Synopsis of Canadian Northwest HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres,

Application for homestead entry or inspec-tion must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent. An application for entry or inspection made sersonally at any Sub-agent's omce may be sired to the local agent by the Sub-agent, at he expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the teleram such application is to have priority and he land will be held until the necessary parents. ers to complete the transaction are received

in case of "personation" the entry will be orfeit all priority of claim. An applicant for inspection must be eligible for inspection will be received from an indi-vidual until that application has been dis-

A homesteader whose entry is in good standing and not liable to cancellation, may, subject to approval of Department, relinquish it in favor of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, if eligible, but to no one clse, on nung declaration of abandonment.

Where an entry is summarily cancelled or voluntarily abandoned, subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for inspection will be entitled to prior right of entry.

Applicants for inspection must state in what particulars the homestcader is in default, and if subsequently the statement is found to be incorrect in material particulars, the applicant will lose any prior right of re-entry should the land become vacant, or if entry has been granted it may be summarily can Duties—A settler is required to perform the onditions under one of the following plans:— (1) At least six months' residence upor ing the term of three years.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING Coal.—Coal Lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite.

Not more than \$20 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.

Quartz.—A person eighteen years of age, or over, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim, 1,500x1,500 feet.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5.

At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. The patent provides for the payment of a royalty of 2 1-2 per cent. on the sales.

Placer mining claims generally are 100 feer square, entry fee \$5, renewable yearly.

An applicant may obtain two leases to dredge for gold of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior.

The lessee shall have a dredge in operation within one season from the date of the lease for each five miles. Rental, \$10 per annum for each mile of river leased. Royalty at the rate of 8 1-8 per cent. collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.
