IN COPPER WORKS

GOLD DISCOVERED IN BONNIE SCOTLAND.

Quartz, which Analysis Has Shown Highly Profitable, Found in Argyllshire, Edinburgh, June 4.—The remarkable discovery has been made that some old copper and lead workings in Argyllshire contain gold.

It is on the Stronachulla estate, Loch Fyne, of which the proprietor is R. Graham Campbell, of Shirvan, that the find has been made. The estate has an area of about 4,000 acres, consisting of grouse, moor, arable and wooded land, and is situated a few miles from Ardlathick.

The presence of minerals at this particular spot has long been known, and the presence of old copper and lead workings shows that at one time an attempt was made to put this knowledge to profitable use, though little was done beyond proving the existence of various lodes.

It is forty or fifty years, however, since operations were carried on, and at that period the presence of gold was unknown.

More recently the workings were examined, and as it was seen that they offered more than a fair prospect, a sample of the quartz was taken and carefully analyzed. It was proved that gold existed on this part of the estate, as well as copper and lead.

The quartz so far dealt with has been found almost on the surface, and the analysis has shown that it contains a very high value in gold, but there is still uncertainty as to how far it goes down, as no sinkings have yet been made. At present the whole project is in the preliminary stage, but it is understood arrangements are being made for finding out with tolerable certainty the extent to which gold really exists.

A trial shipment of twenty tons of quartz was sent to Swansea to test the value of the discovery from a commercial point of view, and the result was a ready sale.

DEATHS AT WESTPORT.

A Lad Fell Off a Wagon and Died the Next Day.
 Westport, June 3.—Thursday afternoon, Master Thomas Scanlan, son of Torrance Scanlan, a farmer, residing four miles from here, received injuries which resulted in his death twenty hours after falling from a wagon while driving from the mill with a grist. He jumped on to the wagon, which proceeded on the drive, and when he fell off, he struck his head on the top of one of the wheels, passing over his abdomen. He was hurriedly conveyed home, where a doctor attended him, but the injuries inflicted were of such a nature as to render recovery impossible. The affair has cast a gloom over the neighborhood as the deceased was a bright little boy and a favorite.

A. G. Treadwell passed away on May 31st, aged sixty-six years. He was born and lived here all his life. He was a wealthy farmer. Ill health caused him to sell his farm a year ago and come to live in the village. Richard Gaul, an old resident of this locality, died on May 30th, aged eighty years. His funeral on Sunday was largely attended.

Visit Cor Hill, But on Different Missions.


