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CAPE VINCENT BANKRUPT.

He Names Damage Suit As An Asset. Morris E. Lee, a lawyer, at Cape Vincent, N.Y., has filed a petition in voluntary bankruptcy. Among the assets which Lee turns over to his trustee, to be appointed later, is a suit pending in the supreme court in which he is the plaintiff, and Joseph E. Gregor, Cape Vincent, the defendant. The suit was brought by Lee to recover \$10,000, alleged damage for injuries received in December, 1903.

Lee has debts of \$9,270 and assets of \$15,000 including the \$10,000 damage claim. There are two secured creditors, John Lansing, Watertown, as trustee, \$1,000 and Mary M. Crappotte, Brooklyn \$1,000. Both claims are secured by mortgages on Lee's interests in some real estate in Cape Vincent, which he values at \$4,200.

The unsecured debts of the bankrupt are for money advanced him on notes and necessities of life. Thompson & Co., of Watertown is a creditor for \$80.
