NURSING MANIA IN CANADA.

If They Can Endure Strain Fit Here.

In his recent address to the graduating class of nurses in London, Ont., Dr. McCallum made a few telling remarks, regarding the nursing profession.

Canada, he said, was overrun by an epidemic of nursing mania, which is taking hold of the best womanhood of our land. American hospitals are full of Canadian girls in training. He thought that mothers should use their influence in the direction of their daughters, and if it were really their vocation to become nurses, they should train in Canadian schools.

Many of the girls were physically unfit for the hard work of training, and fifty per cent. of those American graduates are broken in health when they are through. A great many girls become nurses with no intention of remaining in the profession, apparently laboring under the impression that they are better fitted for matrimony after becoming nurses. To the doctor it seemed that they might far better save themselves the hard course of training.
