Synopsis of Canadian Northwest
HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion
Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Pro-
vinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may
be homesteaded by any person the sole head
of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to
the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres,
more or less.
Application for homestead entry or inspec-
tion must be made in person by the applicant
at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent.
An application for entry or inspection made
personally at any Sub-Agent's office may be
wired to the local agent by the Sub-Agent, at
the expense of the applicant, and if the land
applied for is vacant on receipt of the tele-
gram such application is to have priority and
the land will be held until the necessary pa-
pers to complete the transaction are received.
In case of "personation" the entry will be
summarily cancelled and the applicant will
forfeit all priority of claim.
An applicant for inspection must be eligible
for homestead entry, and only one application
for inspection will be received from an indi-
vidual until that application has been dis-
posed of.
A homesteader whose entry is in good stand-
ing and not liable to cancellation, may, sub-
ject to approval of the local agent, relinquish
in favor of father, mother, son, daughter,
brother or sister, if eligible, but to no one
else, on being declared by the Sub-Agent.
Where an entry is summarily cancelled or
voluntarily abandoned, the applicant is in-
stitution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant
for inspection will be entitled to prior right
of entry.
Applicants for inspection must state in
particulars the homesteaded in default,
and if subsequently the statement is found to
be incorrect an material particulars, the ap-
plicant will lose any priority of entry, and
the land will be held until the necessary pa-
pers to complete the transaction are received.
Duties—A settler is required to perform the
conditions under one of the following plans:
(1) At least six months' residence upon
and cultivation of the land in each year dur-
ing the term of three years.
(2) If the father (or mother, if the father
is deceased) of a homesteader resides upon a
farm in the vicinity of the land entered for
by such homesteader, the requirement of re-
sidence may be satisfied by such person re-
siding with the father or mother.
(3) If the settler has his permanent resi-
dence upon farming land owned by him in the
vicinity of his homestead, the requirement may
be satisfied by residence upon such land.
Before making application for patent the
settler must give monthly notice in writing
to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at
Ottawa, of his intention to do so.
REGULATIONS.
Coal—Coal Lands may be purchased at \$10
per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite.
Not more than 200 acres can be acquired by
one individual or company. Royalty at the
rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 pounds
shall be collected on the gross output.
Quartz—A person eighteen years of age, or
over, having discovered mineral in place, may
locate a claim, 1,600x1,600 feet.
The fee for recording a claim is \$5.
At least \$100 must be paid to the mining recorder
the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder
in lieu thereof. When \$200 has been expend-
ed or paid, the locator may, upon having a
survey made, and upon complying with other
requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per
acre.
The patent provides for the payment of a
royalty of 2 1/2 per cent on the sales.
Placer mining claims generally are 100 feet
square, entry fee, \$10.
An applicant may obtain two leases to
dredge for gold five miles each for a term
of twenty years, renewable at the discretion
of the Minister of the Interior.
Each lease shall have a dredge in operation
within one season from the date of the lease
for each five miles. Rental, \$10 per annum
for each mile of river leased. Royalty at
rate of 1 1/2 per cent collected on the output
after it exceeds \$100.

RETIREMENT OF HERO.

