London, July 5.—If the Standard is correctly informed Enrico Caruso will henceforth be entitled to write the letters M.V.O. after his name, the king, according to the newspaper, having been pleased to confer the Royal Victorian Order upon the singer in recognition of his artistic work in opera. There are five classes of the order. The class bestowed upon Caruso is not stated, but it doubtless is the fifth. It is stated that the singer Gilbert has been similarly honored.

### MANY CASUALTIES.

As a Result of Fourth of July Celebration.

New York, July 5.—The list of casualties, as a result of yesterday's celebration of the Fourth, is not yet complete, but seven persons are known to be dead, a half dozen dying, and hundreds of others are being treated at the hospitals for injuries ranging from slight burns, with the possibility of tetanus, to bullet wounds and lost limbs. Of the dead three died in premature celebrations, the others were killed during the day.

### Many Were Ruined.

Berlin, July 5.—It developed that last week's bank failure, at Marburg, due to the defection of the manager of the concern was more serious than at first reported. The losses are now said to total about \$1,000,000. Thousands of small depositors lost their savings and many tradesmen were ruined.

### Injury On A Trial Trip.

Toulon, July 5.—During the trial trip of the French battleship Justice, his victim, the main steam supply pipe gave way, and the steamer hole was at once filled with steam. A panic among the stokers followed, but fortunately only one man was injured. The trial was abandoned for the present.

## THE VICTIMS

Include Some of Montreal's Best Men.

### GATHERED \$15,000.

### THE NEAT WORK OF A CONFIDENCE MAN.

A Large Still Was to Manufacture Illicit Whiskey In a Subterranean Chamber—Fled and Will Not Be Prosecuted.

Montreal, July 5.—The man who caused the subterranean chamber and passage to be dug in the warehouse, back of Mr. McKeays' Dominion Street works, at 425 Visitation street, turned out to be one of the most accomplished confidence men Montreal has ever produced, according to the information furnished by some of the people who are very close to some of his victims.

It is estimated that he got about \$15,000 from the latter, which, even admitting that he spent about \$2,000 for the biggest illicit still that was ever made in Montreal, his warehouse front and his Italian labor employed in digging the subterranean passage, would leave him fairly good profit for a couple of months' work.

The beautiful part of his scheme, looking at it from a confidence man's point of view, is that he is almost certain not to be bothered by criminal or civil prosecutions, because the people from whom he got his money are all so badly mixed up in the conspiracy to make illicit liquor that they are afraid to net.

His proposed scheme, which is supposed to be absolutely confidential, and only made to that person, was to become partners with him in a scheme to make illicit whiskey.

He had all the plans arranged, he claimed, to make a thousand gallons a week. The still, one of the largest illicit stills ever manufactured in Montreal, was ordered, and he had secured a machine which was to carry on the operations.

The manufacture of whiskey was to be carried on under the cloak of a Canadian winery, the whole scheme was to be made from sour wine, which, experts say, furnishes a whiskey of sixty over-proof.

Nearly every man he approached him, but in most cases only a few dollars were advanced, the greater part of the money to be paid as soon as the plant was installed.

In letting his accomplices have a look at the machine that was to turn out their thousand gallons of whiskey a week, which was to be sold for three thousand dollars, he told them that he would have a small, inexpensive still on the premises for the revenue men to find in case they should be warned in some way or other of what was going on.

The thousand-dollar still, "Alabama," as they call it, French, cost eleven hundred dollars, and those who saw it say it was a beauty.

The cab finally arrived, but when the priest came to the church, he found Miss Arnbaw drew back as her brother approached to escort her to the conveyance, exclaiming: "I have changed my mind. I have decided not to get married."

The sudden announcement caused consternation among her relatives and friends. They endeavored to convince her that it was not the proper time to resist, but the young woman was obstinate, and, after trying to persuade her for half an hour to reconsider, her relative picked her up bodily and carried her to the cab.

The unwilling bride was hurried to the church, which was filled with guests, who wondered what was causing the delay.

It was expected that Miss Arnbaw would decline to enter the church, but she had evidently concluded that the easiest way was the best, for she assumed her part in the nuptial ceremony, apparently satisfied again with the step she was taking.

After the ceremony the couple were driven to the bride's home, where they were tendered a reception.

Assistant Secretary Truman Handy Newberry of U.S. navy department has been connected with the naval administration since early in 1905. Mr. Newberry was born in Detroit, November 6th, 1864, and was splendidly educated, taking the degree of Ph.D. at Yale University in 1885. He married Miss Harriet Josephine Barnes in Brooklyn, N.Y., on February 7th, 1888, shortly after being elected president of the Detroit Stock and Spring Co. Mr. Newberry has always been interested in naval affairs and served in the U.S.S. Yosemite throughout the Spanish-American war. He afterwards published his experiences under the title of "The Log of the U.S.S. Yosemite."

### RAILROAD TO GOOSE BAY.

Proposes to Build a Spur For Shipping.

