## WAR ON OFFICIALS

### CHINESE REBELS LOOT THE CHRISTIAN MISSIONS.

**Movement to Overthrow Present Government is Growing in Two Provinces.**

Hong Kong, June 15.—The revolutionary movement in the provinces of Kiangsu and Kwangtung has assumed serious dimensions. The rebels have destroyed various European missions in the vicinity of Linchuan, but the German and British missionaries are safe at Swatow. According to an official report from Swatow, the rebels have secured a large quantity of arms and ammunition. All towns and villages in the disaffected provinces are being visited by revolutionary armies, and the people are rising and overthrowing the present government.

Although the revolutionaries have issued a proclamation disclaiming the intention of harassing Europeans, it is feared that the movement may assume later a distinctly anti-foreign character. The Viceroy Shun has sent 1,200 native soldiers to Swatow to reinforce the local garrison and the police. Chinese gunboats are also being dispatched, and the authorities at Swatow have been ordered to disarm all suspicious persons.

### MARINE INTELLIGENCE.

#### What is Transpiring Along the Harbor Front.

The yacht *Wagon*, from Detroit, is at Swift's, on her way up the Rideau. The schooner *Metzner* will clear, to-day, for Sodus, for coal, for the outer mill.

The schooner *Mary Ann Lydon* arrived from Oswego, with coal, for Crawford's.

The steamship *Nile*, with cargo *Vandergriff*, arrived, from Howe Island, with cargo *Humboldt*.

The Donnelly Wrecking company is still at work on the barge *Crawford*, sunk near the Brockville Narrows.

Swift's, Steamer *Kingston*, down and up, steamer *Humboldt*, down, to-night, steamer *Bideau King*, from Ottawa; steamer *Belleisle*, up.

The steamer *Caspian* is fitted out for the season's work, and will probably make a trial trip around the harbor to-day.

The barge *Mary Louise* is being loaded, at Richardson's, with oats, for Montreal, and will be towed by the tug *Neves*.

The tug *Trudeau*, with barge *Sir Richard*, and scows, arrived, at Crawford's wharf, to-day, from Belleville, and will be put into commission here.

M.T. Co.: The tug *Thompson* arrived, from Montreal, with two light barges, and cleared, for Montreal, with two grain-laden barges; the steamer *Iroquois* cleared, for Cleveland, the steamer *Pablo* is expected, to-night, from Chicago, with 20,000 bushels of corn; the steamer *Advance* arrived, from Montreal, on her way to Fort William, with package freight.

#### Had A Close Call.

W. E. Green, piano agent of this city, who resides at the Windsor hotel, was through an accident, last night, which might have ended fatally. He was coming in the York Road on his bicycle, and when opposite the Heathfield was overtaken by a team of horses attached to a conveyance, in which were two residents of the county. The horses were beyond control and before Green had time to dismount or get out of the way he was trampled underfoot. R. J. Reid's ambulance was summoned and the unconscious man conveyed to the general hospital, where Dr. Fogart attended the injuries, which consisted of several severe gashes about the head, face and limbs, as well as severe bruising to the shoulder and hip. Green regained consciousness in about an hour, and, to-day, is resting quietly.

#### Sheets Is In Trouble.

"Professor" O. S. Sheets, a dancing master, who taught in Kingston eight or nine years ago, is sought for by the South St. Marie police, charged with a criminal offence against a young girl, Miss Mabel Thomson, whose step-father and mother live in Toronto. The girl was a pupil of Sheets'. He took her to North Bay, where she alleged crime was committed. When the girl found out her condition she went to the Michigan Soo to her aunt. A short time ago a baby was born. Sheets is thought to be in Montreal. He married a Deseronto girl when in Kingston.

#### Grounds That Take The Palm.

The palm for uniquely kept grounds formerly was voted each summer to Queen's University. Now it goes to the General Hospital. The plot around the Nurses' Home draws the attention of all who pass. The grass is in healthy condition, and about three feet high. A burglar could hide in it with ease. At various spots, there are huge plants of a wild nature. ## HAGUE PEACE CONFERENCE.

### The Sessions Have Begun—Case of Armament.

The Hague, June 15.—The second peace conference opened here this afternoon, with a full representation of the nations invited to send delegates, but at once adjourned until Tuesday. The date was fixed as this day because the government of the New Netherlands stated that it could most conveniently entertain the delegates at this season. Baron Rosen was charged with the duty by his government of negotiating for the adherence of the South American states to the conference, and has used freely the machinery of the United States government to bring about a satisfactory result. It is required technically that the new camera shall, as a condition of admission, have adhered to the three great treaties resulting from the first Hague conference, namely, that providing for arbitration, the Geneva convention, and the rules for the government of maritime warfare.

