

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS Any even numbered section of Dominer Cands in Manitoba or the Northover 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry or in-pection must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent Sub-agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are secived by mail. In case of "personation" the entry will be summarily cancelled and the applicant will forfest all priority of claim. An applicant for inspection must be eligible for homestead entry, and only pne application for inspection will be eccived from an individual until that pplication has been disposed of.

A homesteader whose entry is in good

claration of abandonment.

Where an entry is summarily cancelled or voluntarily abandoned, subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for inspection will be entitled to prior right of entry.

Applicants for inspection must state in hat particulars the homesteader is in default, and if subsequently the statement is found to be incorrect in material particulars, the applicant will lose any prior right of re-entry should the land become vacant, or if entry has been granted it may be summarily tancelled.

Duties—A settler is required to perform the conditions under one of the following plans:— (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such homesteader the requirement as to residence may be attaited by such person residing with the father or mother.

the father or mother.

(8) If the settler has his permanent esidence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirement may be satisfied by residence upon such land.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.
