A MURDERER FREE

LIFE PRISONER RELEASED ON MONDAY

After Serving Twenty-two Years—Alexander Gillis Killed a Man in Nova Scotia in 1886.

On Monday, there came forth from the penitentiary a free man, Alexander Gillis, entered upon the books as a life prisoner. For the past twenty-two years he has been within prison walls. In 1885, he was arrested in Nova Scotia for murdering the killing of a man with a rolling pin. The facts of the case have almost been forgotten, but Gillis was at first sentenced to be hanged. Then the authorities saw fit to give his case further consideration, and the decree of death was changed to that of life imprisonment.

From 1885 to 1904, Gillis served in the penitentiary at Dorchester, N.B. In the latter year eight prisoners were transferred from that institution to the penitentiary here, and Gillis was one of their number. For the past thirteen years he existed within the prison walls at Portsmouth. In both penitentiaries he was a model prisoner, and though, probably in passion he once took the life of another, he was not a criminal, but one who desired to have a chance some day to redeem himself.

Several times he tried to get the authorities at Ottawa to take up his case, and grant him a pardon, but each time somebody seemed to block his efforts. Lately, the minister of justice, Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, looked into the matter, and decided to recommend that Gillis be released on parole. Accordingly, after twenty-two years expiration for his crime, Gillis became a free man on Dominion Day. He belonged to Charlottetown, P.E.I., where his family still resides. He will not return there. Instead, he left Canada and went across to the United States to begin life anew.

CITY LEAGUE GAME.

The Victoria's scored another victory.

In a City League game at the cricket field, on Saturday afternoon, the Victoria's added another victory to their long list, when they defeated the Royals by a score of 23 to 5. In the forepart of the game, the Royals did not appear to have a "look in," and only commenced to pull up when the last stages of the game had been reached. The Royals made some costly errors, and had not their batting clothes on. The Victoria's appeared in new white uniforms, which were quite natty.

Kingston Yacht Won.

In the sailing race at Gananoque, Monday morning, the Chrissy, of Kingston, won the cup for first place. Charles Macdonald's Heather was second. L. B. Sherry, of Kingston, won two heats in the canoe event. The open race for power boats was won by the Pirate, owned by Fogrook, of Pittsburg, Pa. This is the boat that won the same race at Kingston on May 24th.

There was to have been a cruising race by the Kingston yachts to Gananoque, on Saturday afternoon, but it was a fizzle. E. C. Gildersleeve's boat and two small craft were the only ones that started. The former crossed at Gananoque at 6.40 p.m., and Sears' Holi No More at 8.15. The latter had a handicap of two hours and twenty minutes, and thus won the prize.

Others of the local fleet started in the afternoon, but were caught by the squall, which arose after four o'clock. This had its minimal terrors, and had to run to the R.M.C. wharf for repairs. The others got shelter behind Cedar Island. Others of the fleet started on Sunday. Another squall was met with that evening, and most of the boats didn't reach Gananoque till Monday morning. All of the Kingston fleet were towed home, last night, by the steamer Where Now, reaching here at four o'clock this morning.

John Cochrane of Kingston, was the umpire. The same teams will play at Artillery Park, Kingston, on Saturday afternoon next.

A large number of Kingstonians sailed down to Gananoque on Sunday, for the races on the holiday. The sailors had a wet day of it, as it rained very hard all the time they were on their way. There was a very poor wind for the return trip yesterday afternoon, and it was early Tuesday morning before some arrived back in the city.

J.H. BRICKWOOD DEAD

HE WAS STRICKEN VERY SUDDENLY

On Monday afternoon and expired in a few minutes—Was Game Inspector For the Past Fifteen Years.

The death summons came very suddenly to James H. Brickwood, game inspector, on Monday afternoon. During the day he was about as usual, apparently in good health, and several hours before two o'clock, after having conversed with some friends on Princess street. While sitting in front of his house, on Ordnance street, he was taken with a fainting spell and fell over. He was carried inside and a doctor summoned, but death claimed him in a very brief space. For some years he was affected with heart trouble, resulting from rheumatism.

The deceased was a native of Kingston and lived here all his life. He studied dentistry when young, but never practised, following various vocations. For some years he conducted the Walpole house, on Wellington street. In 1892 he became attached to the Ontario game department, as inspector for this district. This position he held ever since. He was a keen angler and hunter, and was well known to the sporting fraternity of the rod and gun in distant places. He was a well-known figure on the streets, and was identified with the city's fairs and celebrations for years past. In the old-time physiog parades he was one of the leaders, and in religion he was an Anglican, and is survived by his wife, three sons and three daughters.

MARRIAGE IS VALID

ACTION OF MR. AND MRS. AGNEW DISMISSED.

Romance of Kingston Cadet Who Married Principal of Ladies' College—Meanwhile Bride Has Entered Suit For \$50,000.

In the Superior court, in Montreal, Saturday, Judge Davidson dismissed the action of Mr. and Mrs. William Agnew, Montreal, for the annulment of their son's marriage to Miss Gobe, principal of a ladies' school at Kingston. The story of the circumstances gave rise to the institution of this action, and the more recent developments read like a romance. Towards the close of the year 1904 August Waterloo Agnew, then a young cadet at the Royal Military college, Kingston, married Miss Mary Gobe, an M.A. graduate of Queen's university, who directly previous to her marriage was principal of the Kingston Ladies' College. Young Agnew was at the time only twenty years and six months old. With this as a pretext Mr. and Mrs. Agnew entered an action in the Superior court for the annulment of the marriage, maintaining that, as their son was a minor at the time he contracted the marriage, their consent was necessary before it could be considered valid.

Justice Davidson, in his judgment, took the ground, as urged by the attorneys of Mrs. Agnew, that once young Agnew came of age the parents' rights of action to annul the marriage lapsed. As a sequel to the action mentioned the attorneys of Mrs. Agnew, in severe months ago entered an action against Mr. and Mrs. William Agnew and their daughter, Miss Kathleen Agnew, for \$50,000 for the alienation of her husband's affections, alleging most cruel and inhuman treatment on the part of the three defendants. Mrs. Agnew, jr., elected to have this action tried by jury, and it will probably come up for trial during the fall term.
