BRANWELL BOOTH Will Likely Succeed as Head of Army. London, July 31.—Gen. William Booth, the head of the Salvation Army, who is engaged in a motor tour of Great Britain, announced on Sunday at Blackburn, Lancashire, that the same electric flash which carried the news of his death would publish the name of the new general. It is learned that General Booth has left minute directions for the future administration of the army in a sealed envelope with his solicitors. No one else knows who his successor will be, but it is believed that it will be Branwell Booth, with Commander Howard and Commander Booth-Lucker as alternates in the event of Branwell Booth's death, and that the Army will continue under the guidance of one man, and not of a committee or a board of directors.

TERRIBLE WAVE OF HEAT. McGregor, Tex., Suffers Remarkable Visitation. McGregor, Tex., July 31.—A terrible wave of heat, said to be the greatest ever recorded in Texas, occurred on Sunday, continuing about an hour and twenty minutes. The thermometer registered 179 degrees in shade and 112 in the shade. An area three miles long and two miles wide was affected. The heat was accompanied by a peculiar haze which moved over the area affected. Scores of animals, including horses, cattle, hogs, and poultry, died. One man losing thirty-five head of stock. The phenomenon has not been explained.

Shot A Doctor. Winnipeg, July 31.—A man giving his name as Jurgely, with several aliases, was arrested at Hartney, charged with the shooting of Dr. Clyn Smith, at Winnipeg, while the two were driving. It is supposed his motive was robbery. Dr. Smith is recovering.