Colonel Mathias, Leader of As-
sault at Dargai.
London, June 12.—Col. Mathias, the
famous leader of the assault of the
Gordon Highlanders on the heights of
Dargai in the autumn of 1897, will re-
tire from the army under the age regu-
lation this week. Purchasing his rank
it was a critical moment in a fight
with the Afghans when Col. Mathias
said to his men: "Highlanders, the
general says the position must be taken
at all costs. The Gordons will
take it." And they did.
The regiment, to use the words of
Sir William Lockhart's official des-
patch, dashed through a murderous
fire, and in forty minutes scaled the
heights, leaving three officers and
thirty men killed or wounded on the way.
Among the wounded was Piper Find-
later, who, shot in both ankles, pro-
pelled himself up against a boulder and
piped "The Cock of the North" until
the Gordons had won the heights, and
he had won the Victoria Cross.
A good story is told of the steep
climb which the charge entailed. "Stiff
dumb, eh Macchie," said Col. Mathias,
who was breathless, to the color-ser-
geant by his side. "I'm not so young
as I was, you know." "Never mind,"
replied the sergeant, "we're gain-
ing, we're gain-"
Socialists Sweep Austria.
Vienna, June 12.—The houses of
parliament assembled to-day, with
the anti-Semites in the most power-
ful numbers. The spoils of the party
have gone to the factions that were
possessed of the best party organiza-
tion. This is especially the case with
regard to the socialists, who were
splendidly organized and they worked
hard. Their gains were principally in
the industrial centres of Vienna and
Prague, and in the German manufac-
turing districts of Bohemia and Moravia.
In the last house of delegates,
the socialists had only eleven seats,
whereas they now have already ac-
quired thirty-six seats, and they are
likely to get many more in the re-
balloting.

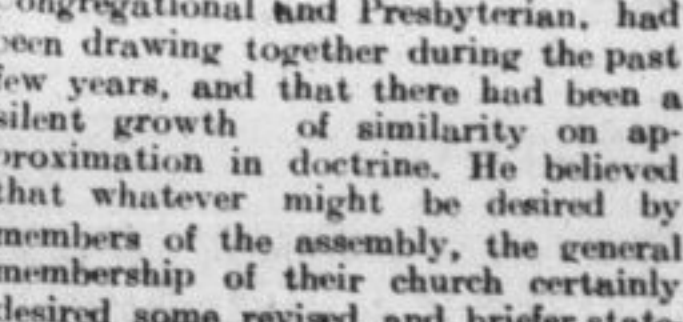
BEAT OUT OF \$3,000
GARDENER SWINDLED BY A
CONFIDENCE SHARK.

Trick Casket and the Old Story of
the Rich Relative in Poor
Health, Made An Easy Victim.
Montreal, June 12.—Paul Wattie,
a gardener of Outremont, is the vic-
tim of a confidence man, who called
himself Lagrange, and purporting to
be an immigration agent of the French
government, Lagrange unfolded a
smooth story to Wattie, who also
came from France, to the effect that
a niece of the latter, aged
only sixteen was lying in health, and
worth \$40,000.
For \$4,000 Lagrange promised to
look after Wattie's interests. After
considerable discussion \$3,000 was de-
posited as security until the titles to
the property were produced. On the
5th of May Lagrange called again,
this time accompanied by another al-
leged agent of the French govern-
ment by the name of Georges. As a
pledge of faith they left the titles
with the old gardener, and also left
his \$3,000 with him, putting both in
a casket and the casket into a bag
handing the garden to the latter.
Mr. Lagrange and Georges then left
the house, but after a short time re-
turned, Lagrange stating that he re-
quired the bag. He opened the bag,
and took out the titles. He gave it to Mr.
Wattie, and left the house. As the
two did not return, according to prom-
ise, Wattie burst open the casket
with an axe and found that his \$3,000
was gone. The casket he subsequently
examined and found that it was fitted
with two spring locks on either
side. On opening the bag Lagrange
pressed the spring of the casket and
in lifting it out the false bottom op-
ened and the money fell into the bag.
He gave the empty casket to the gar-
dener and walked off with the bag
containing the money.

JAPANESE PREMIER.
Lead the Party Founded By
Marquis Ito.



Marquis Kin-Mochi Saionji,
The new Japanese premier, Marquis
Kin-Mochi Saionji, was the leader of
the Seikoku Political association, the
party founded by Marquis Ito. He was
born in 1849. He studied in Paris
from 1870 to 1880, and came home
with western ideas of politics, that
startled the older Japanese statesmen.
He published a paper called "Oriental
Liberty." He was made minister to
Austria in 1885 and went to Berlin in
1887, but returned home finally to
take charge of the national board of
education. He held this post from
1894 to 1896, and then became minister
of foreign affairs. He was afterwards
created president of the privy council
of the Japanese empire, which he held
until called to the premiership.

