

FROM FAR MANICOUVER HOW THE JAPAN AFFAIR IS VIEWED.

Land Sharks in Plenty Out West—A "Kingston" Cafe—Whig Correspondent Loves the Ladies. Special Whig Correspondent. Vancouver, B.C., July 18.—Just at the present time it is interesting to watch the movements of the United States and Japan. The question commonly asked is, "What will be the outcome of the dispute between the United States and Japan?" The answers are many and varied; some are decided, and others are mingled with indecision, but all are agreed that the relations between the two nations are very much strained, and that nothing can avert a clash unless a firm hand is immediately reached out from Washington, holding and controlling California and the Pacific coast. There can be only one answer to the question as to who has been the aggressor, except by those who are possessed to such an extent with prejudice that they will see nothing in the light of fairness. That California is the aggressor has been as good as admitted at Washington, but what are they going to do about it at Washington? In the same specific, San Francisco, the city of corrupt practices, whose mayor, the man who was elected by a majority of the citizens, and by whom the same streets would stand today, has been sentenced to a term of five years in the penitentiary—this same San Francisco, which was shaken to the ground a short time ago, and yet showed not the warning in the aggressor. The rights of the Japanese in San Francisco have been trampled upon and ignored to such an extent that it has become unbearable, and there seems to be no other means of redress save active preparations are being made for a resentment that will be interesting to watch. The United States, despite contradictions, and plausible explanations, are making preparations for a struggle, and have ordered their navy to the Pacific coast waters. Japan says that unless Washington can control California, and give the Japanese their rights there, she is not going to wait and give her enemy time to make preparations. In common reasoning it would hardly look as though Japan would make an attack upon such a nation as the United States, yet it is known that Japan knows no fear, as was clearly shown in her struggle with Russia, and that no other nation is so high in the Japanese soldier as to be fighting for his country or his people. He wants no sure passport into the future life than to have ended this one in avenging an enemy. Within the last few days, a Japanese spy has been arrested in San Francisco, and in his possession was found over three hundred photographs and sketches of all the forts, and all such information as would be of use to the Japanese in case they made an attack upon the United States at that port. It is early, perhaps, to predict so high an speculation in life, but should Japan invade into the United States, as she will doubtless do, unless Washington brings California to terms, it would be easier to sell after the struggle is over than now, what the outcome will be. We sometimes wonder where all the people arriving in Vancouver are coming from, and why they are coming from other parts of the dominion here. Transvaal Indians Revolt. Johannesburg, July 23.—British Indians have begun their "revolt," which takes at present the form of passive resistance against the Transvaal law that all Africans must register themselves and have their fingerprints taken. Private Profit Eliminated—C... sump on Decreased. New Norwegian liquor laws are successful. The Sondag system gives power to municipalities to grant all the spirit licenses which they deem necessary to a company which would himself carry on the traffic in the interests of the community, with a five annual return of not more than 5 cent on its paid up capital.

In establishing the Sondag system the power of competition does not appear to have presented much difficulty. The moments of the profits are as follows: To the state, 65 per cent; to the municipality, in lieu of the tax, the most abolished, 15 per cent, and to the power of public utility operating as towns, 10 per cent, and in the surrounding districts, 5 per cent. The profits of the trade under the restrictions have contributed \$70,000 for objects of public interest and founding of a school system. During the eight years the proportion accruing to the state has been increased and apart till 1910 to form the nucleus of old age pension fund, which will amount to \$2,000,000. The most remarkable fact in the history of Norway is that the consumption of alcohol per inhabitant has decreased 45 per cent in the last fifty years. The aims and principles of the Sondag system are these: The elimination of private profit and securing the most valuable for the public; insuring the best quality of liquors sold; the reduction of the number of licenses; the easy enforcement of the law; the destruction of the power of the spirit trade; and the furtherance of all progressive measures of reform.
