### A BROKEN HEART

#### DESERTED BRIDE DIED AT ALEXANDRIA BAY.

Wife of "Ned" Francis, Who Mysteriously Disappeared, Finds Rest in Grave—Never Lost Faith in Missing Man.

Alexandria Bay, N.Y., June 26.—Edna Francis died at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Hazelwood, of Hopewell Lodge, Browning's Island, Saturday night, from typhoid fever.

Two years ago Mr. Francis went away mysteriously, leaving his young wife, after nineteen months of happy wedded life, in a state bordering on frenzy. The missing man has been advertised for and rewards offered, but nothing has ever been learned of him.

The young wife believed in her husband and felt sure that some sort of violent death had overtaken him, else he would have written her. Up to the time of the death the forsaken wife clung to the belief that her husband was true to her, and was lying buried in some unknown grave in some distant country.

"Ned" Francis, as he was familiarly called, came to Alexandria Bay seven years ago and settled upon an ownership farm. Handsome and promising, Francis was well known to have been well built, soon won his way into the confidence and hearts of everyone. Nobody knew from whence he came, other than that he claimed he left his home in Kentucky on account of a step-mother with whom he could not agree. He displayed marked business aptitude, and was long regarded as the Francis boatbuilding works, which did a thriving business. His sudden rise to prosperity was accompanied by the purchase of two fine properties on the outskirts of this village, and he was generally thought to be well-to-do.

On Monday, June 26, 1904, he left this place to go to Ogdensburg on business, as he informed his young wife, after kissing her several times and promising to return on Wednesday, at the latest. It was discovered late that he took \$1,500 with him, leaving behind debts amounting to large sums. Mrs. Lawrence Paint company, the largest creditor, instituted a search for him, but was never able to secure a trace of his whereabouts.

His young wife, almost frantic with grief, set out large sums of money pushing a rigid inquiry from coast to coast. Her efforts, which were without success, were followed by a gradual depression that resulted in typhoid and her death.

Mr. Hazelwood, a stately gentleman of the old English school, declared that Francis "won her heart to break it." Mr. and Mrs. Hazelwood formerly lived in Brooklyn, but moved to Browning's Island, on the death of C. W. Browning, several years ago. Their only child and daughter was the idol of the household, and when they moved here the attentions of Francis were received with indifference by the family.

The deceased was organist of the Wolfe Island Methodist church and a leading church worker. She was possessed of a noble and beautiful character, and was beloved by all with whom she came in contact.

#### WILL BE TROUBLE

If Another Member is Sent to Windsor.

Windsor, Ont., June 26.—The trustees of the B. M. E. church here, have decided to stand by their minister, Rev. O. H. McGowan, who has been expelled from the conference in session, at Brantford, this week, for alleged insubordination. The trustees claim that the conference had no right to expel their minister and explain that the church was not represented at the conference which last was illegal as it should have been held in August instead of June. Rev. Mr. McGowan's case will not expire until August, and if the church attempts to carry out the resolution of the conference and place another man in charge of the church there will probably be a row.

#### WILL BE JUDGE DAWSON.

Former Police Magistrate Elevated to Bench.

Winnipeg, June 26.—The despatch from Ottawa announcing that Alexander Dawson, ex-police magistrate of Winnipeg, will be appointed county court judge, is correct. Mr. Dawson will be gazetted shortly. He was dismissed from the office by the Roblin government after their accession to power, notwithstanding the fact that a petition signed by every lawyer in the city, with one exception, was presented, asking that his services be retained.

The death occurred on Sunday at Carlton Place of Mrs. (Rev. Canon) Burke. The interment took place at Belleville.
