COMRADES FOUND HIS BODY BUT LIFE GONE

To Get a Booster For the Water Supply Company—Crack Runners in Ottawa For Carnival.  
Ottawa, July 30.—A little boy, Daniel Wessell, aged eleven, was bathing in the Ottawa river, this morning, with a number of companions, when he got out of his depth and went under. His little chum, diving and brought up his body, but medical skill could not resuscitate the boy. A Court of Criminal Appeal.

London, July 30.—The House of Commons, this morning, at 6:35 o'clock, after an all night session, passed the third reading of the bill establishing a court of criminal appeal and providing for the right of appeal against convictions for crimes similar to that now existing in civil cases.

INVOLUNTARY MANSLAUGHTER

This Was the Verdict of the Coroner's Jury at Sault Ste. Marie.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., July 29.—The coroner's jury, in the case of Miss Elizabeth Cullenhead, of Kingston, Ontario, who was shot on the streets at the Michigan "Boo" by Private Gillette, of the United States army, while the latter was trying to prevent the escape of a prisoner from Fort Brady, brought in a verdict of involuntary manslaughter against Gillette. Prosecuting Attorney Holden, of the Michigan bar, at once issued a warrant for the arrest of Gillette, but it is not expected that the officers at Fort Brady will surrender the man as he is to be court-martialed. It is expected the court-martial will acquit Gillette. The county will then demand his surrender to the civil officers and, Holden says, the matter will be carried up until Gillette is secured. A recent decision by the United States supreme court, that a person acquitted by the military authorities cannot be tried by the civil courts, for the same offence, applied only to a case in the Philippines where both branches are under the same head. In this country a trial under one has no effect upon the other.

SAVED FROM SUICIDE.

Capt. Esford Hails a Young Man Back on Deck.  
A New York young man named Bennett, a discharged son of a rich father, tried to jump off the steamer Kingston between Toronto and Charlottetown early last evening. He and his mother were en route to Montreal, and the young man's money having run out, and liquor credit being refused him, he announced that he intended ending his life. He climbed over the side of the steamer, but was caught by Capt. Esford, who hauled him back on deck, and advised to be a man. Bennett is on the staff of the New York Herald. His mother was not made aware of her son's foolish act.

VERY HARD WORK.

In Lifting the Sunken Steamer Nevada.  
The steamer Nevada, ashore and sunk at Baker's Point, is one of the hardest jobs of salvage work that has been done in the St. Lawrence St. Lawrence Bay. The steamer now sunk has the current of the rapids, at Farran's Point, setting down on her broadside. Her No. 1 hold is badly broken in. Two twin pumps would not be sufficient to control the water in this compartment alone, and Capt. Donnelly came up on last night's train for four additional pumps, which are being sent down today. Some 16,000 bushels of dry grain has been put into the lighter Grantham and James Richardson & Son, Kingston, has bought about 21,000 bushels of the wet wheat. Capt. Donnelly states that, if everything goes well, the ship will be floated Wednesday night. The ship will be brought here for repairs.

The sympathy of a large circle of friends will be extended to the bereaved. The body was taken to the Catholic cemetery early in the afternoon. Rev. W. H. Spalding officiated at the services.

Hit By The Lightning.

Lightning played many pranks during the electric storm, last evening. It struck the home of Frederick R. Patrick, Livingston avenue, ripping the side out of the building and stunning the occupants. The fright from the shock sent the youngest child of the household into convulsions. Another accident is also reported. Guard Graham, of the penitentiary, was struck while in the prison yard, and his right side paralyzed.

STARVED TO DEATH.

London Man Steadily Declined to Partake of Food.  
South Bend, Ind., July 30.—Humiliated because of his arrest on a charge of fighting James Ryan, of London, Ont., deliberately starved himself to death in the county jail. He refused to take nourishment for three weeks. Several attempts were made to compel Ryan to eat, but without avail. Ryan was a cigar-maker and a well-educated man. When taken to jail he said he would never leave the place alive, and from the very first refused to eat. He was thirty-five years old. The remains were shipped to London. They were accompanied by Mrs. Ryan.

SEEK WAS THE THIEF

Though She Posed as An Umbrella Mender.  
Belleville, Ont., July 30.—On Friday last a middle-aged woman, who gave her name as Emma McDonald, who went from house to house repairing umbrellas, stole a down silver spoon and a gold watch and chain and other valuables from the house of Mrs. Arthur Downey, and, yesterday, the woman was arrested in Napames, the stolen property being found on her. This morning the woman was committed for trial by the magistrate. Her home is in Western Ontario.

STRANGLED WOMEN

And the Police Are Seeking the Slayer.  
New York, July 30.—The bodies of two women, with the marks of a strangler on their throats, have been found here, within the last twelve hours, and the police, to-day, have cast a drag net over the city to catch the slayer. The police believe one man committed both crimes. Neither of the victims has been identified.

To Go Under New Plans.

Detroit, Mich., July 30.—Upon entirely new lines an electric railway is being projected between Detroit and Adrian. There are to be no bonds, the money paid for the stock is to be used to build and equip the road and the construction is not to start until the cash to pay for it has been secured. All the cash subscribed will be turned into the Security Trust company, of Detroit, which, as trustees, will see that it is disbursed for the building of the road and legitimate expenses attendant thereon. The road is being financed by M. A. Robert, the Montreal banker.

Catholics Desire Services.

Thousand Island Park, N.Y., July 30.—Catholics spending the summer at this resort are endeavoring to secure the consent of the park trustees to hold mass here on Sunday mornings rather than at Erie view, as at present. The members of the faith say that on account of the long walk many of those desiring to attend mass are unable to reach the place early enough or are not able to take the long walk.
