A QUEER GENIUS.

Does Not Care at All For His Wife.

Men of genius generally make bad husbands and too much learning is apt to breed indifference to family obligations. Of which the latest proof is furnished by M. Leon de Rosny, the venerable French savant and one of the most distinguished of living oriental scholars. His wife finds him to have got along with that she has begun proceedings for a judicial separation plus an allowance of \$100 a month. According to Madame de Rosny's story he is so absorbed in his studies that he cares for nothing else and arranges his life without the slightest regard to the convenience of other members of his household. In consequence his nearest relations have been compelled to leave him alone in his flat in the Rue Marcadet, near the French academy, and to retire to a country estate belonging to him.

He goes to bed at sundown and rises between twelve and one in the morning. Then he works at home until eight, when he usually goes out for his lectures at the Sorbonne or Oriental Language. He returns home at noon and again goes to bed for some hours. He suffers from indigestion and adopts a peculiar course to overcome it. He insists that a maid servant must sit in the bedroom while he is wearing the drowsy god. She is required, meanwhile, to remain absolutely motionless. She is forbidden to read because the noise made by the turning of the leaves would jar on the sensitive nerves of the savant. She must not say because the rustling of calico or cloth might disturb him. In what way her presence endures martyrdom can help M. de Rosny to go to sleep is his own secret.

So great is his horror of noise that he has purchased an entire apartment house and keeps every flat in it vacant except that occupied by himself. Not a sound must be heard in it while he is within doors. All the bells are stopped up with cotton wool. No member of his family dare intrude on his presence unless summoned by him. His son, a youth of nineteen, calls every day, but is forbidden to enter beyond the porter's lodge. There he receives sixty-eight cents daily allowance which his father makes him for pocket money.

SKYSCRAPERS OUT OF PLUMB.

Elevator Builder Explains Why Tall Buildings Lean. St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

"There are probably very few skyscrapers in St. Louis that are not out of plumb a trifle," said a St. Louis elevator constructor, the other day. "Most all of them lean to one side a little, although this does not show in any way and is not at all threatening, which are apt to cause this. It is generally due (if not excessive) to a shifting of the earth in its vicinity. It is not only in St. Louis (in fact, this city is among the very best for building skyscrapers) that this is the case. One of the older skyscrapers of the city is out of plumb almost twenty inches from top to bottom, yet nobody is aware of the fact.

"The way I have of knowing this is very simple. In installing a new passenger elevator in a modern office building we are, of course, compelled to figure and plan, and our job is a very delicate one. The elevator of an office building is like a clockwork, and its efficiency depends greatly upon the soundness of the walls and floors of the structure in which it is to be built.

CENTRAL CANADA FAIR.

Grand Attractions Arranged—Buildings Improved.

The directors of the Central Canada exhibition, Ottawa, for which the dates are September 13-21, inclusive, are rapidly completing arrangements for this great fair. High-class special attractions are to be put on every afternoon in addition to many new features and improvements in connection with the show proper. Probably one of the most interesting announcements is that Knabenshue will give exhibitions daily with his airship. Among the other daily attractions will be two trotting races and one running event every afternoon. The purses aggregate \$4,500.

Of interest to the farmer is the fact that in addition to \$15,000 in premiums, thirty-seven gold medals are offered as special sweepstakes prizes. As last year, there will also be demonstrations in up-to-date farming by experts of the Ontario government. With the exception of live stock, which will be permitted to be taken out at four o'clock on Friday, the 20th, everything will remain on the grounds until Monday, September 23rd. This move is in the interest of patrons who cannot reach the fair until Saturday, the 21st, which day will be second to none of the exhibition. As usual, a number of improvements are being made in the various buildings, all calculated to make the different displays more attractive.

The association, recognizing the popularity of the afternoon performances in front of the grand stand, will make this year's programme one that will attract old and young in greater numbers than ever. It is estimated that 100,000,000 people will be estimated.
