IS NOT TRUE

That Strained Relations Are in Evidence.

VERY WARM DENIAL

IS MADE BY THE TWO NATIONS CONCERNED.

Japan Has Made No Categorical Demands—An Interview That Has Been Withdrawn—Suggestions to Boycott Goods Made in San Francisco.

Washington, July 11.—From the state department and from the Japanese embassy here come swift and conclusive denials of the accuracy of the statement cable from the Hague to the London Daily Graphic, and reprinted in this country, to the effect that Japan has made categorical demands upon the United States government for satisfaction in connection with the treatment of the Japanese in San Francisco, and has served notice of her intention to deal with the Californians herself if the national government fails to do so.

ROMANCE OF FORTUNE.

Former Page-Boy's Windfall Of Nearly \$70,000.

London, July 11.—An agreeable surprise has just come to W. H. Collingwood, a refreshment house keeper of 1, Erie Road, Plymouth. He has received a letter from a firm of solicitors in Victoria, British Columbia, informing him that his former master, who died recently in Victoria, had left him a third of his estate valued at £40,000.

Collingwood was a favorite with his master (whose name he will not divulge), and he often told him he would not forget him. Eventually Collingwood entered the navy, rising to mess man in the service in 1890. When on foreign service he met his old master in the streets of Victoria and he never heard again from his old master. Leaving the service, Collingwood went into business but failed, and only recently opened a small refreshment shop.

Berlin, July 11.—Emperor William has granted provisional approval of the decision to the German Automobile club to construct at Eifel, Rheinhessen, a motor car race track five miles long and thirty feet wide, to be laid out over valleys, hills and bridges and around sharp curves and with other difficulties to render the course as natural as possible.

The capital required will amount to several million of dollars' subscription, which will be sought from leading automobilists and automobile manufacturers.

More Bequests.

Peterboro, Ont., July 11.—The trustees of the estate of the late Mrs. Nicholson announce additional donations to the institutions of the city, amounting to \$29,000. This amount includes \$5,000 to the Nicholson Hospital for requirements; \$3,000 to St. Andrew's Presbyterian church; \$3,000 to St. Paul's church; \$2,000 to Y.W.C.A.; \$2,000 to Y.M.C.A.; \$1,000 to the Children's Aid Society; and \$300 each to fifteen local Sunday schools for their purposes. The trustees of the estate, which has done so much for Peterboro, are Messrs. Richard Hall and Charles McGill.

Riding Master Killed.

New York, July 11.—Vincent Di Marco, a riding master at the Central Park Academy, who had taught the equestrian art to many of the society women of the younger set in New York, was almost instantly killed on the bridge path in the park recently. He was thrown from a skittish horse, and landing on his head, sustained injuries which he survived but a few moments.

OVER SIX MILLIONS.

Ottawa, July 11.—The census and statistics department has figured out the population of Canada on the first day of April of the present year. At the last decennial census the population of Canada was 5,371,315, so that in the six years there has been an increase of 1,133,585. It is kept in the department that the population of Canada will be over seven and a half millions when the next census is recorded.

From 1891 to 1901 Canada's population only increased 538,076.

MISERY IN HOME.

Husband Of Female Politician Seeks Death.

St. Petersburg, July 11.—The husband of one of the women members of the Finnish Diet attempted to commit suicide by falling from a window. He is said to be suffering from the result of his wife's neglect of her home that he decided to end his troubles by killing himself.

His wife was so occupied with political matters that she could not find time to look after her home. She received more than seventy-five dollars monthly as a member of the Diet, but she allowed him only about twelve pennies a day. He had no work, and his condition was wretched. He is a man of humble rank. The police say he is suffering from want of food.

A TEACHER FAMINE.

Kansas Short Because Many Have Married.

Topeka, Kan., July 11.—The city school of Kansas, according to State Superintendent Fairchild, who says Kansas is threatened with a shortage of school teachers which will be as disastrous as wheat crop.

He has heard from thirty-eight of the 105 counties and, basing future returns on these, there will be a shortage of more than a thousand teachers here hereafter. Twelve thousand teachers are required to conduct the Kansas schools.

Her Beauty Will Be Marred For Life.

Hagerstown, Md., July 11.—Miss Josephine Fay, the daughter of Samuel Fay, was the victim of a peculiar accident that will mar her beauty for life.

While she was helping her mother to make Easter pie Miss Fay fell and fell with her face in a pie that Mrs. Fay had just taken from the stove.

The young woman's face was frightfully injured, the scalding contents of the pie covering her from chin to forehead.

There Is Much Disorder.

Belfast, July 11.—The anticipated disorders growing out of the strike here have occurred. A van carrying freight to the docks of a Brazilian line steamer was seized by a mob and burned in the street. Another van was thrown from the dock, while still another, loaded with sugar, was held up, the bags ripped open and their contents strewn in the street. One white-lad van was seized but the whiskey was not poured into the street.

The riotous proceeding was arrested by the police.

Glad To Surrender.

London, July 11.—James Stewart Cather, bank clerk, has been rampaged on a charge of absconding with \$5,500 belonging to the Bank of British North America of Montreal. He surrendered to the police on Monday, telling the detective that he was sorry he left Canada, as he has been worried ever since.

OFF FOR NORTH POLE.

The Start Delayed By Damages In A Storm.

Spitzbergen, July 5, via Tromsø, Norway, July 11.—The balloon expedition of the Wellman Arctic expedition was delayed by a storm, on July 4th, and, although the airship was uninjured, the damage will delay the departure of the expedition. The Frithjof, which has been damaged by the storm, will be dispatched to Tromsø for repairs. All the members of Wellman's party are in good health. It is expected that the start for the pole will be made in the middle of August.

Trying The Mutineers.

St. Petersburg, July 11.—As a result of the recent mutiny at Kiev, Sebastopol, and Tarskoe Selo court-martial are in session in this city, and trying the mutineers.

At Kiev 101 men are being tried and forty are on trial at Sebastopol. Great secrecy is observed regarding the proceedings at Tarskoe Selo.

Purchased An Auto.

Rome, July 11.—Great surprise has been caused in various circles by the fact that the papal secretary of state, Cardinal Merry Del Val, has bought a powerful automobile. It was generally supposed that the pope would not countenance the cardinal's riding in motor cars.

THE WORLD'S TIDINGS

GIVEN IN THE BRIEFEST POSSIBLE FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

At Newington K. A. Fringle, M.P., was nominated by the conservatives. Robert Logie was arrested at the Union station, Toronto, on the charge of uttering counterfeit money.

Mr. Bourassa, M.P., does not deny or affirm his prospective entrance into Quebec provincial politics.

Her clothing, set on fire by lightning, Mary Irides, aged thirteen, of Paines Junction, N.B., was burned to death.

Voyagers blew open the safe in the Saghetto Harbor, N.Y., post office and secured about \$500 in stamps and money.

The United States government has entered action against over sixty companies, said to form the tobacco trust.

Six young men, sons of prominent families, were drowned in Penobscot Bay yesterday by the capsizing of a pleasure boat.

Charles H. Moore, president of the Western Federation of Miners, began his testimony in the Haywood trial, at Boise, on Wednesday.

Prof. James McGranahan, whose name is so well known in the Moody and Sankey hymn books, is dead, at the age of sixty-seven.

It is reported that Alexander Cholev, charged with poisoning Annie Horan, near Selkirk, two months ago, has confessed to the crime.

Andrew was sentenced, at Edinburgh, to twenty-one days, for embezzlement, committed two years ago, since when he has resided in Canada.

During a division in the House of Commons, Sir Alfred Bilson, member for the north-west division of Staffordshire, suddenly fainting away and expired.

The Donkhorstors are again on the march, but this time it is only a party of fifty, and so far they have not thought it necessary to take off their clothes.

The Board of Supervisors, St. Francisco, in special session, selected Charles Boston, a member of the board, to succeed Supervisor James J. Gallagher as acting mayor of the city.

Hon. Mr. Deakin has made a provisional agreement with the White Star line to establish a rapid service of steamers between London, Southampton and Australia, via the Suez Canal.

Senator Beique says the time has come when the Dominion government should pay as much attention to the training of technical experts as to the fostering of commerce and agriculture.

At Toronto Harley Montgomery, an electrician's helper, eighty-one years old, fell seven stories down an elevator shaft in the Alexandria Palace Apartments. He died later at Grace hospital.

