was certain that the bar-tender had given him drinks.
The bar-tender, when called, swore that he had not served liquor to the young man, but admitted that the man had been in and out of the hotel several times during the day in question. The man did not ask for liquor, but when he came into the hotel, he had a flask of whiskey in his pocket, and was under the influence of liquor.
The proprietor of the hotel said that the young man was at his hotel, but denied the statement made that he had been served liquor. He said that when the man came to his house he was under the influence of liquor, and at that time, had a flask of whiskey in his possession. He had asked to be allowed to go to sleep in the barn, and this request had been granted. Later, witness had found the man lying in the barn with the empty flask beside him.
This concluded the evidence, and the charge against the hotelman was thereupon amended by Charles Webster, who prosecuted on behalf of Licenses Inspector Wright.
The charge was amended, charging the hotelman with a breach of the liquor act, in having allowed the young man in question to remain on his premises. The magistrate said that from the evidence offered, he could not find the accused guilty on the other charge. The hotelman pleaded guilty to this charge, stating that perhaps he had been to blame, but he did not care to throw a drunken man out on the street.
The magistrate imposed a fine of \$10 and costs, and stated that hotelmen should read over the liquor laws so that they might become acquainted with them. If a man on the "Indian list" was allowed to linger around a hotel, it might be an easy matter for him to secure liquor, through other people.
Robert Reeves notified the court that he had done away with his horse as ordered, and the charge against him was withdrawn. He was ordered to destroy the animal by the court a few days ago, a veterinary surgeon having stated that the horse had an incurable disease.
Alexander Kippan, a drunk, was fined \$1 and costs or ten days.

TWO LUCKY INCIDENTS.
Discovery of Gold in One Case—A Duck Story.
A man working on a new railroad cut, did something the foreman didn't like. He was an unfortunate sort of chap, always getting into trouble, and the foreman considered him a fool. Well, on this particular occasion foreman did go so bigotedly mad that he sent the fellow sprawling down a twenty-foot embankment. As the poor devil went sliding down he grabbed gravel to save himself, and when he fetched up at the bottom he was a sight to behold. As he washed his hands he was struck with the peculiar appearance of the dirt, and he investigated. Result—discovery of a gold claim that made him a millionaire. That's the kind of story you can hear about gold discoveries. Now it wasn't gold that made Sam Lawrence rich, it was duck eggs. Sam used to be a senator in Michigan. One day an opposition newspaper, to ridicule him, printed a cartoon, the central figure being a duck with his head on a gold mine. He was under it: "One of the ducks from Sam Lawrence's farm." Some people got the idea that he was a raiser of ducks, and he got a lot of letters asking the price of duck eggs. This put a notion in his head. He had seen an advertisement in some eastern paper of a man who had duck eggs to sell, and he wrote to him proposing to place his eggs on commission. He didn't pay much attention to the matter, until he learned that his mother, who had looked after forwarding the orders, told him her commissions had amounted to over \$200. This gave a hint of the money to be made out of duck eggs, and he went into the business. Now as a result of that cartoon that was meant to mock him from his political job as state senator, he is making money fast out of ducks and duck eggs. Almost as good as the gold mine story.

Laurier's Lead.
Saturday Night.
Sir Wilfrid Laurier was called all sorts of agreeable names in London—the Nestor of the conference, the Silver-Tongued Orator of the Empire, and half a dozen others. A few imperialists, who mistake preaching for preparation, were vexed because he did things which less excitable people regard thankfully. He spoke for preference, he gave plain talk on the cattle embargo, he lauded inter-imperial independence, and he commended the speech of Mr. Deakin (who is much conditioned by the extremities of labor legislation), and of Dr. Jameson, who was once before in a disastrous hurry to help a revolution. With the First Canadian then, he expressed the restraining and progressive power of the conference, for he represented the balanced, experienced aspiration to go ahead, which makes resistance to Canada dead, really valuable. Australia talked most. Canada exercised the heavier counsel. That Sir Wilfrid completely satisfied neither trader nor tariff reformer, but strongly impressed both, is the best promise that our imperial influence can easily grow. If we merely said "Ditto" to one or another British party's creed we might as well become resigned to a perpetual provincialism too big to be dignified, too disconnected to be national, incapable of being imperial.

Rousing Rooseveltism.
Col. George Harvey, editor of Harper's Weekly, delivered a remarkable address to the National Dramatic Club in New York. Replying to a toast, he made a speech in the shape of a sermon, taking his text from the tenth of Ecclesiastes: "Woe to thee, O land, when thy king is a child." The beginning of the words of his mouth is foolishness, and the end of his talk is mischiefous madness." Col. Harvey applied this text to the United States and its impetuous president. He referred to Mr. Roosevelt as a mischievous child with a position so secretly, noisy, confused, contradictory, inconsistent, illogical, irrational. As might be expected, the colonel's "sermon" is provoking spirited comment in the press.
After 100 Years.
A Massachusetts man having only \$100 to leave behind him, will that the money be invested, and at the end of a hundred years, it with its accumulated interest, should go to charity. The time is now up, and \$19,431.72 will be handed to the Town of Goshen and the parish of the Congregational church of that place.
