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MEDICAL MEN HERE

ONTARIO MEDICAL COUNCIL IN SESSION.

Unusual to Meet Outside of Toronto—Dr. J. R. Dickson, of Kingston, First President in 1866.

The council of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, is in session in Kingston today. It is unusual for this body to meet outside of the city of Toronto, but through the efforts of the three Kingston members of the council, Dr. W. Spankie, vice-president, and Drs. Sullivan and Ryan, Kingston, was chosen as the meeting place for the annual session of 1907. The meetings are being held in the county council chamber, at the court house, a very pleasant locality, and close to Queen's University, which has been thrown open to the visiting doctors.

"The College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario" is the name

adopted by the medical profession of Ontario in its corporate capacity. As every legally qualified medical practitioner in the province is a member of this college, it is not an institution for the teaching of medicine. The medical profession of Ontario was first incorporated under this name by an act of parliament of Canada, passed in 1866. This act was subsequently repealed by the legislature of Ontario in 1897, and now the affairs of the profession in this province are regulated by an act passed in 1874 (37 Vic., Chap. 30), commonly known as the "Ontario Medical Act," and further amended in 1887, 1891, 1893, 1895 and 1902.

By this act, the council of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario is empowered and directed to make by-laws for the regulation of all matters connected with medical education; for the admission and enrolment of students of medicine; for determining from time to time the curriculum of the studies to be pursued by them, and to appoint a board of examiners, before whom all must pass a satisfactory examination before they can be enrolled as members of the college, and thus be legally qualified to practice their profession in the province of Ontario.

The council, moreover, has power by this act, to fix the terms upon which practitioners of medicine, duly qual-

AT THE POLICE COURT. George Lloyd is in Trouble Again.
