WILL DISSOLVE
The Russian Douma Is
Likely To Go.

THE CZAR'S DEMAND
THAT THE SOCIAL DEMO-
CRATS BE EXCLUDED.
And That Sixteen of Their Leaders
Be Arrested—The Ultimatum
Was This or Dissolution—The
Lower House Rejected the
Premier's Proposal.
St. Petersburg, June 15.—Premier
Stolypin yesterday demanded that the
lower house of parliament exclude
from the house all the members of
the social democratic faction, num-
bering fifty-five, and sanction the ar-
rest of sixteen of their leaders, includ-
ing M. Alexinsky, Terrelli, Debap-
rino, and Drel, on the charge of en-
tering into a conspiracy to overthrow
the government and establish a demo-
cratic republic.
Continuing, the premier announced
that unless the house immediately
yielded, parliament would be dissolv-
ed.
The press and public galleries were
cleared, the police and troops took
possession of the entrance to the par-
liament building, and the house went
into secret session and debated the
question raised by the premier. It is
considered almost certain that his
demands will be rejected.
The lower house eventually declared
a recess until nine o'clock without
taking a vote on the government's de-
mand.
With only 130 opposing votes, the
lower house, last night, rejected Pre-
mier Stolypin's ultimatum, and re-
ferred the subject to a committee. Al-
though the committee has been in-
structed to report it is known in ad-
vance that the decision on the main
question will be adverse, and that the
douma will accept the recommendation.
In order to keep strictly within
the legal limits, the committee may
recommend the suspension of sixteen
leaders on condition that the govern-
ment disclose the evidence against
them; but there is not the slightest
expectation on either side that this
will save the situation.
An extraordinary session of the
council of ministers was held last
night, to discuss the decision of the
lower house. Up to a late hour no
report had been received of the do-
ings of the council, and no decree
of dissolution had been issued. The gen-
eral impression is that no edict will
be promulgated pending final action
by the lower house.

BULLET FOR HIGHWAYMAN.
Attacked Man Driving With His
Wife and Child.
Dalhousie, N.B., June 15.—On Thurs-
day Mr. Boyle, while driving with his
wife and child, was attacked, at Bal-
morale, by three men, who gave him a
severe beating.
Police Officer Seely, Dalhousie, went
to arrest them and one of the men,
Peter Fountain, took an axe and of-
fered to draw a revolver. In the
clinch it was discharged, the bullet
passing through the body.
Although fatally wounded the man
broke away, but was recaptured and
died a few hours later. The others got
clear and have not been recaptured.

THEY DIED TOGETHER.
A Society Woman and An Un-
married Man.
Berlin, June 15.—Dr. Franz Joseph,
son of a well-known financier, engaged
rooms, yesterday, while posing as
a stranger in Berlin. Soon afterward
a veiled woman arrived, and an hour
or so later shots were heard. The
door was forced and, lying a few paces
from each other, were found the
bodies of Joseph and the woman.
Both were dead, having been shot
through the head. Nearly two hours
later the woman has been identified
as Frau Gotthel, a prominent
society leader, who has a wealthy
husband. Joseph was unmarried.

Bucket Shop Bill In Operation.
Boston, Mass., June 15.—The bucket
shop law goes into effect, to-day.
This has put out of business a num-
ber of bucket shop concerns that have
thrived in this city for years. Most
of the houses will operate in a dif-
ferent manner than they ever did be-
fore, and all of the smaller places
will be more or less seriously affected.
The penalties are severe, a conviction
in a first offence being punishable
with a fine of one thousand dollars
or imprisonment of one year. For a
second offence the penalty is impris-
onment of not more than five years.
Continuance in business after a first
conviction shall be considered a se-
cond offence.

**Forest Fire in the Thunder Bay

RELOVED BY ALL.
Emperor Francis Joseph of
Austria.



**Emperor Francis Joseph I, of Aus-
tria, and King of Hungary, was born
on August 18th, 1830. He ascended
the throne on December 2nd, 1848,
and married the Duchess Elizabeth of
Bavaria, on April 24th, 1854, who was
assassinated at Geneva, Switzerland,
in September, 1898. The emperor is
most beloved by all the various
races and kingdoms which come
under his sway, and is universally
considered to possess unusual talent
for government and a most amiable
disposition. His heir is the Archduke
Franz Ferdinand. He is granted, ap-
proximately, \$10,000,000 annually,
half of which comes from the revenues
of Austria and the remainder from
Hungary.**

Rome, June 15.—It is stated that
France has informed Italy that a
treaty has been signed by France and
Spain mutually guaranteeing the Me-
diterranean and Atlantic situation. A
similar treaty has been signed by
Great Britain and Spain. The two
treaties are equivalent to a defensive
alliance between Spain, Great Britain
and France.

HAD HE DEAL?
Both's Friendship With
British Government.

