REMOVE GRATES If necessity requires, it is an easy matter to remove the grates from the Sunshine.

Just loosen the cotter pin (see the top arrow pointing at it) and the grates on the right can be lifted out. Repeat the operation on the left, and you can do the same with the remaining grates.



> COST OF LIVING. The Increase in Prices is

of living which are of interest to the general public. The investigation as to prices was carried on in Ottawa. Figlocal storekeepers whose trade is with members of the civil service. Retail prices at Ottawa in June, 1897, are compared with similar prices in June of the present year. The result obtained shows that for a civil servant of a lower salary thirty to thirty-five per cent. For the man of higher rank and remuneration the increase has been from twenty-six to thirty per cent. The table of prices The actual number of quotations is 663. Of these, 587 show an increase, 75 indicate that no change has taken place, and

that there has been a reduction. The increase in fresh meats and bacon has been from forty-five to fifty per cent. Fish has advanced thirty to fifty per cent. Eggs cost fifty per cent. more than they did ten years ago. Butter is on an average twenty-five per cent. dearer, and milk twenty per cent. Food products other than meat and dairy produce have increased thirty per cent. The keeper. Bread has increased forty per cent., reckoning, as the memorial says, increases in price and decreases in weight. Potatoes have gone up fifty per cent., and apples forty per cent. Dry goods and clothing have advanced from have increased from twenty-five to thirty-

Among commodities which have not increased in price, or have actually gone down are books, magazines, pens, inks, and writing paper, which are unchanged. Pencils and fountain pens are somewhat cheaper. Watches are reported cheaper than ten years ago, although clocks have advanced from 20 to 35 per cent. Coal has advanced 11 per cent. But lighting has materially decreased, electricity fifty-two per cent. and gas twenty-six per cent. All these figures apply to Ottawa. House rents have advanced from twentyfive to thirty-six per cent.

Corroborative results outside of Ottawa include figures from an investigation by the Ontario Educational Association a year and a half ago, which shows an increase in the cost of living of thirty per cent. The Department of Political Sconomy of the University of Toronto conducted a careful and minute inquiry into the cost of living in Toronto during the past year, with the result that the increase shown was greater than thirty per cent. In the United States, R. G. Dun & Company, of New York, keep a-history of prices which apply to the present discussion. Their figures indicate 1898 to 1907 of thirty-four per cent. The Department of Labor at Washington give figures down to 1905, since which time a considerable increase has taken place. From 1897 to 1905' the increase, according to the Department of Labor, has been twenty-seven per cent. These figures dispose with practical