The Washington authorities are disposed to regard as academic the dispute which have arisen between London and the Netherlands as to the question as to the limitation of armaments. In thorough sympathy with the British proposition to have this important subject considered at the conference, the Washington government appears to have read the same subject, namely, that it is one not included in the original programme, but which may be discussed by the conference if the majority of the delegates so desire. It is believed here that the explanation of the strong opposition made by some of the European powers to the British plan of making the subject for compulsory consideration is the reluctance of each of the powers to be placed in a position of perhaps single-handed resistance to the adoption of the much desired project of reduction and limitation of armaments. There is a curious difference in the conditions laid down for the adherence of the South American nations. As to the last two conventions any nation may adhere by simply sending formal notice to that effect to the permanent council at The Hague. But the first convention can only be adhered to by any one of the powers that signed the original treaty. So far as is known all of the South American states, with the exception of Chile, have not yet adhered to the first convention, but a single communication has been received from Turkey. That power attended through delegates the first Hague conference, but it never ratified the treaties that followed. So the question now is whether Turkey's assent is necessary to the South American contingent, which, of course, depends upon whether or not Turkey is regarded as a signatory power. Her attitude becomes important because she has not so far indicated any intention of taking part in the second conference or if she did what answer she would make to the South American application for admission.

### BANNERMAN'S RESOLUTION.

#### Dealing With the House of Lords.

London, June 15.—The government has issued the text of its resolution dealing with the House of Lords, which, as already announced, Prime Minister Campbell-Bannerman will move in the House of Commons to-day. The resolution says: "That in order to give effect to the will of the people as expressed by their elected representatives, it is necessary that the power of the other house to alter or reject bills passed by this house should be so restricted by law as to secure that, within the limits of a single parliament, the final decision of the House of Commons should prevail."

#### Good-Bye To Arden Family.

Arden, June 14.—The number that gathered at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Snider on Monday evening went to see the people that of Arden and vicinity realized that the removal of Mr. and Mrs. Snider to reside in Napanee, they were losing one of their best families. The farewell was all a surprise to them and everyone knew they would be welcome. An address was read by Miss Clara Dettler. A grateful reply was made by Mr. Snider. Addresses were delivered by the chairman, Dr. Geddes, Rev. Mr. Crow, pastor of the Methodist church, Councillor McGregor and C. W. Loyat. After ice cream and cake had been served by the ladies, the remainder of the evening was spent in exchanges of good wishes with Mr. and Mrs. Snider.

#### Likely To Go To Asylum.

Sandwich, Ont., July 15.—The most important case tried at the county court was that of Arthur Wrightman, charged with shooting his brother-in-law, George Hirsch. The shooting was not denied, but the defence put in a plea of insanity, which was supported by the medical evidence given by Drs. Sampson, Gow and Casgrain. On the doctors' testimony the judge declared the prisoner to be irresponsible for his actions, and remanded him till Wednesday for sentence. It is possible that Wrightman will be sent to the asylum for the insane at London.

#### Nose Bitten Off By A Rat.

Dublin, June 15.—A little four-year-old girl named Ellie Clancy, of Clonsilla, woke up during the early hours of yesterday morning crying from pain. Her father and mother found on running to her bedside that a rat had bitten off a part of her nose.

#### The Pope A Vegetarian.

Rome, June 15.—It is announced here that the pope has become a vegetarian. His holiness formerly suffered severely from gout, but he has had no attacks since January, and he attributes this to the fact that he has adopted a vegetarian diet.

#### A River For Sale.

London, June 15.—The Abbey Chase estate, Chertsey, including the Abbey river, is for sale. The river, which is nearly three miles long and romantically situated, flows round from Penton Hook to below Chertsey Weir.

## ON FIRE AND LIGHT

### BUSINESS BEFORE CIVIC COMMITTEE.

**Chief Elmer Asks to Be Sent to Fire Convention at Washington—Light For Wade's Lane.**

The fire and light committee met yesterday afternoon shortly after four o'clock, the members present being A. H. Ross (chairman), Nickle, Graham and Robertson. Communication from the chief was read, asking if the committee agreed with him as to the benefits to be derived from the convention of the International Association of Fire Engineers, which association contains not only the representatives of fire brigades, but also of the insurance and civic interests and holds its annual meeting at Washington, on October 8th, 10th and 11th next, when papers will be read and discussed about the lines and upon subjects of interest to the fire service in general. If the members did agree the chief asked them to authorize him to attend the meetings as their representative.

