## MUCH TROUBLE IS FEARED IN SEOUL

**The Koreans Are Enraged at the Japanese--  
 Collisions Are Feared.**

Seoul, via Tokio, July 19 (evening).  
 Enraged crowds are assembled at  
 various points throughout the city  
 and inflammatory documents against  
 the Japanese are being freely distrib-  
 uted, giving rise to a forlorn hope  
 that some active opposition is about  
 to begin. Serious collisions, it is be-  
 lieved, will take place, to-day, be-  
 tween the police and the rioters.  
 Seoul, July 20.—It is reported that a  
 most dramatic scene occurred at the  
 palace when the ministers, headed by  
 Prem or Yi Wang Yong, appeared be-  
 fore his majesty and made the cabin-  
 et's final representation in urging the  
 emperor's abdication. His majesty  
 was in a high state of excitement, but  
 in the end, after a long conference,  
 he signed the document and the seal  
 of his majesty was placed on it. A sup-  
 pressed sigh from the emperor which  
 broke the death-like stillness that  
 reigned throughout the memor-  
 able scene.  
 Briefly the emperor in the imperial  
 rescript of abdication expresses his  
 regret that during the forty-four years  
 of his reign national calamities have  
 followed in rapid succession and the  
 people's distress has become so acute  
 that he deemed it now time to  
 transfer the crown to the heir-appar-  
 ent in conformity with ancestral us-  
 ages.

**WORLD-WIDE UNION.**

In Methodist Circles—Bound in  
 Mighty Band.  
 London, July 20.—At the annual  
 conference of the Wesleyan adherents,  
 sitting in Wesley Chapel, Robert W.  
 Perks, M.P., for Lincolnshire, present-  
 ed the important proposition that  
 the time had arrived when the Wes-  
 leyan forces throughout the world  
 should bind themselves with a mighty  
 band and grapple with the great  
 economic and social questions of the  
 day. He suggested the establishment  
 of Methodist bureaus in all parts of  
 the world to deal with the question  
 of immigration of unemployed labor,  
 and to build up a practical loan  
 society and savings bank and other  
 kindred institutions for mutual  
 aid.  
 Mr. Perks declared that Methodism  
 is a vast religious free-masonry with  
 world wide riches and resources, only  
 wanting the proper machinery to be-  
 come a tremendous confederacy, for  
 mutual self-help. No action was taken  
 on the proposition, thus presented  
 but the conference was greatly im-  
 pressed with the possibilities.

**DAMAGE  
 IN A  
 CROWDBURST**

Vinona, July 20.—The damage by  
 the cloud-burst which occurred here,  
 on Wednesday, was enormous, but ap-  
 parently not more than two or three  
 parts of the municipality \$200,000 for

## MURDERED SIX.

**Fortune Teller Found Guilty and  
 Will Die.**

Chicago, July 20.—Herman Billick  
 was found guilty of killing, with  
 poison, Adolph Veza and five of his  
 children. The jury found the penalty  
 of death. Veza and his children all  
 died within a few weeks of each other  
 under suspicious circumstances. Billick  
 had been a friend of the family for  
 years and in his capacity fortune  
 teller had administered medicine to  
 the children.  
 During the trial testimony was sub-  
 mitted by the state, charging Billick  
 with having disposed of Veza and his  
 children in order to collect the life  
 insurance they carried. Mrs. Veza  
 was shown to have been under the  
 influence of Billick, whom she loved,  
 and evidence showed that she had  
 guilty knowledge of the murdering of  
 her husband and children by Billick.

**Historic Castle For The Public**  
 London, July 20.—The Bishop  
 Starford town council yesterday pur-  
 chased for the public the site and  
 ruins of Waytemore Castle, a fort  
 which was built by the East Saxons  
 to defend Mercia, and which later be-  
 came the property of the bishops of  
 London, until it was demolished by  
 King John. The price paid was \$9,500.

 Cape Town, July 20.—Peter Nelson,  
 whose death at the age of 107, is re-  
 ported from Worcester, Cape Colony,  
 and who fought in the earliest Kaffir  
 wars, is believed to have been the  
 oldest white subject of King Edward.

