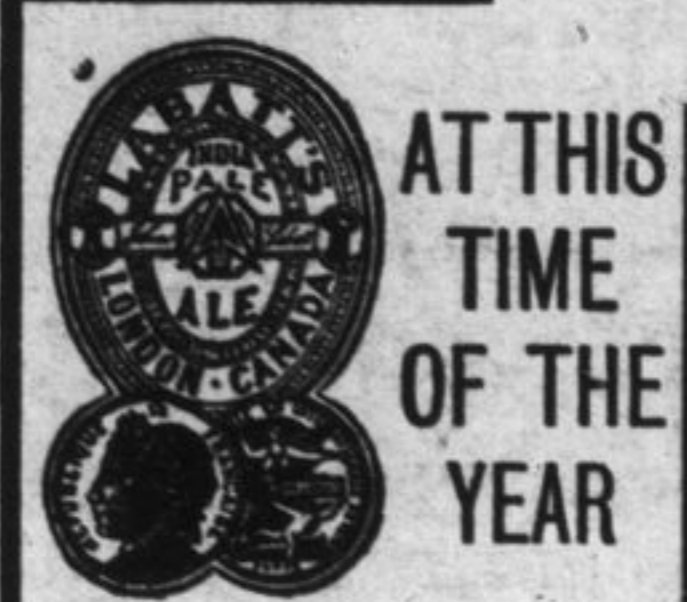

ENSURE SAFETY DISPUTE SHOULD NOT INTERFERE WITH SERVICE

Hugh Allan Talks About the Trouble Between the Government and the Marconi People—Systems Working Badly.

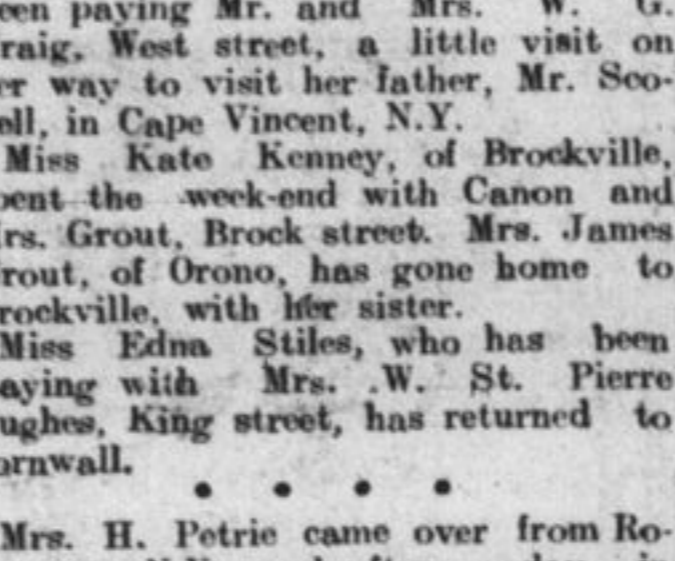
Montreal, July 3.—In an interview, today, Hugh Allan, of the Allan line, took the ground that a dispute between Superintendent Doure, of the government telegraph service, and the Marconi people, should not be permitted to interfere with the efficiency of the service erected to ensure the safe navigation of the gulf and river St. Lawrence.

The Marconi stations, in the gulf, are not working yet to the great disadvantage of the steamship companies, while some of the government telegraph lines, to make matters worse, are not giving a service.

The Richelieu steamer Prescott, while entering Lachine canal, last night, smashed the lock and was carried by the force of water into collision with the steamer "Havanna," of the Pittsburg and Erie Coal company, which sank its load of pulp wood.

The Grand Trunk's plans for doing away with the level crossings in Montreal, proposed an outlay of five million, half to be paid by the city, have been declined by the civic committee which had the matter under consideration as the plans proposed the closing of certain streets.

TO MEET GOTCH. Wrestle in Kansas City for a Purse of \$10,000.

Big Rapids, Mich., July 3.—Mrs. George Orr and Charles L. Chambers were drowned in Chippewa Lake by a fifteen pound pickled which had been hooked by the couple, running under their small boat, doubling the line under the keel, and overturning the boat.

HOME FROM NORTH. The Experiences of Two Toronto Men.

Hon. Nelson Monteith, minister of agriculture and Thomas Southworth, director of colonization, have returned from the north, where they had gone to select a site for an experimental farm. The trip had to be somewhat shortened because Mr. Monteith was overcome by the heat.

Two morning lectures began at the University of Toronto in connection with the faculty of arts and sciences. The session will continue until August 6th, and close the three following days with examinations.

The 14th Prince of Wales Own Rifles Regiment underwent inspection last evening at the armories. There were 36 officers and men on parade.

Can't Go As A Corps. The officers and men of No. 3 company, Canadian Army Service Corps, of Kingston, expected to accompany the 14th Regiment to Watertown, N.Y., this evening, but Lieut.-Col. Kent, of the 14th, refused to take the responsibility.

FITH OF THE NEWS. The Very Latest Gulled From All Over The World.

Thirty designs were submitted for the proposed \$3,000,000 departmental building at Ottawa.

A wreck is reported at Roslyn, Va., near Washington. Four are said to be killed and thirty-five injured.

The Bricklayers' Union, Toronto, voted against taking a "sympathy holiday" in order to assist striking members of the building trades organizations.

Seventeen Montreal shipping firms have accepted the arbitration of conciliation and have offered a bonus to men who work to the end of the season.

St. Louis and San Francisco limited passenger train, No. 105, which left Kansas City, on Tuesday night, for Memphis and Birmingham, Ala., is reported wrecked at Mansfield, Mo., twenty miles south of Springfield.

A dispatch to a London news agency from Odessa, says anti-Jewish riot was started by a Black Hundred gang, in Bulgaria street, during the night. The rioters used revolvers, killing two Jews and wounding several, including some children.

Kaid McLean, the Scotch command-in-chief of all the forces of the Sultan, is a prisoner of Raisuli, the Moroccan bandit, and being held at L'Hanas, Raisuli demands a ransom and a full pardon for all his misdeeds as the price of McLean's surrender.

Outrages Resumed. St. Petersburg, July 3.—Agrarian outrages which occurred last year, are breaking out afresh in the provinces. Official advice to the government that several provinces are aflame with an anarchistic propaganda, which has led to much incendiarism and riotous outbreaks, is repeated on land owners, in the Skopin district, of Rianza province, peasants destroyed thirty houses on the estates of M. Golodtchenko, a millionaire holder, killed all his sheep and slaughtered over 1,000 horses.

Another outbreak occurred in Magdalen province. The peasants attacked a party of government engineers, repairing a bridge, killing eight and wounding sixteen.

Racing At Henley. London, July 3.—Rowing strong from start to finish the Loander crew, today, easily defeated the London Rowing Club in the first of the great challenge cup contests on the Henley course. The Loanders are relied on to carry back the cup captured last year, by the Belgian crew Blackstaff, holder of the Diamond sculls trophy, was defeated by Captain Darrol, of the First Life Guards.

Made A Big Sweep. Dallas, Tex., July 3.—Messrs reports have been received of a tornado which swept through portions of Wichita, Baylor, Young, Taylor, Knox, and Haskell counties yesterday. Considerable damage was done at Wichita Falls, Okla., in Young county, and at Seymour, Rochester is reported as almost destroyed. Market, in Taylor county, is reported partially destroyed.
