It is expected that the syndicate eighteen-rater will be launched next Monday. It is nearing completion, and another week should see it in the water. The sails are being made by Oldrick & Co. The crew will consist of five men, and the boat will be ready to get the yacht tuned for the racing circuit events, to take place during the week of July 22nd to 27th. Yachts from the six clubs will meet at Glen Island on the 23rd, a cruise to Kingston, where a day's racing will take place on the 24th.

Sporting Notes. Lacrosse on Saturday: Capitals, 8; Shamrocks, 6. Teanumehs, 8; Toronto, 1. Nationals, 5; Montreal, 5. Crusader, the Canadian-built boat, defeated the two English importations, Adele and Aileen, in the first Canada cup trial race at Toronto, on Saturday.

"Tommy" Burns, the Canadian world's heavyweight champion by virtue of Jeffries' retirement, and his defeat of Marvin Hart, Jack O'Brien and Sam Langford, was again at Kingston, where a day's racing will take place on the 24th.

The gross receipts of the Burns-Straight fight were \$28,251; of this amount Burns' share was \$8,000, which he was to receive, win or lose, as he refused to accept a percentage. Jeffries received \$1,000 as referee. Thomas Corbett, who handled the poolroom at Colma, estimated that \$72,000 changed hands on the fight.

The Prince of Wales has accepted the presidency of the All-England Lawn Tennis Club, and has promised to give a challenge cup to be competed for yearly. He leaves to the club's committee the decision as to the event to which the cup will be allotted. It will likely become an object of international competition.

Jeffries has announced that since the heavyweight pugilistic life remains in America, he will not venture beyond the States. He has declared the undefeated champion, he would have defended the title once more. "As long as I am able to fight the title will remain in this country," said Jeffries.

It is learned from friends of "Billy" Lush, the well-known baseball trainer who has just finished three years' service as coach for the Yale team, that he is out of baseball for ever because of injuries to his eye. He is under treatment at an eye hospital in New York as a result of taking of his dark glasses at the Yale-Harvard game in New York last Saturday. He may lose the sight of his eye.

At Troy, N.Y., the world's record for the 2,400 yards relay race was broken, at the athletic meet held in connection with the Independence day celebration. The team of the Irish-American, New York and Pastime athletic clubs took part in the race, the former winning the event, the Pastime being second, and the New York Athletic Club third. The time was five minutes four and three-fifths seconds, which lowers the world's record by seven seconds.
