SAILED BOAT RAN AWAY FROM THE POWER BOATS IN THE CRUISE.

Wind Was Very Strong—Officials Arrived Too Late to Take the Time of the Finish—Christy Sailed Fastest.
No official time was taken of the cruising race from Picton to Kingston yesterday, though the arrival of the various yachts was noted as they passed the local yacht club house buoy. Secretary H. P. Smith, after starting the yachts at nine o'clock in the morning, started out somewhat later in a power boat, intending to get to Kingston ahead of the sailing yachts. The wind, however, was very vigorous, and the fastest of the white-winged boats, at the rate of ten miles an hour, the Crescent, of Watertown, was the first to reach the yacht club buoy, at 1.03. She was followed by the Christy, of Kingston, at 1.17. The Watertown boat, however, started out twenty-eight minutes ahead of the Daltons, so that the latter covered the distance in fourteen minutes less time.

E. C. Gilderlove's Tropic, which broke her mast on the journey to Picton, on Tuesday, will not be able to enter this afternoon's contest. She was expected to give the newer boats a good contest. 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CAN'T GIVE THE MONEY TO THE COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE THIS YEAR

The City May Have to Face a Deficit Itself—Fees Can Be Lowered Next Year—Taxes Likely to Go Up.
Much as the Board of Education would like to reduce the Collegiate Institute fees, there seems no likelihood of that any reduction can be made for next term. It can be done if the board would be willing to end the year with a deficit. The city council schools this year, and the chances are that the city may itself face a deficit at the end of 1907 on the year's business. The tax cannot be raised at the late date, as the assessment is fixed, the rate is fixed, and two-thirds of the taxes are paid in. Any further educational grant from the city seems, therefore, to be out of the question.

WHIG'S POSITION.
The Whig has no idea that the trustees on the Board of Education are other than gentlemen and business men. The Whig believes they had no ulterior motive in increasing the Collegiate Institute fees, they had to make revenue meet expenditure. The Whig would like to see the Collegiate fees down to a reasonable figure; to do so and to introduce the much desired Domestic science class would require, it may be \$25,000. The city should provide this amount.

Clever Figuring.
S. J. Horsey says 156 pupils in the Collegiate Institute represents five per cent. of these passing the entrance examinations; over 3,100 passed. Total attendance, of all pupils, in Kingston's schools is 2,200, so that S. J.'s figuring is erroneous. At least 1,000 more passed than can be found in the schools. Toronto schools only passed 800 at the entrance examinations this year.

Alderman Carson's Views.

TO ENLARGE STEAMER THE TORONTO WILL BE MUCH LENGTHENED

The Comanche Giving a Rival Quite a Lively Time—A Derelict Not Yet Removed—The Latest Port Notes.
The steamer Alexandria was at Folger's, last night, from Montreal.
The schooner Bertha Kalkins arrived from Oswego, with coal, for Sowards.
It is proposed to have a marine railway built at Toronto. It would be less expensive than a dry dock, and would meet all requirements.
The steamship Kenning, on her way from Smith's Falls to Oswego, for coal, had to stay in Kingston over night, owing to the storm on the lake.
Friday night was quite rough on the lake. The schooner Acacia, when passing Sodus, got into a severe gale, and had to put back to Kingston, and in the storm her main boom was smashed.
Swift's Steamer Toronto, down and up, steamer Edith Queen, up, to-night; schooner Rideau King, down, from Ottawa; schooner Clara clears for Sodus, to-night; steamer Hamilton, down, last night; steamer Belleville, up, to-night.
The Richelieu and Ontario Navigation company proposes to increase the length of the steamer Toronto about thirty feet and extend the cabin on the second deck, which will give the big steamer about forty new state rooms. The business done during the months of July and August is such that the company finds it necessary to do this work.
M.T.'s. The steamer Flint arrived, from Duluth, with 50,000 bushels of wheat and barley; the steamer Fairmount, from Fort William, with 90,000 bushels of wheat, with consorts Melrose, 40,000 bushels, and Quebec, 65,000 bushels; the tug Bronson, from Montreal, with four light barges, cleared for Montreal, with three grain-laden barges; the schooner Ford River, from Charlotte, with coal. "Men for the boats are very scarce at present," said Thomas H. Fleming, agent for the Seaman's Union, to a representative of the Whig, this morning. "Every sailor in Kingston is at work, and when there is a vacancy, it is a difficult matter to fill the place." The large Ceylon, used for the heavy timber trade, has been delayed at Godwin Island, for the past few days for the want of men. The crew is shy six men, and Mr. Fleming has been unable to get men for the boat.

Had To Remove Vessel.
Harbor Master McCammon, on Friday night, had to remove a vessel which was lying in the channel, thereby disobeying the rules of the harbor. The schooner Acacia was the offender. Mr. McCammon secured a tug, and went out and gave the necessary orders, which were promptly carried out. The vessels must not be within three hundred yards of the wharf, and not in line with any of the lights.
The Acacia returned last night from near Sodus, being unable to reach that port owing to the heavy sea, and intended staying out in the channel until this morning.
