Synopsis of Canadian Northwest

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Ontario, or the Yukon, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry or inspection must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent.

An application for inspection must be made personally at any Sub-agent's office may be made to the local agent by the Sub-agent, and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.

In case of "personation" the entry will be summarily cancelled and the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim.

An applicant for inspection must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for inspection will be received from an individual until that application is in good standing.

A homesteader whose entry is in good standing and not liable to cancellation may, subject to approval of Department, relinquish it in favor of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, or other person, but no one else, on being declared abandoned.

Where an entry is voluntarily cancelled, or voluntarily abandoned, subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for inspection will be entitled to the right of entry.

Applicants for inspection must state in what particular the homesteader is in default, and if subsequently the entry is cancelled, the applicant will lose any prior right of re-entry unless the land has been granted it by summary cancellation.

Duties.—A settler is required to perform the conditions under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months residence upon the land, and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased of a homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such homesteader, the requirement as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) The settler may obtain two leases to dredge for gold of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior.

The lessee shall have a dredge in operation within one season from the date of the lease for each five miles. Rental, 10¢ per annum for each mile of river course. Royalty at the rate of 1/4 per cent, collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.

FRIEND OF AMERICA

CHIEF JUSTICE SINGS IN A LONDON CHURCH.

Possessing Splendid Voice, Lord Alverstone Uses it in Choir of St. Mary Abbot's.

London, June 15.—To see the usually stern and dignified lord chief justice of England, dressed in soutane and surplice, leading the choir in a London church is a spectacle at once interesting and unique.

Despite the cares of his great office and the large responsibility which it entails, Lord Alverstone assiduously attends the services at St. Mary Abbot's, Kensington, every Sunday and takes his place among the somewhat humiliated members of the church choir.

His lordship is an enthusiastic musician, and possesses a really magnificent voice. Indeed, if he were not the highest legal functionary on the English bench he could make a fortune on the operatic stage.

During the recess, when Lord Alverstone spends his time on his estate in the country, he invariably sings in the village church, which, it need scarcely be said, is almost invariably crowded by tourists and other strangers impelled by the natural curiosity of seeing the lord chief justice of England in his element.

Like Lord Russell, whom he succeeded, Lord Alverstone is a great friend of America and Americans, and many members of the American bar have enjoyed his hospitality. He twice represented Great Britain in international arbitrations, in which he was leading American counsel and judge; first at the Behring Sea arbitration and afterward at the Venezuela arbitration. He has been an intimate friend of the representatives of the United States at the court of St. James, and, while holding them in the highest esteem, was particularly a close friend of Mr. Bayard.

IMPERIAL SECRETARIAT

To Be Presided Over By High Official.

London, June 15.—The Canadian Associated Press understands that steps will be immediately taken to bring into existence the permanent secretariat authorized by the recent imperial conference. It is to be presided over by one of the higher officials of Lord Elinor's department. It will be his duty to receive through the agents general in London notice of all questions which it is intended to bring forward on behalf of the self-governing colonies at succeeding conferences. There will then be carefully tabulated in Downing street. The official to be entrusted with this work will probably be selected from amongst those who have had practical experience at the conference just closed.

Oberlin, N.Y., June 15.—Mayor George Hall, of Oberlinburg, will give the city \$100,000 for a new academy building to be erected as a memorial to his deceased wife. The city must provide the site for the building.

Sermons In Esperanto.

Constantinople, June 15.—A German merchant who died at Cottbus, left \$25,000 to found a church in Constantinople for all denominations. The sermons are to be preached in Esperanto.

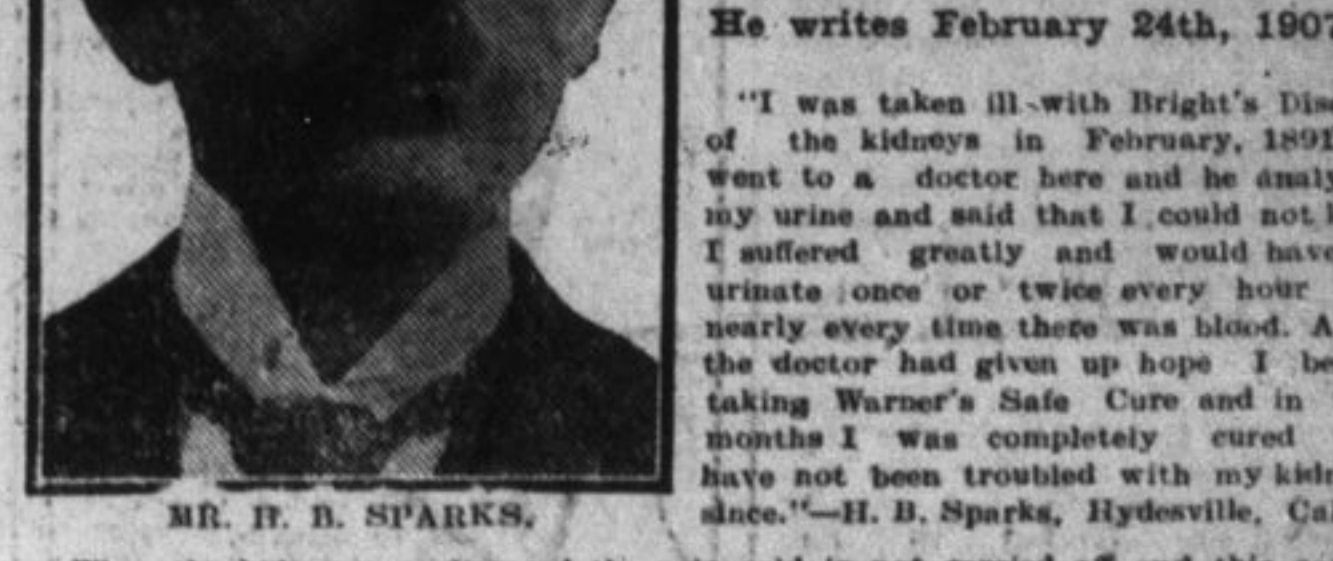