NATIONAL REVIEW
DISCLOSES WHAT IT CALLS A
GIGANTIC SCANDAL.
Secret of the Friendship of the
South African Boer For the
British Government—A Big
Loan is Promised the Trans-
vaal Government.
London, June 15.—Under the title
"A Gigantic Scandal," the National
Review this month contains an amaz-
ing explanation of the evident friend-
ship between General Botha and the
members of the British government.
The National Review declares that
a bargain was made between General
Botha and the government, by which
he agreed to repatriate the Chinese
coolies now in South Africa in re-
turn for a promise that the govern-
ment would guarantee a Transvaal
loan of \$2,000,000. The following are
extracts from the article:
"On his arrival in England, General
Botha was approached by the Colonial
office and asked whether he would not
in return for Swaziland and past
favours, pledge himself to the repatri-
ation of the Chinese coolies as their
indentures expired. He replied he
could not make any undertaking of
the kind.
"When this answer filtered out and
became known to the liberal rank and
file, a large number of members of
parliament, supporters of the minist-
ry, signed a memorial, stating that
they would vote the Chinese coolies
were repatriated. The ministers, finding
themselves in a tight place, not being
willing to face their own debased and
angry supporters, and being unable
to coerce General Botha, had a happy
thought.
"The Transvaal was talking of rais-
ing a loan of five millions. The govern-
ment pledged the credit of Great Brit-
ain, guaranteed the loan, offer Gen-
eral Botha to save him one per cent.
equal to \$200,000 a year, on condition
that the 5,000 Chinese coolies be re-
patriated. This summer should be sent
back to China. This is the shady bar-
gain which under pressure of a party
revolt has just been concluded, and in
which the good name of Great Brit-
ain is disastrously involved.
"Every one who read the announce-
ment of the guaranteed loan rubbed
his eyes at the statement of imperial
help to our weathered and least in-
debted South African colony, and un-
til the story became known, the whole
transaction was a mystery."

ANARCHISTS IN DENMARK.
Police of Copenhagen Expel a
Noted German Leader.
Copenhagen, June 15.—The police
expelled to-day the German anarchist,
Niezich, aged twenty-six, who has
been employed for short time in a
suburb of Copenhagen, not far from
the royal summer residence.
The police received very serious in-
formation with reference to him from
foreign countries, and it was feared
that he intended making an attempt
against foreign sovereigns visiting the
Danish royal family during the sum-
mer. The police are watching other
suspected foreigners.

Silver Service For Battleship.
Newport, R.I., June 15.—The official
visit of the governor of the state of
Rhode Island and state officers, to-
day, brought to the battleship Rhode
Island her silver service, which was
raised by popular subscription. The
governor's party embarked, this
morning on the steamer at Providence,
and went to the battleship at
two o'clock. Governor Higgins made
the speech of presentation on behalf
of the state gifts. Capt. Brown re-
ceived the gift in a very graceful man-
ner, and the silver service was at
once set in the cabin of the battle-
ship, where the beautiful pieces se-
cured much attention and pleased com-
ment, as very rich and tasteful.

Manitoba Farmers Smile.
Winnipeg, Man., June 15.—Reports
coming in from throughout the west-
ern section of the country clearly in-
dicate that the crops are in a most
flourishing condition and growing rap-
idly. Wheat in the southern districts
of Manitoba is already about nine
inches above the ground and very
thick. Samples of wheat taken from
near Brandon show a growth of near-
ly eleven inches. In the latter case
the growth has been particularly fast,
and the same condition has been pre-
valent in other sections.

UTTERS A PROTEST.
School Books Are Not Clear
Enough on Theology.
Toronto, June 15.—In regard to the
charges made by the late J. Mercier
McMillan, that infidelity was taught
in the schools, and that the high
school geography incited the idea
that the creation was the result of
evolution, and that the man was
evolved stage after stage until he be-
came in his present shape, the educa-
tion committee report at an Toronto
synod meeting stated that these charg-
es could "hardly be substantiated."
It also set out as a lamentable fact
that the book contained no reference
to God, to religion, or to religious
faith and hope. A debate ensued, led
by Mr. Falconbridge, in which he said
a geography was not a book of theo-
logy no more than the arithmetic. It
was pointed out that the fact remain-
ed that the geography did teach that
creation was more a matter of acci-
dent than a plan by Almighty God.
By others it was contended that no
such ideas were intended, and this can-
ced the archbishop to utter his protest
against the implied facts as taught in
the book.

TO LOOK UP CASE.
A Young Man Drowned and An-
other Saved.
Ottawa, June 15.—A startling and
tragic story, in connection with the
mysterious disappearance of a young
man, named Levesque, comes from
Buckingham, Que. Levesque, employe
in the McLaren's Mills, at Lake Me-
Gregor, in company with a friend,
named Evans, left the mills on the
night of May 15th, to walk round the
lake to a point nearly opposite the
mills. Next morning Evans was pick-
ed up near the mills in a row boat
alone and intoxicated. He stated that
his friends had fallen overboard while
crossing the lake during the night,
and had been drowned. The story was
believed to have been false, but in-
vestigations, that have been made during
the last two days, show that the two
left the opposite side of the lake to-
gether on the night of the 15th, in a
rowboat, to start home. Both were
intoxicated. Constable Groulx, Hall,
and the local police of Buckingham
have, this morning, started to investi-
gate.

LOVE DIDN'T PAY DOCTOR.
A Woman Physician Charged Her
Fiance \$662.15.
Des Moines, Iowa, June 15.—Harry
Gray, a prosperous undertaker, was
recently stricken by fever, and sent to
a hospital, where he was placed under
the care of Dr. Georgia Bierney. Dur-
ing the period of recovery Gray told
the woman doctor of his love and his
affections were requited.
Later Gray was thunderstruck to
receive a bill from his fiancée for med-
ical services amounting to \$662.12.
Gray asked for an explanation, and
was told that professional ethics re-
quired that payment for services re-
quested be demanded, and that presents
of jewelry and bonbons belonged to an
entirely different realm of sentiment.
Gray broke the engagement, and yester-
day a suit for breach of promise
brought by the woman was settled out
of court.

TRIED TO BEHEAD 'EM.
Wire Strung Across Road in Bel-
gium Wrecks a Car.
Brussels, June 15.—A wrecker is ef-
fected by the authorities in Belgium,
the arrest of some miscreants who
yesterday, fixed a strong wire across
a road with the object of decapitat-
ing passing motorists.
The outrage almost succeeded. Fortu-
nately, the first car to pass was a
large cross vehicle, protecting the
driver and passengers from the wire.
The car was, however, wrecked, and
the passengers had a traumatic ex-
perience from serious injuries.
