A GALLOWAY MYSTERY.

John Lee's Remarkable Experience on the Scaffold.

London, June 1.—The most remarkable case ever witnessed on the gallows took place early on the morning of February 23rd, 1885, a considerable crowd of people gathered before the grim front of Exeter prison. It was a silent crowd, shivering in the wind that blew around those frowning walls on that dull misty morning, and it was all bent on a flagstaff which stood bare. They were waiting for a flag to be hoisted; the terrible black flag which should announce that justice had been done on a murderer.

BRUTALLY BEATEN

THE FATHER IS UNDER ARREST—THE CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY IS IN CHARGE—FATHER HAD BEEN IN PRISON.

On Tuesday afternoon, Chief Graham was summoned to the home of George Ferrington, West Napac, on a complaint made by a neighbor that he was inhumanly beating his little daughter, Ethel, aged six years. On the chief's arrival he found the little girl and an idiotic brother, the father having gone down town. The father was taken into custody and placed in the lock-up. He was given a hearing, on Wednesday, before Police Magistrate Rankin, two medical men were sworn in, a more thorough bruising than what this six-year-old little girl bears.

ENORMOUS LEGAL FEES.

Said to Have Been Paid United States Lawyers.

Toronto Saturday Night. The newspapers of the United States refer to Mr. Delmas as a second or third-rate attorney, because his fee in the Thaw case was only \$25,000. ... The list is astounding. That James R. Dill, of New York, received an even million dollars for settling a Steel Corporation dispute has been repeatedly asserted as a fact. The Willam Nelson Cromwell made \$1,000,000, or possibly \$2,000,000, by negotiating the sale of the Panama canal to a sub-roan assertion which has yet to be decided. Before a sub-committee of the Senate, Mr. Cromwell admitted having received \$2,000,000 and said he expected more. This is not Mr. Cromwell's first big fee. For reorganizing the firm of Decker, Howell & Co., in 1891, he received from the court \$200,000. He is said to have been paid a \$100,000 on another occasion. It is claimed that Mr. Dill, now a judge on the New Jersey bench, was paid a million dollar fee for arranging the purchase of the railroad by Andrew Carnegie and Henry C. Frick over the transfer of the properties merged in the United States Steel Corporation. A fee of \$500,000 was paid to a New York lawyer, William D. Guthrie, for breaking the will of the late Henry B. Plant, owner of a system of steamships, railways and hotels. Another large attorney's fee recently granted in court's decision at Seattle was that of Senator S. H. Pills, who had set \$450,000 in the famous John Sullivan case. In a contested will case recently closed at Milwaukee one firm of lawyers was allowed \$107,000, another \$50,000, and a third \$150,000. For a single argument before the United States supreme court, Joseph H. Choate is said to have received \$200,000. The effect of the argument was the declaring unconstitutional of the income tax.

Outside the production of New Caledonia, Canada supplies practically all the world's requirements, but these requirements become more and more each year, and new discoveries of the metal are not keeping pace with the increasing demand.
