Ottawa, June 11 .- A careful study partment gives ground for the surmise that the result of the financial year, which ended on March 31st last, will be a surplus on the consolidated fund of \$16,500,000, and debt reduction of \$3,500,000. The finance department is busy now

djusting its accounts in order to close up the old year, and a good deal of the latest statement is taken with these operations. The revenue of 1906-07 now stands at \$67, 701,005; during May the adjustment of accounts, payments of rebates, getting in of deferred payments, etc., inreased it by \$562,410.
