AT SYNOD MEETING

DELEGATES AND VARIOUS COMMITTEES APPOINTED.

Warm Appreciation of the Work Carried on by the Women's Auxiliary—Some Additional Reports.

At the regular Synod on Wednesday afternoon, the following elections took place:

A report of the committee on the state of the church was presented by Archdeacon Macromine. The report stated that in so far as numerical advance it may be accepted as an index of church prosperity, the committee with much satisfaction, could report that the year just closed, ending April 25th, was more than a successful one. The committee congratulated the synod on having received returns from every parish and mission in the diocese. There had been an increase of 100 in the number of households. The Sunday school pupils and teachers showed a forward movement. In the matter of finances, the amount expended for building purposes exceeded that of last year, by \$13,000.

"The financial statement shows a balance on hand of \$697.00, part of which is accounted for by the receipt of the Lenten collections were only \$100 which in itself would be quite inadequate to meet the applications to the fund.

"As regards the Sunday school work in the diocese, a successful S.S. conference was held in Kingston during the winter. The bishop issued a pastoral calling attention to the days in compliance with the request of the committee last year. A suggested order of service with special psalms, lessons, etc., was also issued, which was, we believe, generally used, and which will be available from year to year. Your committee hopes that the clergy will use the opportunity of improving the importance of the Sunday school work on the parents and congregations generally.

"Your committee would again suggest the value of junior chapters of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew. They are proving themselves of the greatest service to many parishes and to the laity themselves.

"A letter was received from the Sunday school committee of the general synod. In accordance with the suggestions embodied in its year committee have recommended that the finance committee of the diocese be asked to provide for a grant of \$25 for one year as our share of the expenses of the Sunday school committee of the general synod.

Woman's Auxiliary Work.

Rev. W. P. Reeve moved, seconded by R. J. Carson, "that his highest desires to place on record its highest appreciation of the excellent service that the Women's Auxiliary of the diocese of Ontario rendered to the cause of missions, and particularly its sincere gratitude for the splendid donation to the Widows and Orphans' fund of the diocese amounting to more than \$200. And furthermore, that the synod desires to extend to the Women's Auxiliary its most hearty congratulations on the occasion of the foundation of the society, and hope for its continued progress under the divine blessing for the years that are to come."

The motion was passed by a unanimous vote.

The chancellor presented the report of a special committee, which heartily endorsed the bishop's charge. This report was adopted and filed.

A telegram was received from the bishop of the Huron diocese, acknowledging the receipt of the greetings sent by this diocese, and expressing the hope that the Great Father of all would direct the deliberations of the session of the synod in Kingston.

A committee composed of Rev. W. P. Reeve, J. B. H. Coleman, E. J. B. Pense and W. B. Carroll was appointed to prepare a report as to the status of certain churches in the frontier of Ontario, where part of the congregation live in the adjoining diocese.

On motion of Rev. C. A. French, seconded by W. B. Carroll, it was decided to send the congratulations of the synod to the bishop of Toronto on the occasion of his elevation as metropolitan and primate of the province.


Considerable time was taken up in the appointment of standing committees, although only a few changes were made in the list of last year. E. V. Rogers, the retiring lay secretary, was appointed a member of several committees, taking the place of Francis King, who succeeds him in his new position.

The report of the clergy superannuation fund showed total collections of \$1,141.75, with disbursements amounting to \$1,033.33, leaving a balance of \$108.33.

The report of the educational committee was presented by H. H. Bedford-Jones. Six students were reported to have been assisted during the year. The report also contained the following:
