**STEAM LAUNCH SANK**  
 And Eleven Officers and Men Drowned.  
 Norfolk, Va., June 12.—The first serious mishap to mar the gathering of the warships of the United States navy, in attendance at the Jamestown exposition, occurred last night, when the steam launch of the battleship Minnesota, conveying from the exposition landing to the battleship a party of officers, who had been on shore leave, met with an unexplained disaster, resulting in the loss of eleven officers and men. The officers, all young men, had been spending the evening in a social manner, being the guests of an old-time Virginian dancing party. They left the party about eleven o'clock, and being joined by the launch's crew, proceeded into the roads to join their ship.  
 Admiral Evans, commanding the squadron is of the opinion that the steamer must have been run down and sunk as all trace of the tender had disappeared.

**Wandle's Wife Arrived.**  
 The murdered man's wife arrived about half an hour after the tragedy, but was prevented by the police from seeing the body. She was in a pitiable condition, and almost crazy with grief and excitement.  
 Boyd lived with a white woman in the upstairs of the old frame building at the northwest corner of Bay and Adelaide streets for three or four months. The woman was known to the other people in the neighborhood. "Mr. Boyd," she has not been seen around the premises for a day or so.  
 Boyd was employed for the past two weeks at the Grand Union hotel as a bootblack in the washroom. He didn't drink to excess, was quiet and peaceable, and was regarded as a good employee.

**Wandle's Previous History.**  
 Older residents recall the fact that when Wandle came here, a score or more years ago, he was the subject for several months of extradition proceedings, instituted by authorities of the state of Georgia, where he was wanted in connection with the assaulting of a boy on a railroad.  
 Before his escape from the United States lynching was threatened for him, and he spent a great deal of money fighting the extradition process, but he reached Toronto, being at length successful.  
**Lived in Kingston.**  
 Twenty years ago, Wandle lived in Williamsville, Kingston. His mother was a fortune teller. He worked at odd jobs, and left for Toronto when a young man.

**SHOT NEGRO**  
**One Killed Another in Toronto.**  
**EDWARD WANDLE**  
**WAS THE KEEPER OF A RESTAURANT.**  
 Boyd Who Shot Him is Said to Have Been Very Jealous—The Murderer Was Locked Up—Trouble Had Been Brewing For Several Hours.  
 Toronto, June 12.—With a bullet in his throat, Edward Wandle, colored, for twenty-one years the keeper of a restaurant in York street, Toronto, lies dead above his place of business. John Boyd, a colored man, was placed immediately under arrest on a charge of murder.  
 Boyd was about the vicinity of York and Queen streets, in the morning, "looking for Wandle," he said. He went into the restaurant, where a wordy war ensued between him and the murdered man. Boyd disappeared for a while, and then entered the restaurant again.  
 "Where's Wandle?" he asked.  
 "Upstairs," said a waitress.  
 Boyd sprang up the stairs, revolver in hand. He ran along the hall, first into the apartment of Mrs. Hawkins, a colored woman. Mrs. Hawkins saw the revolver. Boyd then ran back to a Mrs. Isaac's rooms, which he had to pass in order to get to those of Mrs. Hawkins.  
 He passed through a small room, thinly partitioned, and then up two steps into a room, which overlooks Queen street. Wandle, who had gone into Mrs. Isaac's rooms, turned and saw Boyd entering, and he fired. The bullet entered Wandle's throat, just above the collar bone. Death ensued instantly.  
 A Waitress' Story.  
 Oliver Bovey, a waitress in the restaurant, said:  
 "About twelve o'clock Boyd came in and asked Mr. Wandle whether a woman whose full name I do not remember, but whose first name I think is Leonie or Agnes, and who, I think, lives over a fruit store down on the corner Bay and Adelaide, was in the house."  
 "Mr. Wandle told him, no! and he said: 'You are a liar, she is.' They set down, and for quite a while kept threatening Mr. Wandle."  
 "Finally, Mr. Wandle told him to get out and took hold of him and put him out. When he got to the sidewalk I heard him say, 'Come out here and fight like a man.'"  
 "About half past one he came back, but he did not come into the dining-room, and I lost sight of him. Shortly after that hour Mr. Wandle said to me, 'I am going upstairs, so keep an eye on the place,' and he went upstairs."  
 "Within a minute or so, or perhaps less, I heard the shot, and I think there were two, upstairs, and we went upstairs and saw him lying there. I don't know who called the doctor, but he was there in a few minutes, but Mr. Wandle was dead before he got there."