Clayton, N.Y., July 5.—A few months ago C. G. Emery acquired a long strip of land skirting Goose bay near here, and upon this the millionaire now proposes to run a spur of railroad to facilitate shipping the Pieton Island granite. During the spring the refuse stones has been dumped on Goose bay at a point where there will be a dock constructed later. The granite will be brought direct to this dock and loaded on the cars. The cutting of the rail on the front at Clayton has been abandoned, the gang of operators being carried to the quarries each morning.

### HAYWOOD WITNESS KILLED.

Frank Schmeizer Jumped From a Moving Train.

Denver, Col., July 5.—Francis Schmeizer, of Silverton, Col., who, on Tuesday, was elected a member of the executive board of the Western Federation of Miners, jumped from a moving train, last night, and was killed. Schmeizer was on his way to Silverton, for a short visit prior to the trial. In the suburbs of the wood trial, he was discovered by the wrong train and jumped off, calling to the conductor to throw his grip after him.

### GAINING WEIGHT.

At the Rate Of 100 Pounds Per Year.

Pittsburg, Pa., July 5.—Suffering with the most pronounced case of obesity in the history of medicine, Mr. David Lynch, aged sixty years, is attracting scores of physicians to his home in State street, McKeesport. Five years ago Mrs. Lynch weighed 125 pounds, she now tips the beam at 250. The calf of her left leg is seven feet in circumference, or about two and a half feet thick. For months the woman has been unable to walk because of the size of her lower limbs. Her entire body is affected, and the attending physicians state that Mrs. Lynch has absolutely no chance of recovery.

### Request To Papal Delegate.

Ottawa, July 5.—Rev. Father Remillard, who died a few days ago, at Thurso, and who was buried in Ottawa, left a considerable estate. It is understood that the last will and testament of the deceased will show that he left \$25,000 to the papal delegate for purposes of the church.

### Disappointed In Love.

Winnipeg, July 5.—Dr. S. W. Astell has identified a man who committed suicide in Central Park as Israel Scott, of Elgin, Man., a farmer, reputed to be worth \$30,000. Scott, who was a bachelor, was disappointed in love, and came to Winnipeg recently to get away from his troubles.

### Dr. Jamieson Will Retire.

Durham, Ont., July 5.—It is announced that Dr. Jamieson, M.P.P. for South Grey, will not stand again as a candidate for the legislature. He has determined to retire from public life. He has been in the legislature since 1898.

### Winnings Of Canadians.

Bjaley, July 5.—The Canadian team, yesterday, beat the Royal Marines, six to a side, by 1,434 to 1,394. Lieut. McVitie and Sergeant Snowball made ninety for each. The Canadians also won a friendly match with the Uganda team.

## ALL RED ROUTE

The British Government To Aid It.

### AN IRISH ROUTE

PRESSED UPON ATTENTION OF AUTHORITIES.

Insisting Upon the Prompt Release of Gen. Maclean—The Color Line Drawn Against a Lad, Son of a Negro Father And an English Mother.

London, July 5.—The Telegram says rumor has it that the government is seriously entertaining the idea of granting a subsidy to the all-red route, £200,000 being mentioned. Many friends of the route across Ireland are vigorously pressing the advantages of that scheme upon the government.

The British government has communicated with the Moroccan government, demanding that prompt steps be taken to ensure the release of Kaiid General Sir Harry Maclean, commander of the Sultan's body-guard, who was captured by the bandit chief, and is being held as a prisoner pending the granting of Rissulf's terms for his surrender.

The British admiralty and war office have both drawn the color line against a youth born in London of a negro father and English mother. On the death of his parents the Strand board of guardians took charge of the boy, who has now grown up and desires to serve his country, but the authorities refuse to permit him to enlist in the navy or army.

A movement to raise a fund of half a million dollars has been started by the National Association of the Deaf in the United States.

James Thomas, who lives in the Dead End, west of Belleville, received probably fatal injuries through being kicked by a horse.

Albert Greenhill, charged with murderous assault on Lily Lynn, at Richmond Quay, has been captured. The girl is near death of a dose.

Rev. Dr. Sheagar has decided to accept the office of general agent of the newly organized Presbyterian Temperance and Moral Reform Association.

Rear-Admiral W. J. Thompson, U.S.N., retired, who has arrived home from a short stay in the Orient, predicts a war with Japan within five years.

### DUSKY MEMBER WINS.

Only Negro In Georgia Legislature Is Sustained.

Atlanta, July 5.—W. H. Rogers, the only negro member in the Georgia legislature, representing McIntosh county, has won in the contest instituted against him before the house by George E. Atwood, a white man, who alleged that he should have the seat of the negro member. Atwood declared that two precincts should be thrown out on account of technicalities. The case is all the more interesting because the present legislature will probably pass the disfranchisement measures. The committee on privileges and elections, however, decided in the negro's favor.

### DISCUSSES ALL RED.

Cannot Carry Mails Alone And Make Money.

London, July 5.—The News published an interview with the leading shipowner of whom it asked if the white labor clause difficulties might not lead to the adoption of the all-red route for carrying Australian mail.

The shipowner answered in the negative. A steamship, he says, cannot live by mails alone, except at almost a prohibitive cost to the authorities, and he emphasized the trans-shipment difficulties in connection with goods and passenger traffic on account of the coaling question on the Pacific route.
