of Canadian Northwest HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres,

Application for homestead entry or inspecion must be made in person by the applicant
it the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent.

An application for entry or inspection made
personally at any Sub-agent's office may be
sered to the local agent by the Sub-agent, at
the expense of the applicant, and if the land
applied for is vacant on receipt of the teletrain such application is to have priority and
the land will be held until the necessary paters to comp'ete the transaction are received comp'ete the transaction are received

An applicant for inspection must be eligible or homestead entry, and only one application or inspection will be received from an individual until that application has been dis-A homesteader whose entry is in good stand-

ing and not liable to cancel'ation, may, subject to approval of Department, relinquish it in favor of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, if eligible, but to no one else, on hing declaration of abandonment. Where an entry is summarily cancelled or voluntarily abandoned, subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for inspection will be entitled to prior right of entry.

Duties—A settler is required to perform the conditions under one of the following plans;—

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader resides upon a face in the vicinity of the land entered for farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such homesteader the requirement as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING
