COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

Last month the steel output of the Nova Scotia Steel & Coal company, including No. 4, was 28,000 tons. The output of the last three months was 80,000 tons of steel in June, making a record. Steelmaking's greatest industry, the manufacture of pig iron, has been steadily increasing to bring in 4,400,000 a year, £1,400,000 more than the public revenue of the whole confederacy. The recently formed steel plant of the Dominion Steel company at Bell Island Mine, Conception Bay, Nfld., was an immense wooden structure, and was filled with machinery, 5,000 tons of ore and 1,000 tons of coal. The machinery and ore fell into the bay.

A single savings bank on the Bowery, with interest made up almost entirely of the plain people of the lower East Side of New York, has \$100,000,000 deposits. At 4 per cent. this means an income of \$4,000,000 a year. At St. Martin's Charles O. Glatz & Co. sold his seat upon the New York Stock Exchange for \$75,000. This is a reduction of \$2,000 from the last sale early in June.

Exports of wheat from Montreal for the week ending July 10th were 84,019 tons, compared with 105,955 tons last week. For the week ending July 10th, 1907, the highest six months' tonnage was in the first half of 1905, with an aggregate of 37,740,997 or 2,107,098 less than the 1907 record.

At the Hudson Bay company's annual meeting in London the former report was adopted. Lord Strathcona stated that the profits were found to decrease as the year became settled. The Hudson Bay Silver Mining Co. of Ottawa, which operates a number of mines in the Yukon, has been incorporated. It is capitalized at \$1,000,000.

A number of Perth citizens have received prospectus of the Dominion Flour meal company, limited, with headquarters in Toronto. The company is capitalized at \$100,000. The provincial directors are—President, and general manager, H. R. Brock, vice-president, H. W. Smith, Niagara Falls secretary, treasurer, Mr. J. P. Kellock, Perth; and H. H. Walton and J. W. Thornton.

BARTLETS THINK HE CAN NOT HOLD ON.

He Says He Has Been Through a Terrible Ordeal—He is Under Watchful Guards to Prevent His Suicide.

Toronto, July 16.—Herman Bartels, the Syracuse brewer, who was captured yesterday, after having escaped from the sheriff of Welland, at Osgoode Hall, was, today, sentenced to ninety days, in jail, with hard labor, for the attempted escape, to which he pleaded guilty. This will keep Bartels here until Judge Hiddell, who has to give decision upon the extradition proceedings, returns from his holidays. Bartels admitted that criminal charges were pending against him in the United States. Bartels is utterly broken down. He said he had gone through a terrible ordeal and did not see how he could survive it. The utmost precautions are being taken to prevent the prisoner from committing suicide. He and for the first time since this morning, but the request was refused. Bartels was specially guarded in court and a message was sent to the jail asking that a special guard be placed upon him.

A man who called himself Corp. H. C. Lewis, and said he belonged to "Q" company, Royal Canadian regiment, stationed at Fredericton, N.B., gave himself up to the police, this morning, as a deserter.

A number of the principal bread manufacturers of the city, were, today, served with notices to appear before the police magistrate and answer the charge of selling bread of light weight. They will come up to-morrow, along with the retail bread dealers, some of whom were summoned.

Ex-mayor Elliott, Bradford, has been appointed a commissioner to the Dublin exhibition, by the Ontario government. The position is for three months, dating from August. Ex-mayor Elliott's name was mentioned in connection with the position by the police magistracy of Bradford.

John Henry Glenwilliam, Peel county, is suing Joseph Mothersell, Alva, for \$20,000. He alleges alienation of his wife's affections. Both men are well-to-do farmers, married, with grown-up families. Three weeks ago Henry, returning home unexpectedly, found Mothersell in his house. He chased the latter across several fields into a neighboring farm house, where Mothersell took refuge. Henry then entered an action for damages.

When an epileptic man is legally confined in an asylum in a question that is to be argued at Osgoode Hall. A writ of habeas corpus was issued, by Chief Justice Falconbridge, in the case of David Hugh Gibson, Collingwood, thirty-four years of age, who has been confined, since December 15th, in Mimico asylum. Gibson, in his affidavit, declares that he has been detained against his will, that he is not a lunatic and never was, and that the only reason for his incarceration is that he suffered from epileptic fits. "I want to get out of this horrible place," he declared. His sister, Mrs. Susannah Bell, is applying for Gibson's release.

FIVE OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Colled From All Over the World.

Daniel is made, today, by the Reuters Telegram company, of the report that Count Leo Tolstoy is dead. The count is said to be in his usual health.

Two robbers held up a St. Louis and San Francisco freight train five miles east of Cherryvale, Kansas, and shot and killed O. J. Brown, and seriously wounded Otis Taylor, harvest hands.

