Letter From Greater New York.

OLD DAYS RECALLED

BY THE OBSERVANCE OF MEMORIAL DAY.

Bitter Memories of the Rebellion Passing—Down at Coney Island—Hard Times Have No Effect on the Amusement Places.

New York, June 8.—Memorial Day met with a more general observance than it has for many years, but, looking back along the line of the old boys who wore the blue I miss the faces of comrades that bore the atter-level banners of their regiments through the deadly storm of battle. Their places in the line of march were vacant but the gracious and loyal memories they have left behind have made their names immortal. It is genuine pleasure to record that as the years roll swiftly by the bitterness engendered by years of treacherous strife is rapidly passing away and fate has decreed that sooner or later, the brave sons who bore the Stars and Stripes to victory, and those who met a terrible defeat shall lie down in peaceful sleep together, under the same green sod, covered by the same beautiful flowers, there to rest till the judgment call. Life is too short for continuance of cherished hates. "Blessed are the merciful for they shall obtain mercy."

I never realized how rapidly the memory of the rebellion is being forgotten until I read the obituary of Mr. Jefferson Davis and of General Joe Wheeler. Mrs. Davis accepted the inevitable with an honest heart. Her husband would have occupied a warmer place in the nation's heart than he does to-day if he had followed the example of his wife and not preferred to live in the memory of after generations as an example of unrepentant treason than be the recipient of an honorable pardon, freely given, which would have buried his heinous crime in the fetter of forgetfulness.

Mrs. Davis' body was escorted to the grave by the soldiers that met her husband's cohorts on the battlefield and left them there wounded or dead. The son of the brave soldier who saved the nation. He commanded the escort, and laid her in the grave with the highest military honors that could possibly have been paid to the most loyal woman in the republic.

Little Gen. Joe Wheeler, though only a boy in size, weighing but twenty-one pounds, had the desperate energy of a giant. At the age of twenty-one he was regarded the ablest cavalry leader in the confederate army. At the close of the rebellion he retired to Alabama. After some time he took the oath of loyalty and later was elected to congress. There he met Congressman McKinley, representing Ohio, who contracted a warm friendship for the former confederate general. On McKinley's election to the presidency he gave Gen. Wheeler an appointment in the army, and Wheeler declared that the happiest day of his life was that on which he was allowed to wear a federal uniform. He was promoted to vice in Cuba and the Philippines. He received rapid promotion, and after his death he was buried with all the honors of war, a part of his escort being the soldiers who had met him on the bloody battlefield of the rebellion, when he commanded the confederate cavalry. Also, Gen. Longstreet, who planned and commanded the tremendous battle of Gettysburg, loyally accepted the nation's pardon for his treason, and was provided with honorable service under the federal government.

It was these memories that helped to give the sacred holiday such a general observance. The character of this observance is changing every year. It becomes more secular than religious. Flowers are scattered over the graves of our patriot dead as of yore, and memorial services are held in most churches, but the larger number of excursions carry away thousands to see ball games and prize-fights. The rapid thinning out of the brave soldier who fought in the rebellion, and occasionally seeing among them an old confederate, puts me in mind of a circumstance that took place in Trenton, N.J., many years ago. When I was a boy, soldiers who fought in the revolution were growing scarce, and what few remained were held in especial reverence, and every Fourth of July, they were dressed in the old revolutionary uniform, and rode in front of the procession. For some years there was an old revolutionary soldier who had been brought out every year and treated with the greatest consideration. Free drinks and free lunches were showered upon him, and on this special day a number of young men and boys gathered around him, and kneeling at his feet and looking up into his face with reverence said, "Daddy, you were in the revolution, eh?" He answered, "Yah, I was there." "Now tell us—How did Washington look?" "I don't see dat man." "You were in the army and never saw Washington?" "No, I don't see him." "How was that?" "Yol, you see, I was on the side with the Hessians." His patriot claims exploded. Never after that was he seen in a Fourth of July procession.

Strange as it may seem, the 31st of May closed the spring season. Saturday was the usual half-holiday. Being cloudy, every body had money, and the first thought was to get rid of it. The day was cloudy and cool, but Coney Island, held out dazzling attractions, and although some days in advance of its usual opening 100,000 people traveled to the resort. The hotel and restaurant people prepared for a rush, but, the cool air was prophetic of hunger, and long before the last message man was retired from business, his stock all sold
