

Nothing so far has been published about the grape crop in the Niagara fruit belt, and it will be interesting to learn that the prospects for grapes this year were never better. A graperower said recently that this has been an exceptionally favorable spring for grapes, and the vines are looking exceptionally well now. "I may say that the grape industry is in much better shape around here now than t was two or three years ago.