An engagement is announced of Miss Florence Padelford, daughter of Mrs. Ernest Cunard, by her first marriage and the Hon. Robert Victor Grosvenor, eldest son and heir of Lord Ennery.

The flag of the Rising Sun floats over the Windsor hotel, Montreal, denoting the presence of a Japanese official of high rank, in the person of Admiral Yamamoto, who arrived this morning from Boston.

In a pistol duel at Petersburg, Va., John Wheelhouse was shot and instantly killed and his nephew, Richard Wheelhouse, perhaps fatally wounded. The fight, between uncle and nephew, was the culmination of a family feud of long standing.

Detective Carpenter's men in Montreal have arrested Thomas Hamilton, believed to be one of the leaders of the gang who cracked the vault of the bank at St. Croix, and got away with several thousand dollars. Detective Hamilton was being watched for him some days.

J. E. Costin, Montreal, a French agent who had charge of the Mutual Life Insurance, was sentenced to five years imprisonment on the charges of defrauding the company of \$3,000. The prisoner pleaded guilty to securing money on bogus death claims.

Warships For Sale.
Southampton, July 16.—The first-class twin screw battleship Collingwood, the torpedo gunboat Sheldrake and the third-class gunboat Tees will be offered for sale by auction at Portsmouth next month.

Curbing is being placed next to the asphalt walks alongside the market building. The space between will be seeded and the wish of the deceased City Improvement Society recalled.

The contracts for renovating Tete de Pont barracks have not yet been awarded. The departments at Ottawa don't hustle in the hot weather.

POWER HOUSE BURNED.

The Lake Ontario Park Building Consumed.

When the steamer Kingston arrived in port, this morning, Capt. Edford reported a big fire at Lake Ontario Park. The blaze illuminated the surrounding country and presented a magnificent spectacle. The power house was in flames, but the cause remains a mystery. The place was completely destroyed. The damage will inconvenience the company seriously, but not interfere with the lighting of the park, as the power can be switched from the city current and the Edison machine made use of. Charles Burke, the night watchman, and his wife, were in the pavilion as usual over night, but were ignorant as to anyone else as to the cause of the trouble. When interviewed, this morning, Manager Jones was at a loss to explain the conflagration. He inspected everything as usual before leaving the grounds and there was no sign of even a spark of fire. He noticed two men loafing about the park just before he turned off the lights, and on telling them he would leave them light a little longer so that they could see their way out, he received a very gruff reply to the effect that they would get out all right. The men moved on before Mr. Jones left the grounds, but not in a direction to take them towards the entrance. The case will, doubtless, be fully investigated.

FITZ IS AFTER BURNS.

Champion Lucky—He Will Fight Him.

New York, N.Y., July 16.—Fitzsimmons says that after he whips the "Jack" Johnson, he will fight "Tommy" Burns. Said "Fitz" today: "Of course I'll fight Burns. He's the luckiest fellow in the world. It's a good thing for him that we didn't fight at Essington, last year, when the cops stopped the show. He caught O'Brien off his guard in a fake fight, caught Squires when he was stage struck and now has his first chance at Gunner Moir. I'll give him a heat after I lick Johnson, watch me."

Money is being wagered now at even that "Fitz" gets a draw or has the better of the black fight.

EUROPE'S TOP SPEED.

93 Miles An Hour Maintained on Railroad.

Munich, July 16.—The German Railway Journal claims that the greatest speed ever attained in Europe by a steam driven train has been reached on several trips during the past week between Munich and Augsburg on the Bavarian State railway.

The express train locomotives pulled trains weighing 150 tons at a maximum speed of ninety-five and one-half miles per hour, which was maintained for a considerable period.

A BIG WRECK.

Several Killed and a Number Injured.

Leavenworth, Kansas, July 16.—Several persons are reported killed and injured in a wreck at Bethel, to-day. A Great Western passenger train is reported to have run into the Burlington train, wrecking the Burlington engine, because of wrecks. The Burlington and Great Western have been using the Kansas City North-western tracks, upon which the wreck is reported to have occurred.

QUIDA DYING?

Refuses Medical Care or Any Comforts.

London, July 16.—The Milan correspondent of the Tribune says that Miss Louise de La Ramee (Quida), whose poverty was recently told, is dying at Massarosa. She needs medical care, but refuses it or any comfort. She will not see visitors.

A Big Strike.

San Sebastian, Spain, July 16.—What promises to be a gigantic general strike throughout the north-east of Spain, was begun, yesterday, with the declaration of a general strike at a meeting of several thousand miners at Bilbao. It is believed that the movement will spread rapidly to the miners' district of Santander and Asturias.

The labor unions of the whole of Catalonia are preparing for a general strike. The authorities are alarmed at the prospects and are taking measures to assure a bread supply.