## WAS A MONSTER REVIEW

**Quaker City Witnesses a Very Remarkable  
 Procession.**

Philadelphia, July 20.—Flanked by  
 more than half a million spectators  
 10,000 Elks marched in an impressive  
 down Broad street today. No more  
 picturesque procession has been wit-  
 nessed in this city, almost every lodge  
 in the long line being garbed or badge  
 in a manner typical of its  
 home city. The Quaker Sab Club of  
 El Paso, Texas, was made up to re-  
 present the procession to a Mexican  
 bull fight. Great care was taken to  
 have the costumes accurate. Baltimore  
 Lodge was attired in white duck uni-  
 forms. The Denver, Col. Elks were  
 mounted on bucky little bucks and  
 attracted considerable attention. The  
 Boston delegates wore the historic  
 garb of the Pilgrims. Reading dressed  
 their marchers in blue serge suits and  
 Altona in gray striped dusters. Wil-  
 liamsport, Pa., members wore white  
 trousers, white hats, with purple  
 bands, white shoes and gray coats.

**Violation of Coasting Act.**  
 Alexandria Bay, July 18.—Deputy  
 Collector of Customs William Avery,  
 has forwarded complaints of violation  
 of the coasting act and steamboat li-  
 cense act to Collector Grant, Cape  
 Vincent. The steamer Toronto landed  
 four passengers from Charlotte here  
 to-day, and they were immediately  
 taken to the deputy collector's office  
 and made an affidavit. The Toronto  
 was allowed to proceed conditional  
 upon payment of a fine of \$400 on  
 the next landing at this port. This is  
 the first incident called to the atten-  
 tion of the custom officers, relating  
 to the coasting act, and it is the in-  
 tention of the officials to enforce the  
 law to the letter.

**Evicted By Rats.**  
 London, July 20.—Andrew Shove  
 sued the Chiswick urban district coun-  
 cil yesterday at the Brentford county  
 court for \$5 for rent paid, doctor's  
 fees, and the cost of removal. He de-  
 clared that he was evicted by rats  
 from a flat in the council's workmen's  
 dwellings, and Mrs. Shove said that  
 the rats bit her baby, injuring it  
 severely. The judge said he was com-  
 pelled reluctantly to give a verdict in  
 favor of the council.

**Use Of The Locust.**  
 Pretoria, July 20.—Ex-Commandant  
 Poligier, speaking at a meeting of  
 farmers in the Krugersdorp district,  
 declared that the locusts were a ter-  
 ror to the various South African  
 governments to exterminate the locust  
 on the ground that the plague was  
 sent by heaven as a judgment on the  
 people for their sins, and that to in-  
 terfere with the divine decree was to  
 invite further punishment.

**Royal Present From America.**  
 London, July 20.—The first top cover  
 manufactured in Connecticut for roy-  
 ally has just been finished. It is an  
 exact replica of the engine that draws  
 the Twenty Century Limited, on the  
 New York Central railroad, and is a  
 present from a Connecticut man to  
 the Crown Prince Boris, of Bulgaria.

**Exodus Of Architects.**  
 Johannesburg, July 20.—Out of six-  
 ty architects practicing in Johan-  
 nesburg at the beginning of the year,  
 at least thirty have left the golden  
 city to try their fortune elsewhere ow-  
 ing to the effect of the prevailing de-  
 pression in the building trade.

**Wants To Visit The King.**  
 London, July 20.—The queen regent  
 of Swaziland has expressed to the re-  
 sident commissioner a desire to visit  
 King Edward in his own home and  
 personally lay her grievances and those  
 of her family before him.

**Rain Causes Fire.**  
 London, July 20.—A track laden  
 with lumber, standing on a railway sid-  
 ing at Dovercourt, was set on fire,  
 yesterday, by rain beating under the  
 covering and coming in contact with  
 the line.

## SOUTH AMERICAN VICTIM OF THIEVES

**The Confidence Trick Worked With Success  
 On Chance Visitor in Paris.**

Paris, July 20.—The confidence trick  
 was cleverly worked here, last night,  
 the victim being a wealthy South  
 American, named Napier.  
 Mr. Napier is unable to speak a  
 word of French, and was delighted  
 when he made the chance acquaintance  
 of two well-dressed men who could  
 speak English. One of these posed as  
 a follower of Mr. Carnegie, stating  
 that he was very glibly, and was de-  
 sired of giving away his large por-  
 tfolio.  
 Apparently genuine bank notes and  
 valuable jewels were flourished, and  
 Mr. Napier was induced to part with  
 his well-filled pocketbook as "a guar-  
 antee of good faith" in return for  
 checks made out for several thousand  
 pounds.  
 A merry evening around the cafes  
 followed, ending in a game of hide-  
 and-seek among the trees which bor-  
 der the Champs Elysees. In the course  
 of the game the Parisian Carnegie  
 and his friend vanished, and Mr.  
 Napier is now bewailing the loss of  
 his pocketbook and the money it con-  
 tained.

