### 'T WAS ONE ON HIM

#### YOUNG MAN'S CELLULOID COLLAR TOOK FIRE

Was Lighting Cigarette When the Accident Occurred—C.G.E. Employee's Narrow Escape From Serious Injury.

Peterboro, Ont., June 6.—A young man employed at the C.G.E. works and boards at a house in the south end of the city was the victim of a most peculiar accident on Monday night. After tea the young man and his room-mate were in their room dressing themselves to go out and call upon some friends. The victim of the accident had put on a celluloid collar and standing with his coat off went to light a cigarette. In some way or other the lighted match came in contact with the celluloid collar and before one could say Jack Robinson, the highly inflammable article was on fire. Celluloid burns with great rapidity and before the young man knew what had happened the flames were curling round his neck. His room-mate noticing the danger, grasped him at the back of the neck, and with one quick pull pulled collar and a good part of the shirt from his body. Had it not been for the prompt action of his friend the young man would no doubt have been seriously burned as he was too much surprised to know what to do. The flames were spreading rapidly to rest of his clothes, and had he been alone he would have been in a serious plight. As it was his neck was badly burned, and he had to have it bandaged up before he could go to work next day.

It is said that the cell on the young man was postponed until another night. The victim of the accident has forever renounced celluloid collars and in future his neckwear will consist of linen goods.

### A FLUCKY WOMAN'S DEED.

#### Sailed Miles After Vessel Was Cut to Waterline.

Newport, R.I., June 6.—Nerve and pluck are strangely characteristic of Mrs. W. G. Vanderbilt, judging from her experience on Friday, when her thirty-foot sailing vessel, the Caprice, was run into and set down almost to the waterline by the launch of Rear-Admiral John F. Merrill, U.S.N.

Mrs. Vanderbilt had been looking at the Chilean cruiser, Zenteno, and was making her way towards the German cruiser Bremen, when suddenly the navy launch started out from the latter and made directly for the Caprice. Capt. Knutson, Mrs. Vanderbilt's sailing-master, believed that the launch would change its course every instant. It did not, however, but coming, seemingly at full speed, struck the Caprice fairly amidship on the port side, causing a yawning hole in the hull forward of where Mrs. Vanderbilt stood in the stern.

"That was the most ridiculous thing I ever saw," was her indignant observation to Capt. Knutson, with reference to the seamanship of the navy coxswain. Then she made inquiries as to the condition of her boat, and feeling that it probably would not leak much, told the captain to decline all offers of assistance, and ordered him to sail for the yacht club-house, two miles away. Had the wind been a little rougher, or had there been just a ripple on the bay, the vessel would have filled and sunk almost before Mrs. Vanderbilt could have been transferred to another boat had there been one very near.

### Looking For Oil Sites.

Walkerville, Ont., June 6.—Oil speculators in Windsor, Detroit and this place have been securing options on large tracts of the township of Sandwich East with a view to exploring for oil. Some years ago the late Hiram Walker secured leases in Sandwich East, but as his oil and gas field, in the rich oil and gas fields of the township, were more promising he abandoned the work near home.

### Belonged To Brighton.

Brighton, Ont., June 6.—The self-confessed assassin of Ex-Governor Stoumenberg, at Boise, Idaho, ran a cheese factory about a mile west of here for a number of years. Not making a success of that, he left here for Vancouver, about 1890, and had not been heard of since until the present trial took place.

Fort Frances, Ont., June 6.—A serious accident occurred at Emo, on Tuesday. Charles Leary was left alone in the house, his mother having left him to pay a visit. Upon her return he was found lying unconscious with a gun beside him. Part of his face was blown away and one hand severely burned.

### TO DEPORT WOMAN.

Rochester, N.Y., June 6.—Immigration Inspector Martin, of the port of Rochester, who was authorized by the authorities at Washington to investigate the case, has recommended that Mrs. Anna Barrow, twenty-eight years old, of Kingston, be deported, which will be done as soon as the government's sanction arrives. The woman came to Rochester in February, was arrested on a charge of vagrancy and has been in the penitentiary since.

### Will Likely Become Principal.

In the event of the appointment of Principal W. S. Ellis, of the College Institute, as dean of the faculty of pedagogy at Queen's University, the likelihood is that E. O. Shier, M.A., classed at the institute for the past eighteen years, would be appointed successor to Mr. Ellis in the principalship.

