MILITARY MATTERS

TO LOOK MORE CAREFULLY AFTER BAGGAGE

Of the Troops Coming to Camp—Horses to Detrain at Outer Station—Cedar Island Under Eastern Ontario Command.

Better arrangements are to be made for looking after the baggage of the troops coming to camp here. Formerly, the regiment officers failed to pay attention to this important matter, and as a result there was always a mix-up when the transport trains arrived. Nobody was an hand who knew where the things were, and sometimes it was the following day before matters were righted. The camp commandant, Col. Gordon, has notified the officers in command of corps to detail an officer to look after, and be responsible for the baggage.

The horses coming to camp will be detrained at the outer station, as the better facilities afforded there. Most of the troops will detrain at Tete de Pont barracks, and thence march to Barfield. It is likely that next year the G. T. R. company will be in command of corps to detail an officer to look after, and be responsible for the baggage.

A week from Monday next the military camp on Barfield heights will open for the next twelve days about 3,000 men will be trained in the art of war. An addition, will be the Prince of Wales Dragoon Guards of Ottawa, who will take the place of the 8th and 9th field batteries which formerly camped here and which now go to Petawawa for their training.

A STEAM YACHT SEIZED

For Debts Owing to Kingston Firms. The steamyacht Albina, owned by Dr. Wagner, of Detroit, who was formerly interested in the Frontenac Cereal company, Kingston, arrived from Detroit a couple of days ago, and was anchored in the harbor. Very soon afterwards she was placed under seizure by the sheriff, at the instance of several local business firms, to whom the owner was indebted when he left here, nearly two years ago. The Albina is 100 feet in length, and was formerly owned by W. H. Comstock, of Brockville. She was originally valued at \$30,000, and is now worth \$10,000 or \$12,000. It is understood that a settlement will be made. The Kingston Foundry company is one of the creditors.

A Tip To The Men.

The frock coat has ceased to be worn by men of fashion in London, and is relegated to bank clerks and dry goods store-walkers. It received its death blow some time ago, when a bridegroom belonging to the best set appeared at the altar in a cutaway coat.

For all ordinary social purposes the cutaway (called here the "morning coat") is worn as full dress for day-lights. The only occasion when the frock coat is still worn is when meeting royalty, as at a royal garden party or at Ascot. A man under fifty seen anywhere else in a frock coat is voted quite "declassé."

A SUDDEN DEATH.

John W. Bertram Passed Away on Friday. John W. Bertram, one of the best-known and most highly respected residents of Harrowsmith, died quite suddenly at his home there on Friday afternoon at two o'clock. Although he had been ill a few days his death was quite unexpected, and the news of his passing away was quite a shock to his friends at Harrowsmith and in Kingston. Deceased was well known in this district and held the respect of all who knew him. He had not been in the best of health of late, but was able to be around on the street and attended to business as usual up to Wednesday night. He was postmaster and undertaker for the village. Wednesday evening, while reading a newspaper, he was taken ill, and was compelled to take to his bed. He suffered from inflammation of the bowels.

The late Mr. Bertram was about sixty-five years of age, and was born in Frontenac county. For over twenty years he, with one of his brothers, ran a carriage works at Harrowsmith but of late he has been postmaster and undertaker. He was an ex-member of the county council, and was also identified with the Masonic order, the Oddfellows and the Workmen. He is survived by his father and his wife, but no family. Mrs. Bertram was a Miss McKim, of Newburgh. Deceased's father lives at Parham, and is now ninety-three years old. Three brothers and three sisters survive. George Bertram, Harrowsmith, is a brother, also William Bertram, of Parham.

The funeral will take place at Harrowsmith at one o'clock on Sunday afternoon, and will be conducted by the Masons. Members from the Kingston lodges will attend.