Nearly two thousand ore dockmen  
 are on strike at Duluth, Superior and

 A. C. Winscombe, registrar of McMas-  
 ter University, has resigned to accept  
 a position in Calgary High School.

King Oscar is working to persuade  
 all Swedes who have emigrated to Am-  
 erica, to return to their homeland.  
 The T. & N. O. railway is reported  
 to have sold \$6,500 worth of tickets  
 out of Colaba since the strike began.  
 The pope has promulgated a syllabus  
 in which are condemned sixty-five er-  
 rors of the so-called modernism in  
 faith.

Mrs. Ida Farmer, of Oklahoma, died  
 at the deathbed of her brother, Ellis  
 V. Davis, at Jerseyville, Ill., from  
 heart disease.  
 New Zealand has women's franchise  
 and out of 212,870 women qualified to  
 vote 174,615 went to the polls at the  
 last election.

Thomas O'Connor, a thirteen-year-  
 old boy, was killed at Stillerton,  
 N.S., by touching an electric wire in  
 a spirit of bravado.

Ignatzowski, an Ecuador made an  
 attack on the four military barracks,  
 in Quaysquil, but were driven off with  
 several of their number killed.  
 Lena Fay Lewis, Ill. aged four  
 years, was burned to death. She ac-  
 cidentally set fire to her clothing,  
 while playing with some matches.

Three Canadians have won places in  
 the final stage of the St. George's  
 challenge race contest, at Bilsby, and  
 two in the final stage of the king's  
 prize match.

A girl sentenced to serve twenty  
 months in an Alabama prison, was  
 kept there for twelve years, until she  
 died, a clerk's mistake having made  
 the sentence read twenty years.

Edward Bergmann, former Philip-  
 pine soldier and singer of his worthy  
 aunt, Mrs. Kate Guehrlein, pleaded  
 guilty to the murder, in St. Louis,  
 and received a life sentence.

Thomas Dixon, a young merchant of  
 La Crosse, Ga., was shot and instan-  
 tly killed by some unknown person. He  
 was in the vicinity of a negro picnic,  
 and it is believed some negro traveller  
 killed him.

The National Council of Women,  
 meeting in Vancouver, seems to have  
 been afraid to pass a resolution to  
 the effect that the law should not per-  
 mit an eighteen-year-old girl to marry  
 without the consent of her mother.  
 The hero of the Georgia's upset in  
 the recent explosion is Benjamin Kreiger,  
 of Brooklyn, a boy of eighteen  
 years. But for him the loss of life  
 would have been incomparably great-  
 er. He gave his life for his fellows  
 with the coolness of a veteran.

The county attorney has decreed  
 that every man who buys liquor of the  
 drug stores in Toppan, Kansas, must  
 sign his own and real name to the  
 affidavit which the purchaser makes  
 that the liquor is to be used for  
 medicinal purposes.

## ROBINSON CRUSOE IN A PARIS PARK

**Boy Lives on Trapped Birds and Meat Scraps  
 in Bois de Boulogne.**

Paris, July 20.—A youth of fifteen,  
 named Marcel (buttrill), whose par-  
 ents live in the country, is not likely  
 to forget his first acquaintance with  
 Paris. Recently the lad was apprehen-  
 ded by a butcher near the Gare de  
 l'Est. The life was not at all to his  
 liking, so he pleaded with his parents  
 to take him home. They refused,  
 whereupon Marcel, packing his few be-  
 longings, fled from the house of his  
 employer. His disappearance was  
 notified to his relatives, and his father  
 came to Paris, but failed to find him.  
 A few days ago the family received  
 a letter from the missing boy, in  
 which he related that he was shelter-  
 ing in the Bois de Boulogne, and was  
 dying of hunger. To-day a score of  
 police, after several hours' search,  
 discovered his hiding place. It was  
 on the other side of the lake, where  
 the undergrowth is dense. There he  
 had built himself a habitation. Cur-  
 se-like, out of brushwood, and made  
 himself a bed of leaves. His dwelling  
 was far from being waterproof, and  
 the rain had soaked through. He  
 explained that he had lived on birds,  
 which he had trapped and cooked,  
 and at other times he had existed on  
 cold scraps of food obtained from  
 the restaurants in the Bois.  
 The lad has now gone home in  
 charge of his father.