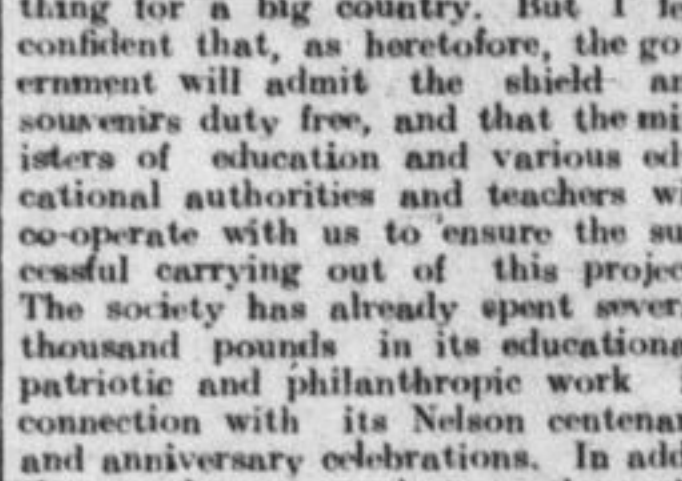
SPORTING NOTES.

VICTORY SHIELDS
ARE MEANT TO RECALL
NELSON'S MEMORY.

Generous Offer Made By Lord
Strathcona to Supply the
Shields to Every School in
Canada.
It will be interesting news in this
city to learn that the city schools
may be presented with a "Victory"
Shield by Lord Strathcona. In a let-
ter from Edward B. Matthews, secre-
tary of the British and Foreign Sail-
ors' Society, this announcement is
made. He makes a letter sent by
Lord Strathcona, making the offer.
The letter is as follows:
"Dear Mr. Matthews,—I am exceed-
ingly sorry that my official duties
make it impossible for me to be pre-
sent at the anniversary meeting of your
society this afternoon. You know I
am entirely in sympathy with the
work of your society, and it will be
my great pleasure to contribute
£1,000 for the purchase of provid-
ing a "Victory" Shield for the schools
throughout the dominion, to be dis-
tributed as you suggest.—Believe me
to be, dear Mr. Matthews, yours sin-
cerely, Strathcona."
Commenting on Lord Strathcona's
letter, Mr. Matthews says:
"The society has undertaken a big
thing for a big country. But I feel
confident that, as heretofore, the gov-
ernment will admit the shield and
souvenirs duty free, and that the min-
isters of education and various edu-
cational authorities and teachers will
co-operate with us to ensure the suc-
cessful carrying out of this project.
The society has already spent several
thousand pounds in its educational,
patriotic and philanthropic work in
connection with its Nelson centenary
and anniversary celebrations. In addi-
tion to the copper given to the soci-
ety by the lords of the admiralty, tak-
en from Admiral Nelson's famous bat-
tle-ship, Victory, all the copper left
from Nelson's other historic flag-ship,
Foudroyant, was secured, to be used
for the above purpose.
The sacred program made to the
admiralty when the material was given
was, that any financial outcome
should go for the benefit of seamen.
In carrying out, therefore, by the
assistance of Lord Strathcona, this
great project in Canada, we are an-
xious that every school, however small
in numbers, however far from the
frontier, shall have its "Victory"
Shield. But at the same time we
would like to receive, even from the
smallest school, not less than one dol-
lar for the society's work for seamen.
And every boy and girl giving or col-
lecting only twenty-five cents will re-