Aime H. Bellevue, inspector of fisheries for the department of marine and fisheries, has been detailed by the department to investigate the complaints re the dumping of sawdust into the Ottawa river.

Sir William Henry Broadbent, physician-in-ordinary to King Edward and Prince Wales, and who for a long time attended the late Queen Victoria and others of the royal family, died on Wednesday. He was born in 1835.

THE MINES CLOSED.

Everything is quiet at Cobalt. Just Now.

Cobalt, July 11.—Most of the principal mines of Cobalt are shut down. There are no men left at most of them with the possible exception of the women at some, and those who are left to look after the pumps. Everything about the town still continues quiet, and there is no sign whatever of any outbreaks. It is reported that all the bars in the hotels in Haileybury and New Liskard are being strictly watched, and some of them are said to be closed. It is impossible to obtain any liquor in Cobalt these days. The authorities have made it known that anybody caught selling any liquor in Cobalt will be sentenced to six months' hard labor without the option of a fine. The good effect of this temporary law is very noticeable.

MAN'S ADVENTURES.

Duncan Galbraith Was Lost For Two Days.

Cornwall, Ont., July 10.—Duncan Galbraith, of Caledonia township, Prescott county, aged eighty years, got lost one evening recently while taking a walk, and wandered far into the big Caledonia swamp, where, along with his faithful dog, he spent the night. Next day he was wandering on and arrived at the village of Alfred, where he met with a rather cool reception. The men folk were all at church and the women and children seemed to dread the old man, who could not speak French. He walked on to Alfred station, where he spent the night, and at daybreak started for Caledonia Springs. Here his story was ridiculed, but a kind-hearted stranger sent the old man by train to McPhillips, where he was met by a searching party of friends, who had almost given him up as lost.

DEAL FOR PLANT IS OFF.

Peterboro, July 11.—The negotiations entered into some months ago by the city with the Peterboro Light and Power company for the purchase of the electric light business have fallen through. The company refuses to go any further with the matter, unless the Ontario hydro-electric power commission agrees to sanction any agreement entered into by the rate-payers and the company. This is out of the question so far as the city council is concerned.

The council has decided therefore to apply to the hydro-electric power commission to acquire water power privileges and construct the necessary works to supply cheap power.

Miser Leaves Big Estate.

Premo, Cal., July 11.—W. H. Olin, formerly an umbrella maker of this city, died last week at the County Hospital. He said he was worth \$300,000, although his life here was on a precarious scale.

Olin for the last seven years conducted a small shop for mending umbrellas on a side street here. His shop was unspeakably filthy when he died, and he was rather untidy in his habits.

Although he had a large trade that in season brought in \$10 a day at times, he lived a hermit's life in his shop. He cooked his own food and had no friends. After his death \$17,500 in gold was found stuffed into a chimney.

BARONESS GETS FREEDOM.

Separation on Ground of Husband's Extravagance.

London, July 11.—Baroness Von Eckhardtstein, wife of the councillor of the German imperial foreign office at London, has been granted a judicial separation from her husband on the ground of cruelty and misconduct.

The baroness testified that the baron spent \$1,000,000 of her money in leading a fast life generally. The baron denied the charge brought against him.

The crowds about the court hooted the baron, who has applied to the German courts for a divorce.

MASKS FOUND IN KITS.

Two Artillerymen Arrested For Assault.

Halifax, July 11.—Two Royal Canadian Artillerymen have been arrested suspected of having committed the assault on Major Thacker, they are Englishmen. Masks were found in their kit, which it is thought they used to disguise themselves in making their attack. One of the prisoners was heard to remark that when he got the major's head off when he got the chance.

Twelve Families Homeless.

Montreal, July 11.—Fire broke out, last night, in a block of tenements in St. Henri ward, and, before the western section of the fire brigade concluded its three-hour fight, twelve families were rendered homeless. The houses were occupied by the families of workmen and they lost most of their effects and carried comparatively little insurance.

C. F. R. Agent Drowned.

Letellier, Man., July 11.—H. R. Mac Cormick, C.F.R. agent here, was drowned, last evening, while bathing in an artificial pond. His home was in north St. Eleanor, Prince Edward.