Black Hand Suspected.

New York, July 16.—The entire lower floor of a tenement house, at 352-354 East 105th street was blown to pieces at 12.3 o'clock, this morning, by a bomb, and the windows in the houses on the opposite side of the street were shattered. The house then caught fire and for a time the fifty lives in the big tenement were endangered. The Black Hand is suspected.

Killed By A Bomb.

St. Petersburg, July 16.—Gen. Alikanoff, governor-general of Estais, whose rigorous methods of suppressing disorders in Trans-Caucasus, which he brought down upon him the enmity of the revolutionist, was killed, by a bomb, at three o'clock, this afternoon, as he was returning to his home from his club. The assassins escaped.

Parson-Publican Retires.

London, July 16.—Rev. Dr. Samuel Whitfield Thackeray, who has held the license of the Fish and Eels hotels, Royton, Essex, for more than a year, applied to the Harlow magistrates on Saturday for the transfer of his license to another tenant, as he was obliged to leave owing to failing health.

Takes Convicts From Mines.

Austin, Texas, July 16.—The state penitentiary board has adopted the policy of refusing to lease or hire penitentiary convicts to work in coal mines or in tar-pentine camps. Several hundred convicts were leased at \$31 a month to work upon farms and plantations.

ROBERT YOUNG OF SOUTH FREDRICKSBURG

Napanee, July 16.—The death occurred, on Saturday last, of Robert Young, South Napanee, an old and highly respected resident of Napanee, in his eighty-second year. Deceased was well-known in South Fredericksburg, having spent all his life in that township. He has resided in Napanee, with his daughter, Mrs. J. W. Card, for the past ten years. A family of four children, two sons and two daughters, survive. They are: Caniff, of South Fredericksburg; Norman L. Napanee; Mrs. J. W. Clark, Napanee; and Mrs. Dorgan, Ogdensburg, N.Y. The funeral took place Monday afternoon.

MIDNIGHT FIRE.

Bowen and Co. Suffer Loss of \$40,000.

Kemptville, Ont., July 16.—A disastrous fire broke out in the grist mill of Bowen & Co., at one o'clock, Saturday morning, and owing to the inflammable nature of the structure and contents, the huge building was completely consumed.

The fire and well directed efforts of the brigade prevented a general conflagration. The cause of the fire is unknown. The mill was run by electric power, brought from a point fourteen miles distant on the Rideau. The local electric lights will be affected for a few days, as some of the wires and machinery were damaged. The total loss is \$40,000 and about two-thirds is covered by insurance.

BI-LINGUAL TRAINING SCHOOL

J. P. Finn, B.A., Probably Be the Principal.

Toronto, July 16.—The provincial government has decided upon the establishment of a permanent bi-lingual training school for teachers at Ottawa. The school will have a similar standing to that of a model school, and both professional and academic training will be given in French and English.

The department has decided upon the appointment of J. P. Finn, B.A., as principal, and of J. M. Fleury, a Parisian Frenchman, as assistant.

The Engineering School.

Ottawa, July 16.—Militia orders issued to-day state that the Royal School of Military Engineering has been authorized at Halifax, N.S., as follows: Commandant, C.R.C.E., maritime provinces; staff officer, adjutant R.C.E.; instructor school, chief instructor, division officer, electrical school, division officer, D. L. Halifax; mechanical school, chief instructor, inspector R.U.E.; school of telegraph, chief instructor, D.O.D.L., Halifax; field works, chief instructor, officer commanding the engineering company. Courses will be held from time to time as authorized by the militia council.

Chance For Letter Writers.

London, July 16.—A Suffolk paper announces its willingness to publish letters on the new theology on two conditions: First, that they are reasonably short, and, secondly, that the writers send five shillings with each letter, the money to be given to the local hospital.

New Test Of Intoxication.

London, July 16.—A policeman who was asked, at the Lambeth police court, yesterday, how he knew that a man was intoxicated, said that he found him sitting on a doorstep going through the motions of driving a motor car. The man declared that he was driving to Vauxhall.

Brass Band Funeral.

Sheffield, July 16.—More than 300 members of local brass bands took part yesterday in the funeral procession at Sheffield of John Brooks, who was one of the witnesses of the brass band movement in the town. They joined in playing the Dead March in "Saul."

Reconstructing An Accident.

London, July 16.—Martin O'Connor, a barrister, used penny toy models of a motor omnibus, a horse omnibus and a cab yesterday in the Sheriff's Court to demonstrate to the jury how a street accident occurred.

African Trade Depression.

Cape Town, July 16.—It was stated at the last meeting of the Cape Divisional Council that £500,000 in rates was outstanding on account of the severe depression in trade.