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**IRISH FIGHT**  
**To Oppose Liberals in Parliament.**  
**BECAUSE OF A**  
**IN NOT GIVING BROADER MEASURE OF HOME RULE.**  
 John Redmond Issues a Statement and Tells How Home Rule Can Alone Be Won—To Get For Britain the Advantages Germany Has Secured.  
 London, June 12.—At a meeting of the Irish parliamentary party, in the House of Commons, yesterday, it was decided to fight the government, both in the house and in the constituencies, in order to punish the liberals for failing to give Ireland a broader measure of home rule than contained in the rejected Irish council.  
 After the meeting had adjourned John E. Redmond on behalf of the Irish party, issued a long statement, concluding as follows: "Another proof has been afforded that home rule cannot be won by a policy of conciliation alone. It can be won only by the hard fighting, vigorous agitation in Ireland, an active disciplined party in the House of Commons, thorough organization of the Irish vote in Great Britain, and its use absolutely independent of English party interests, to push forward the cause of home rule by taking every opportunity and every means offered in Ireland, and in Great Britain, to force upon public attention the grievances Ireland has suffered and the ruinous effects of British rule in that country."  
 Foreign Secretary Grey informed the House of Commons, yesterday, that the United States had officially assured the British government that she did not wish to make the administration provisions of the German commercial agreement the basis for discrimination against any other state, and was willing to apply them to Great Britain, if she so desired.  
 The secretary added that he was communicating with the board of trade with the view of making the necessary arrangements. Sir Edward Grey later announced that negotiations with the United States, the nature of which he was unable to disclose, were proceeding under section three of the Dingley act.  
 Replying to questions on the subject the secretary said he hoped to secure for Great Britain the same advantages as Germany had derived.

**SUMMER OUTING.**  
 President Roosevelt Leaves Washington For Oyster Bay.  
 Washington, June 12.—President Roosevelt left town, this morning, for Oyster Bay, the summer capital, where he will spend a quiet summer, and on the 29th of September leave Oyster Bay for Carlton, Ohio, where he will participate in the dedication of the monument of McKinley. The summer capital will be located as usual on the second floor over the grocery store of Moore, at the corner of Main and South streets. Secretary Lusk's home this year will be the pretty E. N. Townsend cottage, up the cove road, near Christ Episcopal church, where the president and his family attend weekly worship. The president's home, Sagamore Hill, is some three miles and a half from the village offices, and in order to keep the president in touch with the work of the administration as well as to secure the very necessary president's signature to commissions, orders, and important letters, the secretary will make daily trips to and from the Roosevelt residence.  
**LIVERPOOL'S 7TH CENTURY.**  
 Great Preparations Being Made For Its Celebration.  
 Liverpool, June 12.—The 700th anniversary of the granting to Liverpool by King John of the charter to which its rise is ascribed will be celebrated early in August with all the pomp and circumstance that its corporate officers and its citizens can devise. The arrangements have been in progress for some time, and are taking practical shape, August 3rd, 5th and 6th, have been appointed for a pageant, consisting of consecutive object lessons on the history and progress of the famous city. Its locale will be in Waverley Park. Many committees are working for the success of the celebration, and the corporation have voted £2,000 towards the expenses.

**GERMANS SICK OF CHILL.**  
 Kaiser Asks President to Cancel Contracts.  
 Berlin, June 12.—Because of a series of intolerable abuses, mainly connected with the small pay and the lack of "comradship" of the Chilean army, the Kaiser has asked the president of Chile to cancel the contract under which a number of German military officers are stationed at Valparaiso as instructors of the Chilean army. The emperor requests the president to permit the officers to return to Germany without delay.
