REACHED QUEBEC.

THE S.S. STORMMOUNT HAS CARGO OF RAILS.

Sudden Death of the Wife of the Assistant City Clerk—Celebration of the Centenary of Birth of Garibaldi.

Quebec, July 4.—Mrs. Auguste Malouin, wife of the assistant city clerk of Quebec, died somewhat suddenly, yesterday afternoon, at Pointe aux Orignaux, Riviere Quebec. Mrs. Malouin was the fourth daughter of the late Lieutenant-Gouverneur Letellier de Saint Just.

The celebration of the centenary of the birth of Garibaldi which takes place in Italy, to-day, will be honored by the warship Varese now in port, with a salute of twenty-five guns. The ship is also dressed with flags and, this evening, the vessel will be brilliantly illuminated.

Steamer Stormmount, Captain Fraser, from Sidney, with a cargo of steel rails for the Transcontinental railway, arrived in port, yesterday afternoon, and moored in the Louise docks. The Stormmount is a new steamer built in Great Britain, last winter, for the Montreal Transportation company, and will be employed on the upper lakes.

An order was signed by Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, for the release of "Tim" Flood, the Toronto baseball player, sentenced to imprisonment for assault.

It is reported at Hong Kong that the Prefect of Wuyhan in China, tortured a number of insurgent prisoners by pouring burning resin on their bare bodies.

G. J. Griffin, Winnipeg, drug clerk, committed suicide by cutting his throat, and then jumping out of a second-story window at his boarding-house.

Dr. Edwin Grant Dexter, head of the School of Education of the University of Illinois, was appointed commissioner of education for Puerto Rico.

James Heddlstone, tried for manslaughter, at Hull, Que., for leaving an excavation on the C.P.R. work unprotected, so that a child lost his life by falling in and drowning, was acquitted.

SEEKS A RE-ELECTION.

Denial of New Trial Alone Will Block Plans.

San Francisco, July 4.—Mayor Eugene Schmitz, awaiting sentence under conviction of extortion, in an interview says he will be a candidate for re-election to a fourth term, and that he has already begun the preliminary work of his campaign. He declared that he is confident of winning at the polls and that nothing will prevent him from running, except the denial by the appellate and supreme courts of the appeal he is preparing for a new trial.

STUNG BY BUG.

Mrs. Honerest To Have Her Lip Lanced.

Toronto, July 4.—The case of Mrs. J. S. Honerest, Webster avenue, suggests that the risk of the kissing bug is not yet over. Mrs. Honerest was in her garden two weeks ago, when, as she thinks, an insect stung her just out of her lip. The wound gave her a lot of trouble and the swelling at last had to be lanced. Two doctors attended Mrs. Honerest, and for several days it was feared that blood poisoning might be the result of the bite. The language of this now seems to be past, but the case remains a puzzle.

The New Northern Farm.

Toronto, July 4.—It is understood that the experimental farm which the government proposes to establish in Ontario will be located near McLaughlin's Chute, about the end of Stouffville on the Tomkins railway. The matter will be definitely decided when Hon. Frank Cochrane returns to Toronto. The government will require a plot of ground one mile square.