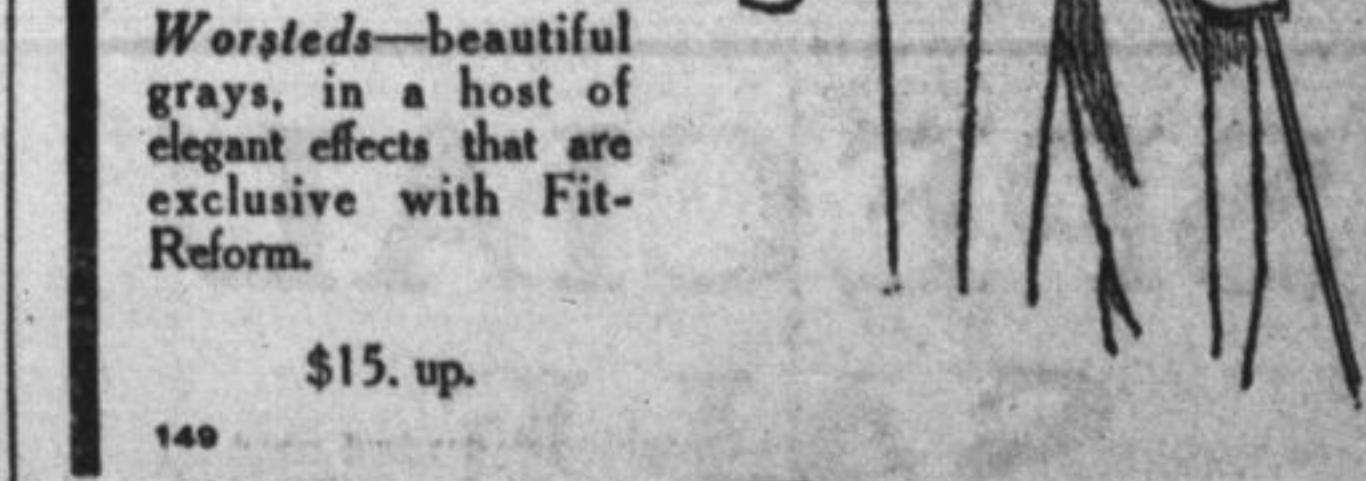

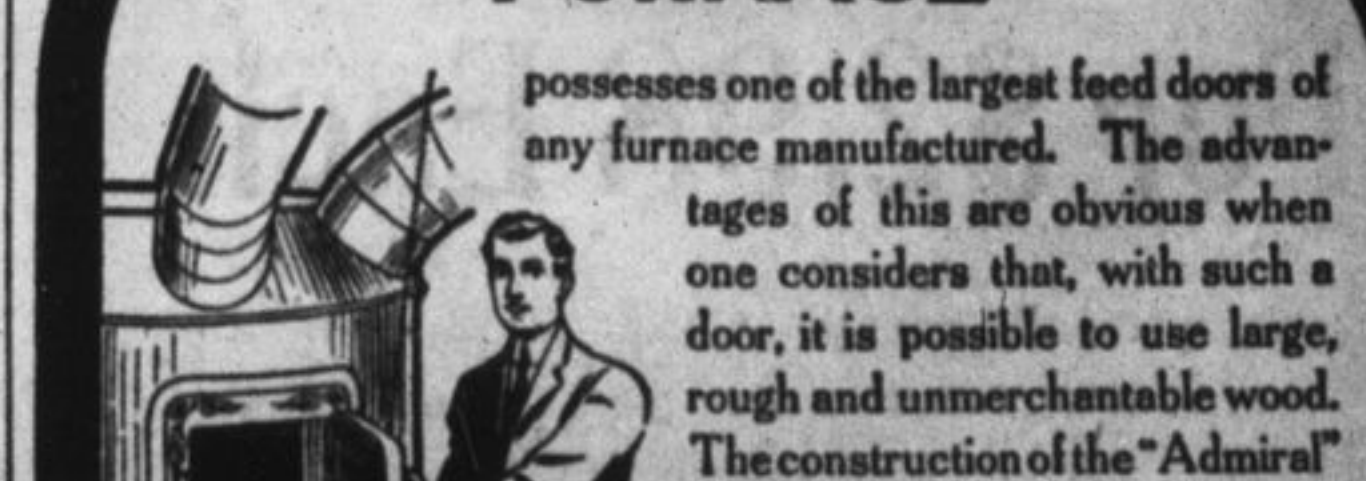