The question of finances was the main objection in the minds of the members, but as the communication had not come before the council it was decided to refer it to that body. The question of placing a light in Wade's Lane was next brought up and the letter from J. M. Campbell on the matter recommending that other than the suggested arrangements be made or that it be held over, till the rearrangement of the systems is concluded. The members of the committee all favored the placing in of the light, but did not see how it could be economically attended to. Ald. Graham held out for the light being installed but finally agreed to allowing the matter to stand over till next meeting. Mr. Campbell in the meantime to be asked for a further report.

### STRANGE COINCIDENCE.

#### Dates and Names in Case of Another Child.

Madrid, June 15.—One of the most extraordinary coincidences—or, rather, series of coincidences—that has happened of late years is reported from the Spanish town of Estella. Here on the 10th of May and at half past twelve o'clock the same day and hour as the birth of the Prince of Asturias, a woman named Victoria gave birth to a male child, who was inscribed in the civil register by one Don Alfonso Uguete on the same day and at the same hour as the heir to the Spanish throne.

The child was christened on May 15th (also the same day as the christening of the baby prince), and the sponsors were named respectively Don Pio (Pius) Fernandez and Dona Christina Luana. It will be remembered that the sponsors to the Prince of Asturias were Queen Maria Christina and Monsignor Rinaldini, the latter in representation of Pope Pius X.

### SEVEN MEN DROWNED.

#### Were Carried Over Falls in Saguenay County.

Quebec, June 15.—An accident happened yesterday, at Hamilton Cove, Saguenay county, which caused the death of seven men. The boat, with men working for C. P. Bardon & Co., started to cross above the falls when one of the canoes, containing seven men, got caught in the current and was swept over the falls. The men were all drowned. Up to the present time none of the bodies have been recovered. Four of the men, namely, Alfred Gagnon, George Quinn, Xavier Guerin, and Joseph Quinn are all married men and belong to Mills, Vaches, County Saguenay, and leave large families. The three others are single men named Philippe Chappard, of Paspébiac; Zenon Ois, of Little Metis, and George Campion, of Matane.

#### Medals 41 Years Late.

London, June 15.—Colonel Sergt. M. Flynn and Sergt. Maj. Wesley, both of Nottingham, have just received their medals for the part they took in the Fenian raid in Canada in 1866. In 1894 the Nova Veterans' Association took the matter up after the Canadian government had refused to grant the medals, and after three years the correspondence the medals have arrived.

#### Gambling For Ice Cream.

London, June 15.—Two ice cream vendors were fined at the Bowditch police court, yesterday afternoon, for gambling with their customers. It was stated that a coin was spun, and if it landed correctly he got the money and gave no ice cream. If he lost he gave the winner a penny-worth of ice cream and a halfpenny.

#### To Save Policemen's Time.

London, June 15.—The general purpose committee of the Holborn borough council has given directions for the preparation of a few sectional maps of the borough, mounted and framed, to be placed in prominent positions in the thoroughfares, for the guidance of persons not familiar with the locality.

#### Pleasures For Paupers.

London, June 15.—The inmates of Bowditch workhouse are to be entertained on various Sunday evenings during the summer to music by the Bowditch Heath band, and they will be permitted to promenade the grounds during the performance of the programme.

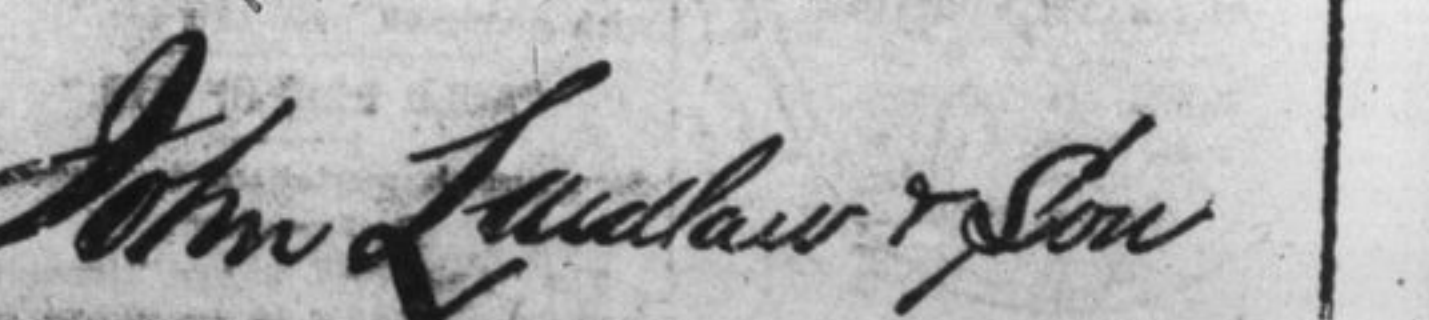
