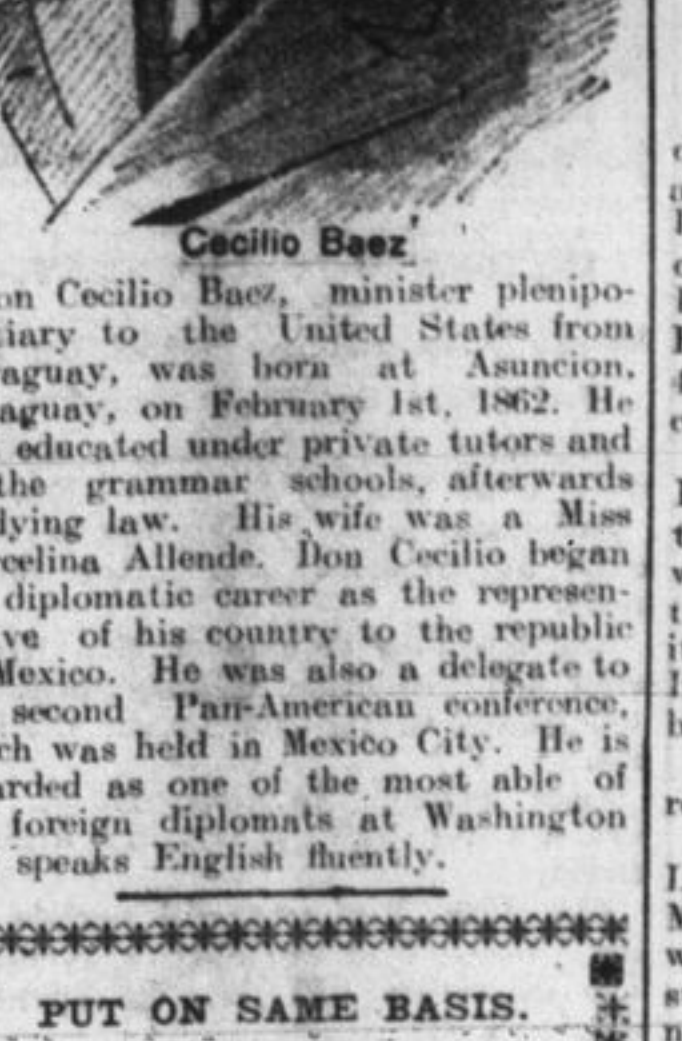
FUNSTON THREATENED.

FROM PARAGUAY.
The Minister Plenipotentiary to United States.



Don Cecilio Baez, minister plenipotentiary to the United States from Paraguay, was born at Asuncion, Paraguay, on February 1st, 1862. He was educated under private tutors and at the grammar schools, afterwards studying law. His wife was a Miss Marcelina Allende. Don Cecilio began his diplomatic career as the representative of his country to the republic of Mexico. He was also a delegate to the second Pan-American conference, which was held in Mexico City. He is regarded as one of the most able of the Paraguayan diplomats at Washington and speaks English fluently.

PUT ON SAME BASIS.
London, June 27.—The Tokio correspondent of the Daily Mail says that, apparently, an understanding has been reached by Japan and America that the existing treaty between the two countries will be announced by a new one in the near future. The new treaty is said to place her subjects on an equal footing with Europeans.

EXPLOSION IN SCHOOL.
Resulted in Several Being Burned and Cut.
Cornwall, Ont., June 27.—The science room of the Cornwall public school, during the afternoon of an accident on Thursday afternoon. An experiment was being made in the manufacture of ozone gas. Too much of the chemical mixture was put in the tank, and an explosion followed. The pupils were gathered around Russell Wood, who held the tube, and several of them were terribly injured. Wood's face, arms and chest were badly burned and cut by the flying glass.

Power For Motors.
London, June 27.—A revolution in the motor world is forecasted in an interesting article by Roger W. Wallace, K.C., in the current issue of the Car. The revolution is to come by the use of alcohol as a fuel instead of petrol.

Queer Bigamy Case.
Woman's Intentions Were Good, and She Got Off.
Brantford, Ont., June 27.—Judge Hardy discharged Mrs. Charlotte Worral, arraigned for bigamy. In 1905 she married George Pemberton, and, work in the evening, passed near, did she manage to attract attention. She was in a pitiable condition, but will recover. Sabinisky has been jailed until she can appear against him.

Snubs An Artist.
Berlin, June 27.—The German emperor is often as painfully critical as he is versatile. The latest victim of this trait is Herr Erler, a South German artist of distinction. His majesty was inspecting the New Kurhaus at Wiesbaden, when his attention was attracted by some frescoes painted on the interior walls of the building by Herr Erler. The emperor criticized them in a few drastically bitter words, and then, having expressed his displeasure in this characteristic emphatic way, turned his back on Herr Erler, who was standing near him. The disgruntled artist pleasure, and withdrew to the back-ground.

WAS CARRIED
Premier's Resolutions To Curtail Lords. **ABOLITION OF LORDS**
WAS NOT APPROVED BY THE COMMONERS.

