COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

Haveva, Vongal and Co., New York, are sending a location in Canada for a branch factory.

Chapman, Sir Thomas, Westminister, of the Imperial Tobacco Company, declares that the company is a continuation, not a new one.

The Mackay Poultry Company is making Bradford for a special assessment. Local men are behind the proposed industry.

Plans are being prepared by Stewart and Wilson, Hamilton, for a \$75,000 structure for the Canada Steel Goods Co. Ltd., that city.

A dairy company is preparing to commence a \$300,000 dairy farm in the district of Ottawa, one of the finest in Canada. Three hundred cows will be kept.

The G.E.P. have purchased from R. L. Strachan a block of land at Port Arthur, Ont., on which it is the intention of the company to locate their plant and freight handling.

The Colonial Weaving Co., Peterboro, will erect a new factory 200x250 feet, and install machinery costing \$200,000, provided certain conditions are forthcoming from the city. These will likely be granted.

Messrs Patterson and Co., woolen manufacturers, of Peterboro, are preparing a site on the factory yards for the erection of a large weave shed. The looms from the main building will be moved into the new structure when completed and additional looms will be installed.

Cobalt's output for the first six months of 1907 was 6,281 tons, valued at \$1,900,017. The figures show an increased tonnage of over 1,500, and an increase in value of nearly \$1,000,000 over the same period 1906. If the present strike is settled the output this year will be close to \$11,000,000.

The Brockville Malleable Iron Company is being organized in Brockville with local capital. The preliminary work has been done and stock lists are now open. The directors propose to establish a plant capable of reducing either five tons or ten tons of castings daily. The five-ton plant complete, is estimated to require \$25,000, while a ten-ton plant is estimated at \$50,000.

BUILDING COLLAPSED

Several Killed and Many Injured at London, Ont.—They Were Buried In Debris.

Stores Crushed Down and Occupants Went With Wreckage—Rescuers Work all Night, Men and Women in Ruins Able to Communicate with Helpers

London, Ont., July 16.—By the collapse this afternoon of the building occupied by W. J. Reid & Co., china and glassware merchants, over a dozen persons were killed and at least a dozen seriously injured. The wrecked edifice is on Dundas street, in the heart of the retail district, and collapsed shortly after four o'clock this afternoon, an hour when the sidewalks were crowded with pedestrians.

Reid's and Hamilton's employ a large number of clerks of both sexes, and the majority of them were buried beneath tons of debris. Firemen and policemen were early on the scene, and, with a volunteer corps of citizens, began the work of rescue.

So far the known dead are:

W. G. Hamilton, of Hamilton & Long;
Frank Smith, manager of Brewster's store.
Those rescued, but more or less seriously injured, are: Mr. Gifford, Miss Johnson, Mr. Boone, George Kipp, Charles Radcliff, John Palko, John Gray, Frank Lewis, Elsie Harding, Jack Middleton, Lillian Smith, Ethel Earle, Mr. Brewster.

Amongst those who are still missing are: Miss Clara Mullin of Brewster's; John Robinson, of Hamilton & Long; Joseph Long, of Hamilton & Long; Mr. Lane, of Hamilton & Long.

Up to 1 a.m. seven bodies had been taken from the ruins, and this number will be added to when the workers reach the cellars of Hamilton & Long and Brewster's stores. It is estimated that the dead and injured about twenty-five. A large crowd of workers and onlooker are still at the scene of the disaster where electric lights have been erected to assist in the work of rescue.

A number of unknown men and women and one baby are in the ruins some of whom can communicate with the rescuers.

Immediately after the crash the fire men responded to an alarm and searched about at once to rescue those in the debris, with the aid of hundreds of citizens, who turned in and worked till, in some cases they fell exhausted, only to be replaced by more willing hands.

Many were the heart-rending scenes witnessed by rescuers and the victims pinned beneath the ruins. The victims were sent immediately to the different hospitals. Up to midnight the army of willing workers had not diminished, but there were still a number of people in the ruins.

The cause of the accident is supposed to have been the alterations in progress in the Reid building, which was being transformed into a bowling alley and billiard place by the Greek firm of Smirles & Co., who were shortly to take possession.

Bodies Recovered.

London, Ont., July 17.—The bodies of Messrs Hamilton and Long have been removed from the wreckage of Reid & Co.'s new store, after one of the most memorable struggles ever fought by human hands. The remains of Mr. Long were extricated with difficulty, shortly after 3.30 o'clock this morning. The head had been terribly crushed and for a time the body was identified by rings on the fingers. Mr. Hamilton's body was found early this morning and the remains were removed to the undertaking parlors of Smith & Clarke. It was stated, this morning, that it had been discovered that the bodies of young women still remained in the wreckage but this report could not be confirmed. This would have brought the number of missing up to five. Patients at the hospital are all doing well.

The work of tearing out the masses of ruins continued all night, and Mr. Clark and his men did not leave the ruins until through the night the crowd saw the men work beneath the glare of torches and joined in when it was necessary. The work of the hospital authorities, headed by Superintendent Board, is being commended in all sides.

At noon, to-day, Coroner McLaren, opened an inquest on the bodies of two of the victims, Mr. Hamilton and the boy Tambling. Fifteen persons were sworn in for the inquest and viewed the inquest was adjourned for a week.

Preparation Matter.

To Show That Running of Trains Was Necessary.

Toronto, July 17.—Another attempt was made, to-day, by the crown, to go on one against the Grand Trunk by which it is accused of a breach of the Lord's day act, by running unnecessary freight trains out of its yards on Sunday. The Grand Trunk is preparing material to show that it was absolutely necessary to move the freight and, moreover, that the railway was required under an order from the railway commission, to run a freight train on Sunday.

The crown's case is supported by the fact that the railway was granted to prepare its material, but the magistrate intimated that the case would have to be proceeded with then.

Old Boys' Receptions.