### Principal Gordon's Candidate.

At the general assembly of the Presbyterian church, in Montreal, Rev. Dr. Campbell, St. Gabriel's church, Montreal, was nominated for moderator by Rev. Principal Gordon, of Queen's University, by Rev. S. G. Wick, of Nova Scotia. Rev. Principal Gordon paid eloquent tribute to the faithful services of the pastor of St. Gabriel's during his forty years' ministry at that church, and also to his distinguished scholarship, among other things, in scientific studies.

### SEVENTY MEN KILLED.

#### Contrabandist Captain Blew Up His Vessel.

Tunis, June 6.—A large sailing vessel, believed to have been Greek, approached the coast, yesterday, between Bihan and Raschadjar, and began discharging contraband. A French coast-guard observed the vessel's action, and collected twenty-four large cutters, manned by native fishermen. These surrounded the vessel at nightfall and kept watching her until dawn without approaching her. When day broke the fishermen were in the act of closing in on her, when a terrific explosion occurred on board. The captain had blown up his vessel, killing eleven crew and several men in the small boats. Altogether seventy men were killed. An inquiry held here failed to identify the vessel. The contrabandist to whom the powder aboard her was consigned is not known.

### WHAT ALD. CARSON SAYS

#### About His Attitude on the Aberdeen Street Sewer.

Alderman Carson, who has been attacked by his political opponents for stating in council on Monday evening that he signed the Aberdeen report of 1905 regarding the Aberdeen street sewer for the purpose of getting something he wanted, says that those who are barking at him know well enough what he meant by the under he wanted to get. That "something" was simply a few concessions for the residents of the ward which he represented, and nothing for himself. In order to get a little fair play for his ward he signed the report, because he knew that he was on the minority side and that it didn't matter. Now, however, he is opposing the construction of the sewer as most unfair to people in other sections of the city which are built up.

### Queen's Endowment.

It is stated that Toronto's contribution to the endowment fund of Queen's University, amounting to over \$36,000, will be provided to fund a D. J. Macdonnell chair of mental philosophy. The total amount received up to June 1st, is \$271,000.

### TO BE PROSECUTED

#### BOOKMAKERS AT HAMILTON RACE TRACK

Will Be Summoned For a Test Case—One of the Hand-Bookmen Found Guilty and Fined.

Hamilton, June 6.—It was announced this morning that it had been decided to prosecute the bookmakers operating at the race track, but neither the police nor the crown attorney will say anything about the matter. It is not likely that all of the layers of odds will be prosecuted, but that one or two of them will be served with summonses and a test made of their cases.

The trial of the handbook men, whose places were raided by the police a couple of months ago, was begun this morning. There are three defendants, William Carroll, Albert Omand and James Bayne. The case of the last named was the first to be taken up. He was found guilty and fined \$100. Omand was found not guilty, and the charge against Carroll will be tried this afternoon. The crown's chief witness is a Chicago private detective named Warner. He swore that he made several bets at Bayne's place to business and saw other people making bets. He won some bets and lost others.

### A PAIR OF PUZZLES.

#### Extraordinary Addresses Which Required Skilful Guessing.

Ottawa, June 5.—One of the compulsory pastimes of the post office is the deciphering of extraordinary addresses on letters. Some of the problems solved almost pass the limit of wrong-headed ingenuity on the side of the part of the first part, and of skilful, half-reasoning, half-guessing, on the part of the second part. Here, for instance, is one address which the department recently puzzled:

4009, Newfoundland.

If that were a newspaper puzzle you would use up a good many coupons before you solved it. In the end of the post office got it. It was "Fort Townsend," half-reasoning, in Newfoundland. Equally odd is the following:

18 Birds, Ontario.

This letter reached its destination correctly enough at "Hintonburg." The secret of getting at the meaning of these cryptic attempts at spelling seems to be to pronounce the strange appearance aloud, and possibly a bit thickly and inaccurately, as if by an ignorant man or a foreigner—or both combined—and then to see if there is any similarity between these sounds and a corresponding distortion of the name of some actual post office. The first case is an example; if you will imagine an uneducated Frenchman trying to say "Four Tonsen," the due to "Fort Townsend" is fairly obvious. It is an easy matter to do that of connecting a hasty, slovenly and aspirated pronunciation of "Eighteen Birds" with an equally absurd attempt at "Hintonburg." Naturally, in dealing with a letter of a man who never read, the look of a word is the last thing to be considered.