The Unionists Did Not Take Sides on the Division For Throttling the House of Lords—Replying to Criticisms of Haldane's Army Scheme.
London, June 27.—The three days' debate in House of Commons ended at midnight, when Premier Campbell-Bannerman's resolution in favor of curtailing the power of the House of Lords, in voting bills passed in the House of Commons, was carried by 432 to 147, amid loud ministerial cheers.

CHAINED IN HOT SUN.
Exposed to Heat—Water Just Out of Reach.
Wilkesbarre, Pa., June 27.—Bound hand and foot, chained to a stake in the yard, and exposed to the scorching heat of the sun, Mrs. Michael Sabinsky, of Dupont, was rescued by neighbors. Her husband accused of the outrage, was arrested by the state constabulary and placed in jail.

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Approves Of Repression.
London, June 27.—A despatch from Lisbon, to the Express, says that Premier Franco's repressive measures seem to have the king's full sanction. More than 200 political prisoners are incarcerated in various fortresses. It is stated that the queen has applied to two foreign courts to use their influence with the king. The British minister discussed the situation with Senor Franco, in a long interview, on Wednesday. The editor of one of the suppressed republican papers has fled to Spain. He intends to publish his paper there and smuggle it into Portugal.

A Great Fire.
Berlin, June 27.—One of the largest fires Berlin has ever known yesterday destroyed the great warehouse and stables of the Berlin omnibus company. The whole fire brigade vainly fought the flames for many hours, but saved the adjoining Royal Victoria warehouse, where 2,000,000 were threatened for a long time causing fears of a terrific explosion.

Sailed For Quebec.
Boston, Mass., June 27.—Prince Louis of Savoy, Duke of Abruzzi, who yesterday received the degree of doctor of laws, at Harvard, sailed for Quebec, in the afternoon, on board of his flagship the Varese.

CLASHING IN MANCHURIA.
Tokio Begins Course Aimed at Peking Government.
Mukden, June 27.—Without waiting for an announcement for the policy of the new Manchurian administration, Japan, on the ground of defense of her treaty rights, has begun a programme apparently directed toward forcing action by China. It is reported that the Peking government already has asked to reopen negotiations toward reaching an agreement in the timber dispute. All Manchurian industries on the Yalu river are in suspense on this account.

SUCCESSION DUTIES.
Provinces Likely to Work on Common Basis.
Toronto, June 27.—The province of Ontario has completed a reciprocal succession duty agreement with New Brunswick, and it is understood to be the aim of Hon. Col. Matheson, the provincial treasurer, to seek to extend the agreement to all the other provinces, thereby completing a national and inter-provincial understanding on collections from estates.

NEGRO KILLS WHITE MAN.
Prominent Georgian Shot in Quasi-Riot Over a Hat.
La Grange, Ga., June 27.—In a riot on an excursion trail, Hal Brewster, son of Col. P. H. Brewster, of Atlanta, was shot and killed by French Early, a negro, yesterday afternoon. The train was crowded, many of the excursionists being negroes. Others took part in the trouble and the train was soon in an uproar. There was a movement to throw Early from the train, when he drew a pistol and shot Brewster through the heart. The negro fired several other shots, wounding two more persons, and then leaped from the train. He was captured late in the afternoon.

Mrs. Thomas Keys, Believed to Have Succeeded.
Cornwall, Ont., June 27.—A rather peculiar fatality is reported from Harmony, in the rear of Dundas county, where an aged lady, Mrs. Thomas Keys, was found drowned in a water barrel under circumstances which look like suicide. Her daughter-in-law, injured in a recent runaway accident, was unable to leave her bed and her husband and son were moping when the sad affair occurred. On their return they were horrified to find her body in the barrel. Mrs. Keys had been ill for some time and this is supposed to have affected her mind.

Omitted The Call.
Montreal, June 27.—The Allan Line steamer Virginian, reported by Marconigram one hundred miles southeast of Cape Ray, at 3.30 a.m., was about eighty-five miles off Sydney, at 6 a.m. Sydney being enveloped in a dense fog, the Virginian has omitted the Sydney call and is now on her way to land her mails at Rimouski, where she is due about 8 a.m., Friday.

Carried Off Furniture.
Detroit, Mich., June 27.—Visitors to Royale Isle report that the decks and sides of the Canadian steamer Monarch, wrecked on the island, last fall, have been burnt and that the swell of the cargo of oaks and wheat. The furniture and small effects of the steamer are said to be scattered through the homes of the residents of the island. Deputy Customs collector McCallum, of the Soo, was at Royale Isle, last week, to confiscate these goods.

Herd Killed By Lightning.
Opdenburg, N.Y., June 27.—When George Ellwood, a farmer living on the Edwardsville Road, went to the pasture, yesterday, to get his cows, he found that his entire dairy of twelve cows had been wiped out of existence by the electrical storm. They had huddled under a tree which was struck by lightning and all were killed. They were insured for \$25 a head.
