PERILOUS JOURNEY. LONG DOG SLED DRIVE OF A SETTLER. In an Endeavor to Save His Wife's Life—Dawson Was Reached, But the Travelling Was Hard.

Down from the north comes another of the fine stories of love and endurance that lend to the silent northern places such warm human interest. The story is of one James P. Galbraith, who brought his sick wife into Dawson by a dog team from the Duncan district—a distance of 175 miles. Mrs. Galbraith became seriously ill some weeks ago. There was not a doctor anywhere in the remote camp and heroic steps were necessary. Galbraith was not a man to hesitate because of distance or obstacles. Securing the best team of trained dogs in the camp, he carefully placed Mrs. Galbraith in the basket sleigh, and with the crack of the sleds on the long run early in the morning.

The first day out they made sixty miles. It was a fairly good trail, but nothing comfortable or enjoyable for a woman suffering the pangs of illness. The dogs did nobly and trotted along almost every step of the way. The streams were beginning to run water. At Clear Lake the water was a foot and a half deep and 900 feet wide. There was no way to make the crossing but to swim the dogs. The intrepid musher strapped his wife carefully in canvas and made the binding so that she was virtually in a large canvas bag. Then the dogs were given the lead and headed toward the opposite shore. Galbraith waded behind, but the dogs had to swim and draw the sleigh.

The old faithfuls did their work splendidly and came out on the other shore almost exhausted, but soon had their breath and were again hoofing it down the trail. Galbraith botched along, shifting his weight from side to side, and drying his wet extremities by vigor of his exertion and his brisk circulation. Between McQueston and Hight, the new Government trail cut last fall was the only one of travel. Had it not been built there would have been no means of getting to Dawson and a death perhaps would have been the result because of the enforced isolation of this particular section.

Through the heart of a deep forest this new trail passes winding among the foothills and along the gulches and creeks, and it was while passing through this remote wilderness that deep baying of a band of wolves was heard by Mr. and Mrs. Galbraith. The dogs were not allowed to tarry then and then scarcely needed the warning of the anxious driver and feeble sufferer. The second day out they made more was made, and that brought the travelers to Dominion Creek. From there it was a good road, and Dawson was reached.

Maori Legends. Many of the old Maori tales have to do with a mythical monster, called "Taniwha," usually described as a great lizard or crocodile, although it has been many centuries since any of the Polynesian races can have had direct knowledge of the existence of such an animal. This is the legend of the two Taniwhas, the guardian monsters of the two Maori tribes on the coast of the North Island of New Zealand in very ancient times. The Taniwha living in the Bay of Islands once was avenging to some bit of the world, and swam around the North Cape to the west, where he was hospitably entertained.

ROYALTY FOND OF OYSTERS. Some Delicacies Favored by the Prince of Wales. The chef to the household of the Prince of Wales, M. Cedard, has been chatting to a London journalist upon the dishes most favored by the royal family.

"It is difficult to say which is the favorite dish," he remarked, "but I think oysters would make a very bold bid. These are served to their Royal Highnesses almost daily. As a rule, however, both the Prince and Princess prefer plain dishes, with a predilection for the French cuisine, as compared with the English, while the time-table of the day's meals is: Breakfast at 9.30 a.m., Lunch at 1.00 p.m., Tea at 5.30 p.m., Dinner at 8.30 p.m.

"After a visit to the theatre or the opera," continued M. Cedard, "their Royal Highnesses simply have a light supper. This is all. And the little princess? Ah, Princess Victoria, Prince Albert, and Princess Princess of Wales, but the little ones partake of breakfast with their tutors and governesses, and their afternoon tea and their evening light supper, no elaborate meal, but they may have a few dainties cut and dried, a little game, or something of that kind."

DEBTORS GO TO JAIL. Statistics Say That in England, Imprisonment for Debt is Increasing. It will come as a surprise to many people that imprisonment for debt in England is steadily increasing. Figures demonstrating this are given in Part II. of the Civil Judicial Statistics for 1905, June issues. During that year 11,427 debtors were imprisoned in England and Wales, as against 11,066 in the previous year, and the average of 10,318 for the five years ending 1905. Twenty years before 1905, the report states, there were only about one-third as many warrants of commitment issued and about one-half as many debtors imprisoned. There was an increase in 1905 of petitions for divorce—752 as against 720 in 1904—but the figures were not so large as in 1902 and 1903, when they were 829 and 824 respectively. Of the 752 petitions in 1905, 323 were presented by wives, as against 429 in 1904. Decreases were granted in 1905 in cases and to husbands in 302 cases.

The total number of appeals, actions, etc., heard and determined in all the civil courts of the country for 1905, June issues, against 497,334 in 1904. Of these, however, country courts were responsible for 473,123 and 480,929 respectively. In the case of the High Court, the number of cases included in the statistics was 27,638,300. During 1905 the gross value of estates admitted to probate was £261,110,000.
