Synopsis of Canadian Northwest
HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion
Lands in the Territory of the Northwest
Provinces, excepting 8 and 36, not reserved,
may be homesteaded by any person the sole head
of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to
the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres,
more or less.
Application for homestead entry or inspection
must be made in person by the applicant
at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent.
An application for entry or inspection made
personally at any Sub-Agent's office may be
wired to the local agent by the Sub-Agent,
at the expense of the applicant, and if the land
applied for is vacant on receipt of the tele-
gram such application is to have priority and
the land will be held until the necessary pa-
pers in complete the transaction are received
by mail.
In case of "personation" the entry will be
summarily cancelled and the applicant will
forfeit all priority of claims.
An applicant for inspection must be eligible
for homestead entry, and only one application
for inspection will be received from an indi-
vidual until that application has been dis-
posed of.
A homesteader whose entry is in good stand-
ing and not liable to cancellation, may, sub-
ject to approval of the Department, relinquish
in favor of father, mother, son, daughter,
brother or sister, eligible, but not more than
one, on being declaration of abandonment.
Where an entry is summarily cancelled or
voluntarily abandoned, subsequent to inspec-
tion of cancellation proceedings, the applicant
will lose any prior right of re-entry
except the latter being vacant, or, if re-entry
has been granted it may be summarily can-
celled.
Duties—A settler is required to perform the
conditions under one of the following plans—
(1) At least six months residence upon
cultivation of the land in each year dur-
ing the term of three years.
(2) If the father for mother, if the father
is deceased of a homesteader resides upon a
farm in the vicinity of the land entered for
by such homesteader the requirement as to
residence may be satisfied by such person re-
siding upon farming land owned by him in
the vicinity of his homestead, the requirement
may be satisfied by residence upon such land,
before making application for patent the
settler must give six months' notice in writ-
ing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands
at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.
SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING
REGULATIONS.
Coal—Coal Lands may be purchased at \$10
per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite.
Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by
one individual or company. Royalty at the
rate of ten cents per ton of coal mined shall
be collected on the gross output.
Quartz—A person entitled to a claim of gold,
silver, or copper, having discovered mineral in place, may
have the fee for recording a claim is \$5.
At least \$100 must be expended on the
claim each year paid to the minor interest in
lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended,
the claimer may, upon complying with the
requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per
acre.
The patent provides for the payment of a
sum of \$2 per acre on the date of the lease
mining claims generally are 100 feet
square, entry fee \$5, renewable yearly.
An applicant for a lease must dredge for
gold of five miles each for a term
of twenty years, or, at the discretion of
the Minister of the Interior.
The lessee shall have a decree in operation
within one season from the date of the lease
for each mile of reef. Rental, \$10 per annum
for each mile of reef, collected on the output
at the rate of 1-1/2 per cent, collected on the output
after it exceeds \$10,000.
